IN THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Government Will Meet Wishes of Municipalities re Telephone Bill.

SURPLUS ON CENTRAL RY.

Sewerage Question Up Again—Proposed Game Law Amendment.

Fredericton, March 6.—To-day, Hon. Mr. Pugsley presented the report of the commissioners of the N. B. Railway and Coal Co. It stated that the total earnings of the road for the past year were \$43,196 as compared with \$37,931 in 1905 and \$25,387 in 1904. The earnings would have been much larger but for the fact that from June to October the Intercolonial railway was only able to supply one-fourth of the cars required for carrying coal to fill their own contract. The net earnings of the road were \$2,345 against a deficit of nearly \$6,000 for previous year, and of nearly \$14,000 for 1904. The tons of freight carried in 1906 were 38,731, of which 31,326 was coal, against 25,318 tons carried in 1905, of which 18,318 tons was coal. The coal carried in 1906 was nearly four times as much as in 1904. The number of passengers carried in 1906 was 13,940 against 10,836 in 1905. The report dwells on the necessity for more rolling stock, as it is impossible to handle more than 31,000 tons of coal in a year with 46 cars, the number possessed by the company. The company is offered contracts for supplying coal to the I. C. R., the pulp mills of St. John, and general consumers all over the province aggregating 73,000 gross tons for the ensuing year. Appended to the report are letters from the Canada Woodmen's Company, McLean, Holt & Co., the Maritime Dairy Co., the St. John Pulp and Paper Co., the Sussex Mfg. Co., and the Sussex Packing Co., highly commending the quality of the coal. The report was read at the clerk's table and ordered to be printed in the journals.

Fredericton, March 8.—In the house, to-day, Hon. Mr. Pugsley stated that the government proposed to introduce a bill with respect to telephone companies which would be of general application. This bill would not take the place of the New Brunswick Telephone Co.'s bill. It would give the governor in council power to regulate tolls and to compel companies to give connections with other telephone systems. Also to extend their lines to localities where a telephone is needed, and where there is reasonable prospect of it being remunerative. The telephone is a public utility of great importance, and should have as wide an extension as possible. The bill would also deal with the question of seeing that telephones are in good order and this will raise the question of the appointment of an inspector and whether this official should be paid by the companies or the government. It would also give the municipalities the control of the placing of the poles and conduits for the wires and also that no trees should be cut down without the consent of the superintendent of highways. W. T. Whitehead, member for York, gave notice of a resolution which, if passed, will henceforth al-

KICK AGAINST LORD'S DAY TGT.

Vancouver Druggists Take the Sulk and Shut their Stores.

GENERAL STRIKE PROBABLE.

Contest in Winnipeg over the Closed Shop Principal.

Winnipeg, March 12.—A strike of 5000 C. P. R. employees here will probably be declared within the next forty-eight hours. The difficulty arises over the company's refusal to discharge non-union employees. The Union men are determined to enforce the principle of the closed shop.

ANOTHER HEAD ON COLLISION.

Boston and Maine Trains Smash into each Other.

(Special to the Advocate.)

Williamstown, Mass., Mar. 12.—Two trains of the Boston and Maine system crashed into each other, injuring four men badly and killing one.

FIFTEEN MEN DROWNED.

Crowded to one end of Boat in Mid-stream with Usual Result.

(Special to the Advocate.)

Redding, California, March 12.—A company of Greeks, employed on construction work by the Sacramento Valley R. R., started across Pitt River yesterday in a ferry boat. When about half way over, they collected all on one end, and the boat upset. Panic ensued, and everyone slid into the water. Fifteen were drowned, and only one man saved.

Low the dumping of sewerage into the St. John river. The Provincial Board of Health a few months ago refused the city of Fredericton permission to discharge crude matter into the St. John River, which decision was subsequently upheld by the government on appeal.

Gov. Tweedie, this morning accompanied by Premier Pugsley and T. B. Winslow, secretary of the Board of Works Dept., made an external inspection of the old Government House, which, as an official residence, was closed in 1892. The Premier said that, as our governor is the only one in Canada without an official residence, action might be taken in the near future to reestablish it.

