## Plebiscite Convention，

An Enthusiastic and Well Attended Session
The Carleton Co．J＇lebiscite Conven－ tion met in the Baptist church at 11 p ． m．，on Monday，with D．McLeod Vince in the chair and E．M．Boyer as secre tary A large number of ministers were present．There was considerable speaking and a good deal of business was transacted．
The secretary having reported that some of the vice－presidents，appointed at the previous meeting，found it im－ possible to serve，he had procured sub－ stitutes as follows：in Simonds Mr． Hamilton in place of Dr．Ross；Wil－ mot，E．L．West，in place of George McClintock．John McLauchlan，Aber－ deen，having declined to act，the con vention elected E．S．Gilmore，V．P． in his place．

The Lecture committee was instruct－ ed to make arrangements for holding four or more mass temperance meetings in central places in the county；and， when appealed to for help to carry on public meetings throughont the county to try and furnish some speaking aid．
The Literary committee was instruct－ ed to procure 4000 campaign tracts and distribute them，proportionately，among the several vice－presidents．
The following were adopted as a list of suggestions in reference to parish or－ ganization for work，to be sent the var－ ious parish vice－presidents ：－
1st．Secure a copy of voters ${ }^{*}$ list for your parish．
2nd．Have one or more copies of the same made for general use．
3rd．Divide your parish iuto sections．
4th．Appoint one or more men to su pervise each section；to arrange one or more public meetings therein，and， if possible，to appeal to every voter per－ sonally，to go to to the polls and vote for Prohibition．
5th．To arrange for holding one or more general public meetings for the whole parish in some central locality．
6th．To take the most active meas－ ures for the further intensifying the sympathy and still futher enlisting the interest of the pulpit and press in the cause of Prohibition．
7th．To request the Sheriff to ap－ point only wellknow trustworthy men as deputy returning officers and poll clerks，in each polling district ；and to see that two suitable agents are ap－ pointed tor each polling booth．
Adjourned to meet at the call of the Executive．
The evening meeting was largely at－ tended and very interesting．Lack of space hinders giving a full account．
