gether with the appropriation the village is entitled to, was placed in the hands of a competent roadmaker who would have gravel hauled from the shore of the river, placed properly on the roadway and rolled in, we would have in the course of a year or two a highway that would not only be clean, but solid. The roadway should be rounded to both sides so as to carry the water to gutters at the edges of the sidewalks, which could easily be made with cobblestones. A little care in the construction of these would cause the water to flow to points where it would find its way to the river.

There again, a certain portion of the sidewalks should be treated each year with a coating of asphalt or cement until the portions of the village where there is the most traffic would have clean, dry walks. Main street from Maple to the school house might be treated first, then the other thoroughfares as funds would permit.

As it is at present the so-called 'statute labor" and what ever appropriation is allotted to the village is utterly wasted in fact as I said at first, used for the purpose of making the roadways worse each succeeding year.

This is a matter that our councillors should carefully look into and the taxpayers of the village should give them no rest until this evil is remedier.