Mr. Clark presented the petition of Henry J. Taylor and 133 others asking for amendments in the game protection act. This petition was read at the clerk's table. It wants the date of hunting moose, caribou and deer to begin on the first of October and end on Dec. 15th.

Mr. Morrison gave notice of motion with regard to the application of E. B. Wallace for a grant of land.

Mr. Lowell introduced bills to amend the law respecting municipalities and to authorize the municipality of St. John to issue debentures to redeem other debentures.

Mr. Murray introduced a bill relating to the Presbyterian church of New Brunswick.

After the House went into committee on bills, the name of almshouses was changed to Municipal Homes.

Mr. Maxwell said that the bill to incorporate the trustees of the Reformed Presbyterian Church in the city of St. John had been agreed to by the committee on corporations. Some discussion followed and eventually it was agreed to report progress.

LUMBERMEN FORM PROTECTIVE ASS'N.

Small Dealers Unite to Protect Against Injustice of Forestry Act.

PROMPT ACTION TAKEN.

Next Meeting in Chatham on 20th March, to Complete Organization.

A meeting was held on Wednesday at Chatham, for the purpose of forming an association for the better protecting of the lumber operators and mill owners, who are not large holders of timber limits in the province, and to thus bring more forcibly to the notice of the government the injustice under which these operators are now lying, or will be subject to, if legislation which is contemplated, is brought into force—especially in regard to that part of Sec. 5 of the Forestry Act, so called where-in it is provided that the government may legislate for the extension of the present holder.

There were present at this meeting: T. W. Flett, of Thos. W. Flett Lumber Co., Limited; Robt. Loggie, of A. & R. Loggie; Wm. Damery, of Damery & McDonald; D. J. Buckley; John McInnes and Chas. Reinsborough.

It was decided that it is advisable that such an association be formed and on motion it was resolved that it be called "The New Brunswick Lumbermen's Protective Association."

T. W. Flett was elected chairman.

Branswick Lumbermen's Protective Association. All wishing to become members are requested to notify the secretary, Wm. Damery, Loggieville, at once.

A meeting will be held at the Canada House, Chatham, on Wednesday, March 20, at 2.30 p. m., to complete the organization and transact any business that may come up before the meeting.

EX M. P. P. OF SACKVILLE GONE.

J. L. Black Gathered to His Fathers by the Reaper.

Mr. Hendry was a member of John Hendry & Co., and played golf.

THE TELEPHONE SERVICE.

The prompt action taken by the Union of Municipalities and many municipal councils and Boards of Trade throughout the province has had a salutary effect. Resolution after resolution has been forwarded to the government urging the latter to take immediate steps to render impossible the establishment of a monopoly by the N. B. Telephone Company; to insure the public against unwarranted and arbitrary increase of telephone tolls; to forestall any attempt to make the public pay dividends on watered stock; and to provide against the possibility of discrimination against communities which desire to establish municipal or independent systems.

As a result, Premier Pugsley, on the 8th instant, announced in the Legislature the Government's intention to introduce a bill this session giving the Governor in Council the power to regulate telephone tolls, and to compel telephone companies to give connection with other systems and to extend their lines to localities where telephones are needed and where there is reasonable prospect of them being remunerative; also giving municipalities the control of the placing of poles and conduits; and providing that trees shall not be cut without the consent of the superintendents of highways.

This is all that the Municipalities and Boards of Trade have asked, and it is extremely gratifying that the Government has so promptly risen to the occasion, and met the wishes of the public as expressed by their natural spokesmen.

The day when the companies can secure exclusive franchises without the people noticing is rapidly passing. Henceforth the people who use public utilities are going to have a great deal to say about their management. The sentiment in favor of public control has grown wonderfully the last few years, and the number of those who favor the complete public ownership, control and operation of all public utilities is increasing by leaps and bounds.

A BIG DEMAND.

A steamship company that proposes establishing a line of vessels to go twenty-five knots an hour, covering the distance between Halifax and the new Irish port of Blacksod in three and a half days, wants a subsidy of a million dollars from Canada and half a million from Britain. How modest in their demands! If the government of Canada and Britain have to supply that much money, why not supply all that is needed and own and operate the line themselves? Why should a private company be given so much public money? Surely the alcoholic governments can, if they wish, operate a steamship line as effectively and cheaply as any private company.

WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE.

Only one day being allowed for its discussion, the bill in the Imperial Parliament granting Women the right to vote at all elections, was talked to death on the 8th instant, the speaker refusing to accept a motion of closure to enable the vote to be called. The question will be a definite issue at the general elections, and cannot fail to pass before long.

MANITOBA'S VERDICT.

The Manitoba elections last week returned Premier Roblin to power, the two parties now standing 28 to 12. Kempton McKim, the Canadian Labor Party candidate, was defeated.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

A letter from Mr. D. T. Robichaud, Editor of La Justice, is crowded out of this issue for lack of space.—Editor Union Advocate.

To the Editor Advocate:—

Dear Sir,—
In your issue of February 27th you published a letter, signed by "Citizen," in reference to loafing in the barber shops, pool and billiard rooms. Now I would like to say a word or two in regard to the way affairs are working around this town.

From the last of October until the middle of April there is nothing for the laboring men to do around town, as the mills are all closed down during the winter months, there is not even a place of amusement for a person to spend an evening.

The people around here, as the saying goes, "are too slow to stop quick." Why do not some of the men, who have a little capital to invest, get together and form a joint stock company, build an establishment of some kind that would run both summer and winter, for instance, a boot and shoe factory, or some other industry that would employ a large number of men the whole year round.

Some years ago, a pulp and paper company, offered the owner of the wharf, on which the Anderson Furniture Factory now stands, a good round sum of money for the said property but he (the owner) refused the offer and would not sell. Two years ago he sold the wharf to the above mentioned firm for the small sum of \$6,000.

Why, I might ask, did he refuse the pulp company's offer? The reason was, that the owner of the wharf, who was and is an Alderman, was also engaged in the lumbering business, and would not sell to the pulp company because they would be able to handle logs as small as four inches in diameter, and he was afraid he would run out of lumber for his mill.

There is only one industry in town that goes the year round, and that is the Anderson Furniture Factory, which does not by any means live up to the agreement that was made before they started. The agreement was that the town was to give them \$20,000, payable back in twenty yearly payments of \$1,000 each, with no interest, free water, electric light

and taxation, and on the other hand the company were to employ 50 men the first year, 75 the second and 150 the third, but they do not employ over 50 persons yet.

Every year, in the town report, there is a howl from the Chairman of the Water and Light Committee about the amount of water that has to be pumped to the reservoir, each day, but, of course, this company is never thought of, but the poor laboring man, if he happens to be caught allowing the water to run to avoid unnecessary expense by keeping the pipes from freezing up, gets all the blame. 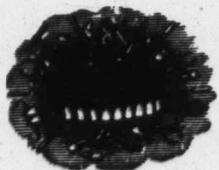

The Mayor's Report.

To the Electors of the Town of Newcastle.

Ladies and Gentlemen:—

Following the usual custom, on behalf of the Town Council I have much pleasure in submitting for your inspection a summary of the accounts of the Town for the civic year ending 31st December 1906, as per statement of the Treasurer and Accountant of the different Department.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The Public Works Committee has given much attention to their Department in the way of repairing and improving our streets, sidewalks and highways. The granolithic sidewalks laid down during the past two years has added to the appearance of our town and improved the means of traveling, and if the council follow out the policy already inaugurated a decided improvement will be made over the old method even admitting the extra cost of the present, for in a few years hence from the indestructible nature of the material the Town will be a gainer. Our highways to the bridge and to Jones' Crossing have been kept in thorough repair and broadened in places where it was found inadequate to accommodate the traffic in that particular section.

WATER AND LIGHT COMMITTEE.

The Water and Light Committee has shown commendable activity in the supervision of their department. The extension of the electric wires to the bridge gives the people of that locality a share in the modern lighting system which we ourselves enjoy. This department is one of the town's most valuable assets and is growing in volume every day owing to the number of people who are depending on it for services and contribute to its revenues. Experience and watchfulness is required to make it a success. The increased cost and consumption of coal, extra help and advance in wages and improvements charged to current account and the reckless waste of water by consumers has added very much to the cost of running this department. The extra amount of fuel required to run the pumps for from ten to twelve hours out of the twenty four is out of all proportion to the ordinary amount of water required for the number of people using it. Whereas, if ordinary care were taken of the water three to four hours pumping out of the twenty four would suffice; and I have no hesitation in saying that if this reckless waste of water is continued the people of Newcastle will have to secure an additional supply of water within a short time.

