AGRICULTURAL.

DANA'S PRIZE ESSAY ON MANURES SECTION NINTH.

Much has been said about tanks, and vats and urine-pits, and many plans devised for preventing the escape of volatile ammonia. But when once the action of ammonia upon mould is understood, as we have already pointed out; I am persuaded, Reader, that these tanks and vats, and urine carts, will appear to you not only expensive and cumbersome, but useless. Your first point is, to save your ammonia, your second is, never to use urine in its caustic or burning state. If you do, you will as assuredly burn your crop, as the puddle formed by a cow burns the grass upon which she empties her watering-pot.

Here the urine forming caustic ammonia acts as would caustic potash, or a lump of stone lime, left to slack upon the grass. You want to change this burning or caustic ammonia into mild ammonia, oil has not only that effect, but also keeps it from flying away. Unless you understand, then, the principles of these actions, and apply them too, your labour is all vanity, when you attempt to save your own or cattle's urine.

These principles are, in number, two—First, the principle which changes caustic to mild ammonia, is carbonic acid derived from air, or decomposing mould. Second, the principles which render ammonia less volatile, or wholly fixed, are certain salts formed in mould, as our mould, or certain salts which give up their acid to the ammonia. Plaster of Paris does this; by changing its lime for ammonia. Now let us go into the reason of this a little, and see if we can understand it. Very slowly and supposing moisture present, the oil of vitriol of the plaster quits its lime and unites to the ammonia, and so changes a volatile into a fixed salt. Now this is a change which has been of late much insisted on, and the practice recommended of strewing the stable and barn cellars, and even the privies with plaster, to save the ammonia which escapes in these places. But it is doubtful whether the saving is as great as is usually supposed, for the ammonia arising from the urine is caustic, it lies off as caustic ammonia that has no effect upon plaster. Coppers, alum, common salt, potashes, and woodashes, all act to fix the volatile ammonia, and have all been recommended for this purpose. But it is easily seen, that in employing some of these substances, it is to buy ammonia almost at apothecary's price.

These practices will be followed, therefore, only by those who place the crop, and its value upon ammonia. This is a limited and narrow view. The true and farmer-like, as well as the most scientific and natural mode of preserving the ammonia of manure, is to fill your yards and barn cellars with plenty of mould; by which I mean, strewed and decaying vegetable matter, as well as loam. There is no mode more effectual, no mode more economical.

Consider now for a moment how mould formed and forming, and ammonia act. Have I not said again and again, ammonia hastens decay; it makes mould more easily dissolved; and cooks the food of plants? That action having occurred during its progress, acids were formed. The ammonia unites with them, loses its burning properties, and becomes fixed. The acids having been satisfied, the ammonia is actually imbedded and retained by mould.

It does not drink it in like a sponge, but the mould forms a peculiar chemical compound with ammonia. This peculiar compound, while it does not render the mould as easily dissolved matter, yet holds ammonia by so feeble a force, that it easily yields to the power of growing plants. It gives up the stored ammonia at the place where, and the time when, it is most wanting. If you remember these actions of mould and ammonia it will be plain as day, that what we have said of the inexpediency and expense of vats and tanks, and urine-carts, must not only be true but is confirmed by the experience of a host of hard-working, thinking, practical men. In connexion with urine, the dung of birds, for instance domestic fowls of all kinds, and pigeons, may be here mentioned. These animals discharge their solids and what we may term their liquids together. Their urea comes out combined with or forming part of their dung. Now reflecting a moment on the nature of their food, strongly nitrogenous being seeds, grains, &c. or animals, bugs, grasshoppers, &c., we can understand why their droppings are peculiarly rich in ammonia and salts. The strongest of all manures is found in the droppings of the poultry-yard. But since these form but a small portion of the farmer's stock, and are never regarded as a principle source of manure, their further consideration may be omitted. It may perhaps be here added, that as from their nature bird droppings run quickly into fermentation, with warmth and moisture, so they act quickly and are quickly done. They are more allied to sheep dung than other manures. Their mould not being great, droppings of poultry equite to be mixed with decayed vegetable

matter, or loam. To this class belongs the manure brought from the Pacific Ocean, under the name of Guano, a Spanish word for excrement. New England farmers can find cheaper sources of salts, to which the main value of guano is owing, and therefore, Reader, we shall detain you no longer on this point.

OATS.—This crop should be got in as early as the ground is sufficiently dry to afford a dry bed; and if you desire to have such a crop as you would not be ashamed to sell, the number of bushels per acre, you must sow in good ground, or manure it; for not manure ever yet resped a remunerating crop of oats from a poverty stricken soil. In preparing your ground, plough deep, pulverise thoroughly with the harrow, and after you have sown your seed, harrowed it in, and watered the ground, if it should need it, run watter furrows so as to keep the crop dry. If your ground be good, sow from 2 1/2 to 3 bushels per acre, and in no event sow less than 2, by heavy sowing you exclude weeds, and secure to the oat plants the exclusive benefit of the pabulum of the earth.

