ANOTHER THREAT TO INCREASE RATES

Peter Clinch Says Insurance Rates Will be Increased If Service Not Improved.
A meeting of the Town Council was held Friday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. Present were Messrs. Campbell, McKay, Dickie, Jamieson, Bissett and Ingram.
The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved.
A letter from a special committee of the Fire Brigade as follows was read: Campbellton Fire Brigade, Campbellton, Dec. 16th, 1919.
To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton.
At a meeting of the Fire Brigade held on Friday evening last, the matter of the reorganizing of the Brigade to place it on an independent footing was considered. For some time past this matter has been on our minds and our experience in the handling of recent fires such as the Empress theatre and Roseberry St. School has led us to believe that the interests of the Town demand that the Fire Brigade should be enlarged to meet requirements.
We have now only fifteen paid men outside of the driver and the steamer men, and it is our idea if the Brigade were enlarged by the addition of eleven more men a company could be formed in each ward under a competent captain who would naturally be expected to be on the scene of the first fire and take immediate action until the arrival of the Chief. It would then be a matter of pride for each company to make as good a showing as possible, and hence a friendly rivalry would be aroused which would make for greater efficiency of the Brigade.
Then, too, it would be possible to handle the larger fires without having to call upon the assistance of the public, however well intentioned, in some cases not of the best because of lack of experience.
After a thorough discussion of the matter from every point of view a resolution was passed authorizing the undersigned committee to ask your Honor to help to measure ground to the Brigade to \$1300.00 which would cover the salaries of eleven more men, also to supply equipment for them as the other men now have.
Trusting that you will give this matter your favorable consideration.

The Restigouche Branch of the G.W.V.A. wrote thanking the Council for their kindness in supporting them with quarters, light and water since organization, and requesting that they be granted free water and light for their new quarters.
Coun. Bissett moved that the request be granted.—Carried.
The Eastern Securities Corporation wrote advising the Town not to issue their Fire Station bonds until next spring as the market was poor for such bonds.—Referred to Finance Committee.
C. O. Foss, wrote re Hydro Electric powers to be developed from Tete-gouche River.—Laid on table.
F. W. Holt, C. E., wrote stating that the distance on Walker Brook to a level as present reservoir would be 7400 feet or one and four tenths miles.
Mrs. F. Doherty notified town that if water was diverted from Walker Brook to the injury of the pond property she would hold the town responsible for such damages.
This letter was referred to the Town Solicitor for report.

In consequence of the inadequate water supply in Campbellton at present it is proposed to make a heavy increase in the fire insurance rates, but before doing so it was suggested that a delegation from Campbellton with authority to deal with the matter of fire protection should be asked to meet this Board here before the 10th of January. BIGGEST REVIVAL IN HISTORY

Inter-Church Forward Movement Plan Great Things.
Canada is on the eve of the greatest religious revival of her history. The Inter-Church Forward Movement has been launched throughout the Dominion with the cooperation of the five leading Protestant denominations, Anglicans, Methodists, Presbyterians, Baptists and Congregationalists for the coming three months will gather together, clergy and laymen alike, in gathering great and small, in city and in village, to promote a revival of Christianity and a spiritual awakening of the nation on the following heads:—
(a) To conserve the spirit of sacrifice brought forth by the war for the advancement of the Kingdom of Christ.
(b) To evangelize.
(c) To recruit for the ministry and the missions.
(d) To raise a total amount all the churches, of over eleven million dollars for the purpose of enlarging the work of the church at home and abroad.
This is not church union, it is more. It is the united effort of all the protestants of Canada in a stronger and clearer challenge to service than has ever been heard by Canadians before. The origin of the great Inter-Church Forward Movement is obscure. As far as is known, a prayer meeting held two years ago in the office of Dr. R. P. MacKay, the Presbyterian Mission secretary, was the seed from which the present national movement sprang. Dr. MacKay invited a half dozen ministers of the different denominations to a prayer meeting, and there was after the war. The gradual growth of discussion the duty of the churches in the reconstruction of the nation was discovered to all the gentlemen present at this meeting. From this arose the co-ordinated Forward Movement under the United National Campaign, of which G. H. Wood, of Wood Gundy, Limited, of Toronto, is chairman.