A new Fire Underwriters Pump has been installed for the greater protection against fires though not yet taken out of the hands of the manufacturers owing to some slight defects in the connections, otherwise it is satisfactory.

PARK AND FIRE.

In the efficiency of this department consists our safety from the deplorable ravages of the fire fiend and it must be satisfactory to every house holder that the fire company is composed of active and energetic men, well drilled in the art of fire fighting, and though their services has not been required at an extensive fire in the past have, nevertheless they are always ready to respond to the sound of the fire bell with cheerfulness and determination and consequently are deserving of our gratitude and encouragement.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Our Police Force at the present time consists of one night watchman. The services of day Policemen was dispensed with early in January. The committee were of the opinion that a second policeman was not necessary during the winter months. No disturbance or inconvenience has been felt since, which speaks volumes for the general good conduct of our citizens.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

During the past year Bonds amounting to \$51,000.00 were withdrawn from the Royal Bank of Canada and sold, this leaves \$72,000.00 still held by the Bank as security against advances made by them. Endeavors have been made to dispose of the balance, but owing to the dullness of the money market we were unable to dispose of them advantageously, but we may reasonably anticipate that in the near future better prices will be realized.

During the past year we have been very free from contagious disease, with the exception of some cases at the Bridge in the early part of the year, consequently the expenses in that department have been light.

FERRY.

The Ferry between Chatham Head and Newcastle has been running on schedule time for the past season and has given good satisfaction to the travelling public. No complaint of a serious nature has been made, but rather commendation for the boat and those in charge of her for their desire in catering to the comforts of her patrons.

The boat running between Redbank, Newcastle and Chatham has provided accommodation to the upriver people with a means of reaching a market they otherwise could not have. Efforts are being put forward with a view to have a boat to make daily trips next season and thus give an increased accommodation to those depending on steam boat communication to reach a market.

The foregoing is only a brief summary of Civic business and for a detailed statement I refer you to the annual report.

FINE EXHIBIT

AT NEW YORK.

New Brunswick to the Front at Sportsmen's Show.

Concerning New Brunswick's exhibit at the New York Sportsmen's Show, the N. Y. World of Wednesday says:—

Another exhibit was added to the Sportsmen's Show at Madison Square Garden when the snow-bound and long-delayed exhibit from New Brunswick was installed yesterday morning. It is one of the most attractive exhibits at the show. A big log cabin built of spruce, occupies one corner of the space. The game exhibits do not consist of heads only, but full bodies of the specimens, stuffed and mounted. A gigantic bull moose is shown and a tiny moose cat, all legs, stands near by. Caribou, a spotted deer, a red deer, a large black bear, a fine specimen of Canadian lynx, a wild cat, cross fox, an otter with a beautiful pelt, panels showing brook trout, two gigantic moose heads, one of them trimmed with electric lights, are also shown. Among the novelties at the exhibit is a rare specimen of a moose horn that has been shed and was partly nibbled by porcupine. A stump of a tree is shown which has been almost cut in two by industrious beavers to make a dam. The walls are covered with pictures showing the beauty spots of the region, one of the most interesting of the views being that of a salmon making a nine foot jump for bait.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.

(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Water and Light Report

To the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newcastle.

The Water and Light Committee beg leave to submit their report for the year ending December 31st, 1906.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

During the year sixteen additional light connections have been made and two incandescent lights added to our street lighting system.

The line has been extended to Bridgetown and six connections made there which has added materially to the revenue. This will probably be further increased by the lighting of the bridge and draw.

WATER.

During the year thirty-two water connections have been made, which makes a total of two hundred and five buildings using the Town water.

The amount of water pumped, however, is far in excess of the requirements, 125,000 gallons being the average daily amount pumped, which is about 100 gallons per day per capita.

This waste will have to be considered and steps taken to remedy it, as at present the pump has to run from nine to eleven hours daily, while with ordinary usage five hours pumping would suffice.