COMMERCIAL.

Commercial affairs have an improving appearance. The home trade has bought rather freely of several articles; exporters have joined the demand to a fair extent, and there are indications of a renewed speculative inquiry; as yet few transactions have resulted from the latter, but as money is abundant, increased operations are likely to occur. The dealers are lightly stocked, and there is a large consumption for nearly all descriptions of produce. Merchants, notwithstanding additional arrivals from all quarters, have displayed much firmness, offering few parcels for public competition. There is much activity in the British iron trade, and prices are considerably higher.

TIMBER.—Since our last publication the consumption demand for timber has increased; the dealers have bought more freely, and though no change can be made in the quotations, somewhat better terms have been obtained. The supplies, since the 1st of February, show a decrease of 3,782 tons, on the average of the previous four years at the same period. Colonial Square Timber is scarce in first hands, and dealers are only moderately supplied; of Deals and Planks the stock is tolerably large. There have been sold during the month a yarded cargo of St. John's Spruce Deals at 2 1/4d per foot. One of St. Stephen's Deals and Batens, at 2 3/8 per foot. Part of a cargo of Miramichi Pine and Spruce Deals in the yard, by auction, at 2 3/10 to 2 5/10 per foot. A cargo of Quebec Deals, of middling quality only, at 25 5s to 29 per standard on the quay. Some Pine and Spruce Batens, at 210 10s per standard. 14 Quebec Pine, most lengths, at 18 1/2d per foot, and 11 round mast pieces of small dimensions, at 18 1/4d per foot, string measure.—There is a considerable decrease in the tonnage of vessels despatched this year to the timber ports, being up to this time only 19,622 tons, against an average of the four previous years of 27,224 tons.

Extraordinary Despatch in Loading.—Notwithstanding that our Port is so far famed for giving quick despatch to Shipping, it is seldom that we have it in our power to notice such an instance of extraordinary despatch to ships as we have lately observed going on in our harbour, and as a peculiar instance of such, we would mention the ship *Renfrewshire*, Capt. John Burns, owned by Messrs Pollock, Gilmour & Co. of Glasgow, and loaded by the branch of their firm in this place viz: Robert Rankin & Co.

The ship arrived the 19th of April, and after discharging fully 350 tons of ballast, is this day, (April 30,) fully loaded with a cargo equal to 1300 tons of square timber, including the deckload, and all ready to sail to-morrow, being the first day she can clear with a deckload on. When we consider the size of this vessel (being nearly 850 tons) and the immense quantity she had to discharge, besides loading, it shows what astonishing exertions must have been used in getting her ready for sea, and when we state that all this work has been performed without any night work, it is a proof of what can be done in our port, in giving despatch, and shows how much more energy is now instilled into our business than when a few years ago it was customary to see ships of such a size lying in our harbour five or six weeks at a time, and then were thought to be doing remarkably well.—*Courier*.

Agricultural.—A good show of Cattle, &c. for the season of the year, was presented at the April Market, held last Thursday week, as follows:—Cows, 37; Calves, 12; Horses, 2; Hogs, 16; Goats, 3. £11 were offered for a Cow, the property of Mr. John Forsyth, and refused.—*Ibid*.

The *Better Times*.—It is pleasant to turn from the plots and counterplots of the poli-

ticians, the sordid wranglings for place and power, to the great interests of the country, now for the first time in several years enjoying prosperity in common. Commerce, agriculture and manufactures are all in a flourishing condition. Scarcely a vessel crosses the Atlantic, either way, without a full cargo, & from the unparalleled quantities of produce pouring through the newly opened canals, from the great producing regions of the west into this port, for sale and exportation, an advance in freights may be anticipated. Fair remunerating prices for wheat, flour, corn, pork, &c. are still obtained, and in all the agricultural staples of the country, with the exception perhaps of cotton, in which the finger of speculation has been too busy, there is every prospect of a profitable spring trade. The manufacturing interest, so long depressed, is now invigorated activity, and the period seems to be fast approaching when we shall not only be self supplied with all that can be fabricated by the spindle and the loom but we may furnish no inconsiderable portion of the world with the products of skill and industry. A home market, however is, and will be for generations to come, more desirable than a foreign one.—*N. Y. True Sun*.

