London, March 8. Sir Arthur Helps, author, is dead. (Claude Louis Mathews died yesterday. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and all the bishops, with the exception of two, have issued a charge congratulating the clergy and laity on the progress of the church, and strongly recommending the former against illegal ritualistic practices which tend to isolate the clergy from the people.

The Times special says the Pope has permitted the Austrian bishops to comply with the law compelling them to notify the authorities of the names of priests appointed to livings. This is considered in Berlin as evidence that the Pope is actuated by political motives, as the resistance which he encourages of the Prussian bishops to a similar law, is a principal cause of the recent troubles with the Roman Church.

The order forbidding the sale of the 19th Century newspaper in France has been rescinded. The Alliance and Carlists are exchanging prisoners.

London, March 9. The Carlists have entered the Province of Santander in strong force. Badajoz, and the Spanish Government has embargoed steamers for transport service.

It is stated that there is great difficulty in preventing the young king of Spain from abdicating in favor of the Duke de Montpensier, but it is supposed to be an unfounded rumor.

An engagement lasting six hours took place near Figueras between Carlists and Alphonse. The latter lost 200 killed and wounded.

The Carlists are bombarding Oria. THE FRENCH CANNON. It is reported that the Cabinet will be composed as follows: M. Buffet, Vice President of the Council; M. Deffere, Minister of Justice; Duke Daudrebert, Minister of the Interior; Duke de Castes, Minister of Foreign Affairs; M. Louis Say, Minister of Finance; M. Walon, Minister of Instruction; Gen. De Cassy, Minister of War; Admiral De Montgac, Minister of Marine.

OCEAN STEAMSHIP PAPER. The report that the European Steamship Company have resolved to advance the storage passenger fares from New York is confirmed.

CUTTING THROATS. An insane mother, at Seymour, Connecticut, cut her throat and the throats of her two children.

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA. (To Morning Papers.) OTTAWA, March 8. Mr. Palmer asked if it was the intention of the Government to take any measures to secure to Canada the amount of compensation to which she is entitled under the Washington Treaty.

The Hon. Mr. Mackenzie said steps had already been taken to have an arbitration commission appointed to settle the claims of the Dominion of Quebec.

Mr. Costigan brought up the matter of the New Brunswick School Law. He entered into a lengthy history of the legislation relating to the schools, their past and present state, concluding by moving a resolution. He submitted a proposition that the Commission should be empowered to do as it saw fit, and was satisfied the House would make it. He hoped the Government would allow the House to pass freely and independently upon the resolution. He concluded by moving a lengthy resolution to the effect that the prohibition of religious instruction in schools was opposed to the sentiment of the people; that the law is unjust, and praying for an act providing that the Roman Catholic Church of New Brunswick shall have the same rights with respect to separate as dissenting schools and the same exemption from taxation for the support of common schools as are now enjoyed by the Roman Catholic minority of Ontario and the Protestant minority of Quebec.

Mr. Appleby opposed the resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Masson, as being lengthy.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

After dinner progress reported on the Manufacturers Exemption Bill.

Mr. McKay introduced a bill to alter the time of holding annual school meetings under Common Schools Act, 1871.

Mr. Keenan moved resolution for a rule providing that printed or partly printed bills may be introduced and passed in all stages through the House.

Mr. Phillips committed a bill for the protection of certain birds and other animals. Mr. Woods in the chair.

The mover explained that the bill is to prevent the killing of certain fur-bearing animals, and also of water and other birds and fowl between first of March and tenth of September, and of deer between first of February and first of September.

Mr. Butler thought the present law for the protection of moose should be extended to deer and caribou which would go quite far enough when coupled with Dominion laws.

Mr. McKay said the bill should not protect wild cats and marten which should be killed at sight wherever caught.

Progress was reported with leave to sit again.

Hon. Mr. Crawford committed a bill to incorporate the Maritime Mutual Fire Insurance Company. Mr. Ryan in the chair.

The Attorney General presented the petition of the Diocesan Synod of New Brunswick in favor of a bill to incorporate the Lord Bishop of Fredericton.

The Attorney General introduced a bill relating to lands held by the Trustees of the Wesleyan congregation, also a bill respecting the Methodist Church of Canada; also a bill relating to the Trustees of Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy, and petition of L. A. Wilnot and others in favor of the same.

The Legislative Council bill to enable Lake George Amusement Company to hold Stockholders' and Directors' meetings elsewhere than in Fredericton, was committed. Mr. Phillips in the chair. Agreed to.

Mr. Burns introduced a bill to provide for the purchase of lands and the erection of an Alma Mater and Workhouse in Gloucester.

Mr. Burns, according to notice, moved for papers and correspondence relating to the dismissal of Thomas F. Gillespie from the Magistracy and Constabulary of Alma House, Northumberland.

The Secretary said papers would be brought down without resolution whether or not passed.

Mr. Blanchard introduced a bill to legalize proceedings at public meetings in (amended) 1875.

Hon. Mr. Stevenson, tabled Crown Lands Department report.

Mr. Barker committed a bill to authorize municipality of York to acquire lands in St. Mary held in trust by them for school purposes; Mr. McKay in the chair. Agreed to after satisfactory explanation by mover.

Fredericton, March 9.

After routine Hon. Mr. McQueen committed the Bellevue, Alberrie and Oil Company Bill, Humphrey in the chair.

The bill is almost a transcript of the Bay of Fundy Red Granite Company Act, and the mover argued that should be a company will be formed for the purpose of boring for albertite and oil at Bellevue Village. He dwelt on the benefits which would flow from the establishment of the company, saying of the company, and asked for the passage of the bill.

Hon. Mr. Crawford said that as there was a section in the bill exempting the property of the company from local taxes, some remarks that for three months unless it was struck out.

Hon. Mr. Willis and Mr. Davidson argued against the principle of exemptions from taxes for the same reasons as those advanced by them against Crawford's Manufacturers Exemption Bill.

Mr. Fraser introduced a bill relating to the office of Speaker of Assembly, which was read a second time.