There is a National Executive to the Inter-Church movement. This committee, which covers the whole Dominion, is appointed by the meeting of the five denominations. But this movement and to make it of as committee's role is to co-ordinate wide a scope as possible. It does not interfere with denominational policies, nor does it involve the merging of funds. Each denomination has designed its own campaign and will raise and administer its own funds. But in recognition of the fact that all churches are actuated by the same motive and serving the same master they have joined forces so that as great an impetus as possible may be given to the revival. The aims of each denomination are practically identical. The recognition of the deeper responsibility of church members, the evangelization of all the people, the recruiting of men and women for the ministry and the raising of larger funds than ever before demanded are the chief objectives. The sums set as objectives by the different denominations for the whole of Canada are as follows: Presbyterian, \$4,000,000; Methodist, \$3,785,000; Anglican, \$2,500,000; Baptist, \$750,000; Congregational, \$150,000.

PUNISHMENT FOR GERMAN OFFICERS
Convicted at Amiens on Charge of Organizing the Pillage of Factories in Eastern France.
Amiens, Dec. 24.—A court martial has sentenced the German officer, Robert Roedeling, administrator of mines at Karlsruhe, to ten years imprisonment, fifteen years of exile and a fine of ten million francs upon his conviction of a charge of organizing the pillage of factories in Eastern France. It was testified at his trial that he collected machinery and other material from the factories and blew it up in November, 1918. His brothers, Norman and Ludwig, were given similar sentences by default.
The Roedeling brothers are known as German "steel" kings.

Christmas at Hospital
The friends of the patients at Hotel Dieu who called to see them on Christmas Day, expecting to find them downhearted and lonely were agreeably surprised to find that even in an hospital, and that a temporary one, it is quite possible to have a "Merry Christmas."
The entire building, offices, corridors, wards and rooms, appeared in festive array. Ceilings and walls were hung with varicolored festoons from which at intervals were suspended the typical Christmas bell.
Through the generosity of the Young Girls' Guild each floor had its Christmas tree on which were hung little gifts, some practical, some humorous, for the patients. The unbending of these trees formed the climax of the days entertainment. A real live Santa Claus went from room to room, distributing the gifts which, though perhaps of little material value, were rich in the wealth of good cheer which they typified.
The generous Christmas dinner served to the patients was made easy by the donation of charitable friends of the Institution.
There is in addition the story of how the pupil nurses enjoyed Christmas, the "Christmas Boxes" they received from the members of the medical staff and from the Nuns, but their real Christmas consisted in trying to see that every patient was happy and cheerful. If they themselves were lonely, they did not show it, and they all agreed at night fall that they had had a perfectly happy day.

SUDDEN DEATH OF CON. JAS. SWETMAN

Well Known Moncton Railway Man Passed Away At St. Louis Hotel Here.
The death of Conductor James Swetman of Moncton took place here suddenly of apoplexy Monday evening about 9.30 o'clock.
Mr. Swetman arrived here in charge of No. 25, Accommodation at 6.40 Monday evening. He had supper at the St. Louis Hotel, as was his usual custom, and after conversing some only a few minutes later was noticed away before the physician arrived. Death was due to apoplexy.
The family in Moncton were notified at once of the sad occurrence and arrangements were made for the removal of the body to that city on the Maritime Express Tuesday morning.
Among all the trainmen who daily run the Canadian National Railways for forty years or more, and more particularly, no one was more widely known and more highly respected than the late Conductor James Swetman. A host of friends throughout the Maritime Provinces, and more particularly among the travelling public, will learn of his death with the keenest regret. He was in the service of the railway for forty years or more, being at the time of his death in the 60th year of his age. He is survived by his widow two daughters, Mrs. Roy Campbell, Campbellton, and Mrs. Bell LeBlanc, at home; and two sons, James and Graham, both C.N.R. railwaymen of Moncton. Another son, Harry, laid down his life on the battlefields of France, the other two sons having also enlisted but returned home safely.

PIONEER RESIDENT DIES SUDDENLY

John Moffat of Head Tide Passed Away Sunday Morning.
Mr. John Moffat, of Head Tide passed away quite suddenly Sunday morning about 8 o'clock.
He had arisen about the usual time and had eaten his breakfast when he suddenly took a weak turn and expired. He had not been in his usual health for some time, but was as usual and word of his death came as a great shock to his numerous friends.
Deceased, who was 79 years of age was one of the pioneers of Restigouche. He was born at Campbellton and when a young lad he was sent in the ship Anna Bella, one of the ships built by the Moffats to Scotland where he received his education. Later he was associated with his brother George and Robert in the lumber business under the firm name of George Moffat & Co. At Head Tide he for years ran a water power lumber and grist mill, which were destroyed by fire.
He is survived by one son George of British Columbia, who was on a visit to his home.
The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon and was very largely attended.

