In 1864 it had less than 3,000 electors. Mr. Disraell's Reform Bill of 1867 establishing Household Suffrage multiplied its constituency some six times over; the number of its lababitants entitled to vote being now more than 16,000. Obviously the increase must be among the poorer classes—people who lived in houses worth less than \$50 a year—the old qualification—and who now vote from the mere fact of occupation, irrespectively of value. All or nearly all these new voters belong to the wage-carning class. An eminent member of Parliament has been led by a consideration of these circumstances to compose, as he says, a poem on the election.