MASONRY.—The New-Brunswick of the 7th inst., says:—On Friday evening last, the Members of the Albion Lodge, No. 570, presented to their Worshipful Master a Silver Pitcher, of exquisite workmanship, in token of their respect and esteem for his long and valuable services, on his approaching departure from this Province. This elegant token of affectionate regard was accompanied with a very beautiful and feeling Address, to which an appropriate Reply was made. The Portland Union Lodge, No. 324, on the Registry of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, also presented an excellent Address, but the crowded state of our columns will not permit our giving publicity to these documents to-day.

EMIGRATION.—The *Barque Pallas* sailed from Cork for this Port with 138 Passengers on the 24 April—and the *Fellowship* sailed from Londonderry for this Port, with 180 passengers on the 11th April.—Lists of passengers by these vessels can be seen by parties interested, at the Office of M. Earthquake at St. Thomas.—A severe shock of an earthquake was experienced at St. Thomas, at 10 o'clock, A. M., on the 17th of April. It created great excitement throughout the town for some hours. A number of persons quit their dwellings, for no accident occurred. It was supposed from the direction of the roaring, that bad news may be expected from the windward Islands.

Coroner's Inquest.—An Inquest was held at Round Hill, Annapolis, N. S., on the 29th April, before Peter Bousset Esq., on view of the body of William Gould, a native of Limerick, Ireland, and late of Sussex Vale, N. B.—Verdict.—Killed accidentally by a tree. The deceased was a sober, honest, industrious man, aged 35 years, in very indigent circumstances; he has left a widow with two children, the eldest not two years old, the youngest ten days.

Libel.—A verdict of £100 damages and costs, was recorded against Mr. J. H. Crosskill, editor of the *Morning Post*, in the Supreme Court at Halifax on Thursday last, for a libel published in that paper three years ago. The *Post* promises the full particulars of the case so soon as the proceedings shall have terminated.

From St. Domingo.—By the arrival of the schr. *Wm. Wilson*, Capt. Baker, we learn that on the 4th and 5th of this month, the people of the interior of the island made a descent upon Aux Cayes, and after a short struggle captured the town. The women & children had taken refuge on board of the American and English vessels in port. It was supposed that they would fire the town, the whole island being in a state of uproar.—*New York True Sun*.

Tremendous Riot in PHILADELPHIA.

The Pennsylvania of Tuesday, contains the following particulars—

Yesterday afternoon, a dreadful and dangerous riot occurred in Kensington. At 4 o'clock, a meeting of the Native American party was held at the corner of Second and Master streets. The meeting was addressed by Mr. S. B. Kramer, Gen. Smith, and L. C. Levin. The rain coming on, it adjourned to the market in the neighbourhood, where Mr. Levin recommenced his discourse; he had not proceeded far before a rush was made on the western side of the market house in consequence of a gun which is said to have been fired across a lot from the vicinity of the Hibernia hose house; then commenced one of the most dreadful scenes that can well be imagined.

Volley after volley was fired, and a rush was made over a lot in the direction of the Hibernia Hose house. From every street and house came rushing to the scene of action, armed men—some with muskets, others with bludgeons, and stones; many of these were accompanied by women, who fired upon them, and directed them where to fire. These in possession of the market house maintained their ground and held aloft the flag—while the square between Calwellader street and the German town road in Master street was filled with the combatants. Some of them here ran into houses, but they were searched, and the infuriated mob fell to work and partially destroyed the houses in which they had taken refuge.

In Caldwell street, a similar frightful scene was presented. The house of a widow woman into which a man ran was attacked, the doors were broken open and the rioters rushed in and broke the furniture into fragments.

The riot lasted about an hour, during which time the reports of fire arms numbered hundreds, and at least 50 persons fell from being wounded. Several persons were reported to have been killed. A young man residing in St. John street, near Beaver street, George Shuffley, was killed on the spot in a fight with a young man named Temper who was wounded in the hip, and was wounded in so shocking a manner, that he cannot possibly survive.

Among the buildings attacked was Hibernia Hose House, the lights of this were all extinguished and the premises otherwise damaged. We believe that the flag was protected by those who had undertaken the venture, but we know not.

The Native American party gradually dispersed and up to a late hour in the evening comparative order prevailed.

At past 12 o'clock, we learn this morning, that about 10 o'clock an attempt was made by a party of the crowd to burn down the fence which encloses the nursery. They were fired upon by a party of Irish, and five of them shot. One William Ramsey, a blind maker in Third street, near Brown, was mortally wounded. J. W. Wright, son of Mr. Wright of the firm of Wright & Nephew, salt merchants, who was a silent spectator, was shot through the heart, and fell dead on the spot.

From the Spirit of the Times, May 5.

LATER—MORE RIOTING.
Our city is in a general scene of alarm and confusion—Kensington is the theatre of an unprecedented riot, of conflagration and bloodshed—the fruits of the quarrel between the Native Americans and Irish Catholics. We have only room to continue the account of death and devastation commenced yesterday, confining ourselves to the facts as we can gather them without comment.