WOODSMEN ON HOLIDAYS BENT

All the Way From the North Shore on Way to Homes in York County.

(Wednesday's Telegraph) A large number of woodmen arrived in St. John yesterday, after their homes to spend the holidays. Those from camps in north eastern New Brunswick, most of whom were bound for points in York county, said the operators had had little difficulty recently in obtaining full crews, although early in the season help was scarce and returned soldiers who had that the operators had little difficulty war, were reluctant to return to their gone to the woods yearly before the former winter employment in October. No, however, many veterans were in the woods. The wages vary from \$65 to \$75 a month.

The men reported that the camps were unusually free from sickness this season, the influenza not having appeared again. The food is generally abundant and of excellent quality and complaints are few.

In fact, the only complaint that was heard at the Union station was that the lumber cutters at points along the International division of the C. N. R. had difficulty in getting train accommodation when they desired to reach Campbellton. On Monday, the men arriving here said, seventy-five woodmen assembled at a platform eleven miles from Campbellton, but the east-bound accommodation would not stop. The train was already jammed with lumber cutters who had emerged from the woods at other points, a score even riding in a box car. Some of the party of seventy-five hired teams, which carried them and their dunnage to Campbellton, and the remainder walked eleven miles. All were able to reach the town in time to board the east-bound Maritime express train at an early hour yesterday morning. Most of the woodmen say they will return to the northern woods after the holidays.

There is barely sufficient snow in the northern counties for runners. In Westmorland county, runners and wheels are both in use, but near St. John there is no sleighing and cattle are browsing in the fields.

There has been little lost time in any of the lumber districts. The men worked through the recent cold weather, the biting westerly winds not penetrating to the camps, except on exposed tracts or elevations.

The lumbermen speak highly of the Restigouche region as a lumbering country. The International division of the C. N. R. is handling a heavy freight traffic, carrying much lumber, camp supplies and freight routed for the United States which passes over the St. John river railroad bridge between St. Leonard's and Van Buren (N.S.).

In Westmorland county the lumber operators are unusually busy. Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines, of Shediac, who has not lumbered for two years, is busy this season, and will start his mill in the spring. A large concern which does business in northern New Brunswick and in Quebec has established an employment bureau at Moncton.



We trust that early in the year will see the reorganization of the Board of Trade, which has been, if not dead, practically sleeping.

Citizens of Campbellton, with the birth of this new year may we all have reborn in us the spirit of the times—progress, push and enterprise.

J. D. ROCKEFELLER GIVES MILLIONS

Half Will Be Used to Raise Salaries of College Professors.

New York, Dec. 25.—John D. Rockefeller yesterday gave to a mankind a Christmas present of \$100,000,000, half to the General Education Board to raise the salaries of college professors and half to the Rockefeller Foundation to aid in its work of combating disease through improvement of medical education, public health administration and scientific research. It is estimated that Mr. Rockefeller's public gifts now approximate \$450,000,000.

Five millions for Canada. The trustees of the Rockefeller Foundation also are authorized to utilize both the principal and the income of their gift, in connection with which Mr. Rockefeller added, that if the Board "Should see fit to use any part of this gift promoting medical education in Canada, such action would meet my cordial approval."

Such action will be taken according to the Foundation, who stated last night that the Trustees would be asked to set aside \$5,000,000 for this purpose.

A professor was teaching his evening class in English composition. "I would like you to consider this sentence, gentlemen, and tell me how you would punctuate it," he remarked: "A lady was passing along the street very pleasantly."



NEW MOTOR FUEL JUST RECEIVED TESTS SUCCESSFUL

Successful tests of a motor fuel declared to be more economical than gasoline not only, but also easier on motors. Were announced to-day by Otto Praeger, second assistant postmaster general in charge of the air mail service. The fuel consists of 38 parts of alcohol, 30 of gasoline, 19 of benzol, 3.5 of ether and four of toluol. Ingredients making up the remaining one and one-half parts were not given. Mail plane No. 35 was used in the tests between New York and Washington. Another plane, using high test aviation gasoline, was used as a check. A saving of 3.9 gallons an hour is also shown by the tests. After being tested, Economy of lubricating oils 125 hours in the air the two motors were torn down, and that in which the new fuel had been used was found in fine condition, with a smaller deposit of carbon.
