SYNOPSIS OF THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.

vote, or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any This Act was passed by the Parliament of Cana-da in the Session of 1878, and received the assent of the Governor General on the 10th of May that year.

The object is to promote Temperance in the Dominion, and secure an uniform legislation in all the Provinces respecting the traffic in Intoxicating Liquors. PRELIMINARY STEPS. PRELIMINA

The first step to be taken in any County where the submission of the Act is desired, is to obtain the signatures of at least one-fourth of the Dominion of the submission of a least one-fourth of the Dominion electors to a petition, which petition, when duly signed, is to be deposited with the Sheriff or Regis-trar of deeds, for public examination for ten days, then forwarded to the Governor General thread to the sector of the sec