The Fire Underwriters pump has been installed but the connections not being satisfactory, it has not been taken into the contractor's hands. We have however the contractor's assurance that the necessary alterations will be made at once.

The plant is in good condition and we have had no serious break downs during the year.

The accounts for these two departments will be found in their proper place further on in the book, and show a gross earning of \$8,816.88 and a net revenue of \$1,415.59.

The net revenue shows less than former years owing to several reasons.

The system of book-keeping has been changed. During the year all expenditures—except meters, transformers, and wire—have been charged against revenue, while formerly a large proportion was charged to property account.

Owing to no provision being made for fuel for the winter of 1905 and 1906, coal had to be imported by rail at an additional expense, this with the increased amount of fuel consumed for pumping excess of water, has greatly increased the total amount of fuel for the year.

Public Works Report

To the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newcastle; Gentlemen:—

Your Committee on Public Works have much pleasure in submitting their report for the year ending December 31st, 1906.

STREETS AND ROADS.

The road machine and the heavy roller have been over the main highway from Willow street to the North West Bridge, and from Curtis corner to the Jones' crossing.

Falconer street, and Jane street from Pleasant street to the track leading to the deep water terminus; also the hill near Mr. James Treys' residence, have been built up with stone and rolled with the heavy roller, some five hundred rods of rock being used for this work. Ninety loads of stone were also used on Water street between Ledden Hill and Prince William street. Hanover and part of Duke streets were turpined and made in good condition. Necessary repairs to the different streets were also attended to. A new culvert was put in near the residence of Mr. Thos. Matheson. The streets were cleaned and the refuse removed to the dumping ground.

SIDEWALKS.

Necessary repairs were made to the wooden walks, and a new plank walk put down from the lower Thomson line to the residence of Mrs. Wm. Black; this piece of walk was very much needed, especially in wet weatherland during the spring months.

GRANOLITHIC SIDEWALK.

Of this material 235 feet in length was constructed on the north side of Castle street, east, 141 feet along

north side of Castle street, west, 111 feet along Jail street, and 244 feet along Ellen street. In all some 4525 square feet of material was put down. Three brick catch basins were constructed and a terra cotta drain from the one at Mackay's corner to the river.

We have found that coarse gravel for constructing granolithic walk has become very scarce near the Town and we were forced to obtain a supply of that material from the other side of the river, thus causing a slight increase in the cost of construction as compared with last year.

SEWERS.

The different sewers have been regularly flushed and kept in repair. The sewer near the ferry ship was prolonged to low water mark, and with care will be of service for some years; or till the permanent outlet is properly placed.

We are pleased to report that an understanding has been arrived at with the Telephone company whereby they are to keep one side of the street, while the Town electric light poles are kept on the other side.

Report of Fire Committee

Newcastle, N. B., Dec. 31st, 1906.

To the Chairman of the Fire Committee.

Sir:—

I hereby present for your consideration my report of the Newcastle Fire Company, for the year ending December 31st, 1906.

All the Fire Apparatus is in good order, and the men are attending to their duties satisfactorily.

The men are prompt in answering alarms, and work well at all fires.

The meetings and practices are well attended and the men take a deep interest in their work.

Since the Company has been given charge of all the apparatus, it has been much easier and more convenient for the men to keep the apparatus in good working order, and also the cleanliness of the building.

During the winter months I would recommend that a fire be kept burning in the building, to keep the frost from getting into the hose, which makes it very difficult to handle, and liable to freeze up when the water is turned on, especially at the couplings. Another reason why I recommend that a fire be kept burning is on account of the steam fire engine, which is a valuable asset of the town, and should always be in readiness in case of necessity. At present we have to run all the water out of the boiler, and open every thing up so that there will be no danger of her freezing. If she was required at a fire, she would have to be refilled with water and all gone over again before she would be ready to be used, and this would require a considerable length of time, which is very precious indeed, especially when a building is burning.

I would also recommend the advisability of installation of the Alarm system, which we have given you, and is now before the consideration of the Town Council, and trust that it will be favorably considered and adopted.

During the year we have been very fortunate in not having any large conflagrations.

The steam fire engine has, during the year, been tested four times, and she is now perfectly dry and on runners for the winter season.

There have been nine alarms this year, viz:—

- 1—Mrs. Wm. Watt's residence.
- 2—Bull School House.
- 3—Mrs. Richard McCullam's tenement house.
- 4—Geo. Burchill & Sons' mill, (Nelson)
- 5—Geo. Stables' store.
- 6—Frank Masson's residence.
- 7—Samuel Craig's hay field.
- 8—Wm. L. Curtis' Millinery shop. (Bridgetown)
- 9—Miss Parker's residence.

All of which were of a minor character.

During the year the Company has been furnished with,

New tool boxes for hose reels, 2 locks for doors, and jack-screw for lifting engine, these being the only expenditures with the exception of the Firemen's salaries.

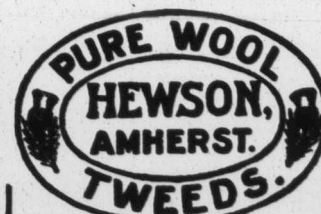

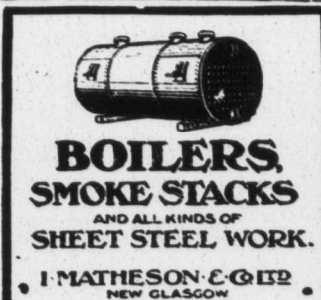

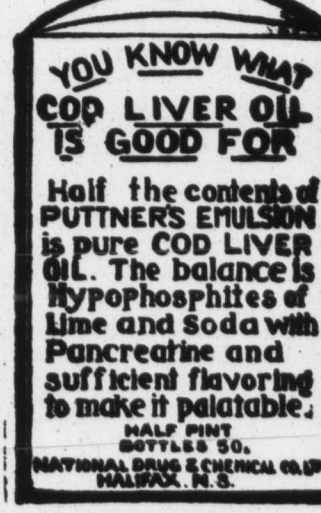

Brakeman George Dixon had his cars in Newcastle yard, Sunday, hand badly crushed while coupling. The injured man was taken to his home in Moncton.

In Fredericton, Saturday morning, Moncton High School team was defeated by the U. N. B. freshmen at basket ball, by a score of 15 to 12.

The game between three rinks of Moncton curlers and the Thistles for the McLellan cup, in Saint John, Saturday night, resulted in another victory for the Thistles, the score standing 19 to 13.

After tearing off bolts and smashing sleepers for a distance of three miles, Conductor Nickerson's Moncton-bound freight special was derailed at Salisbury Thursday afternoon. The road was not blocked.

At a session of the Kent County Probate Court held last week before Judge H. H. James, letters of administration of the estate of the late Alexander Murray of Main River were granted to A. Selkirk Murray, son of the deceased.

Mr. L. B. McMurdo has purchased Postmaster Harman's property on High Street, to which he will remove about May 1st. He has rented his present dwelling on Prince William Street to Mr. Thos. Tozer, train despatcher.

Original and picturesque was the verdict of the spectators as they watched the graceful skaters glide past keeping time to the excellent music supplied by McRachern's orchestra. Supper was served during the evening and the proceeds, which amounted to about \$150, will be contributed

Mr. J. Y. Mercereau, photographer, expects to reopen his studio here in a few days.

The Canadian Coal Mine at Mount Carlyle, Kent Co., has recently been leased by Dr. Hugo Von Hagen, of New York. These mines will re-open immediately. The machinery started pumping last week.

Mr. Wilfrid Reid met with a very bad accident Monday afternoon. A large plank falling struck him on the head inflicting a deep and painful cut from which he will be laid up for some time.

James Hanson, a well known lumberman, while operating this season at Kouchibouguac for R. O'Leary, felled a hemlock which scaled 1,673 superficial feet, being one of the largest trees cut in this country for many years.

Mr. Robert Ritchie of the firm of D. & J. Ritchie has been very ill for the last few weeks. He had a growth removed by an operation in Montreal last December, but the operation was not, it seems, completely successful.

Reid Bebell in his paper, was settled, upon the defendant signing a written apology and undertaking to publish a retraction in the next issue of the News, and also, it is said, paying the costs of prosecution.