During the forenoon of yesterday the scene of Monday's disturbance was remarkably quiet for time and circumstances; most of the poor Irish were leaving their houses and moving what they could of their property. At the corners and in the squares around the battle ground were collected crowds of Native Americans, conversing with much excitement upon the doings of Monday.

About ten o'clock a large party of Native Americans assembled at Second and Master streets, and marched in procession through the district of Kensington, passing the Market House where the fight took place on Monday evening, and last night. In the procession was carried the large flag which had been raised on Monday, and which was considerably torn. Preceding this was a banner borne by one man, and having upon it the following inscription:—"This is the flag which has been trampled upon by the Irish Pinks!"

The procession moved down Third street to the heart of the city, and cheered at the sight of the news paper offices—groaning offices.

In the afternoon the natives assembled in Independence Square, numbering from two to three thousand. A meeting was organized, and the crowd was addressed by Mr. C. J. Jack. From thence they proceeded in procession to Kensington, headed by Mr. Jack, and marched to Second and Master streets, then to the Washington street market, where the fight had occurred on Monday. Here they again organized a meeting, and Mr. Jack again mounted the stage to address them. It was then about 5 o'clock P. M.

Immediately after the organization of the meeting a scene of extraordinary riot commenced, and which it is alleged by the party was commenced, some say, by the Irish—others say by the Natives. Some boys who were in the crowd at the market, commenced throwing stones at the Hibernia hose house opposite to Caldwell street. Some exhibitions of a general outbreak were apparent, and in a few moments a volley of

stones and brickbats were thrown by both parties.

The mob then placed the flag up before a house at the N. E. corner of Second and Master, and, after getting a number of muskets, again repaired to the market house, headed by Peter Abright, who had been shot in the hand. They then paraded on the space west and south of the market, exposed to the shots of the Irish in the houses opposite. A general and bloody skirmish now took place.

As soon as the armed men appeared in front of the Irish houses, volley after volley was fired into them, and the fire was returned. This lasted nearly an hour, during which upwards of twenty men of the natives were shot—probably near half that number killed.

One daring fellow named John Taggart, rushed out of a house, and fired several times upon the Natives—it is said, killed two or three men. A rush was made upon him, and he was captured, though fighting like a madman, and just in the act of shooting a fourth gun.

Here the mob attempted to hang him up, but citizens interposed, and after some delay he was carried off to the office of Mayor Cannon, still breathing.

TEN O'CLOCK, P. M. We have just learned that an Irish weaver named Joseph Rice was shot through the head while looking over the fence to see how the riot progressed.

The military arrived on the ground at 8 o'clock, P. M. whose presence had the effect of restoring an almost total quiet.

Eleven o'clock.—A few guns are being discharged by Natives in Master street. Military in motion, but no rioters discovered.

Midnight.—All quiet. The military are on the ground. The fires are all extinguished, and the firemen returning home.

CANADA.

Reply of His Excellency the Governor General, Sir C. Metcalfe, to the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the County of Russell, in the District of Ottawa.

I thank you Gentlemen, cordially, for your loyal, patriotic and constitutional Address.

At a time when an insidious attempt is made to prostrate Her Majesty's Government in Canada, to an unexampled condition of subservience, which would be tantamount to its overthrow, it is highly satisfactory to observe the public spirit and generous zeal, with which those, who rightly appreciate the connection subsisting between this Colony and the British Empire, come forward in support of Her Majesty's Representatives, in his endeavours to maintain this Province in true allegiance to our Gracious Sovereign, and to render it prosperous and happy as an integral portion of Her Majesty's dominions.

The objects of the party who are bent on obstructing the Government, and who are actively engaged in exciting disaffection against me by the most unscrupulous insinuations, are now disclosed beyond the probability of misconception. It is manifest that they aim at the following state of things. That the authority of Her Majesty in this Province should be a nullity. That the Governor should be a subservient Tool in the hands of the Executive Council. That the Executive Council should be in reality nominated, not by the Crown, but by the House of Assembly.

The authority of the Crown and of the Legislative Council being thus annihilated, and every balance in the Constitution destroyed, the whole power of the State would be usurped by either the Executive Council, exercising undue interference over the House of Assembly, or by the House of Assembly, exercising unlimited in the Executive Administration. It would be either a despotic or exclusive Oligarchy, or an absolute unqualified Democracy. This they pretend is the Responsible Government granted to Canada by Her Majesty's Ministers. It is neither the one or the other. The British Constitution is a limited Monarchy, or a balance of the Monarchical Aristocratic and Democratic powers, without the exclusive ascendancy of either, the work of ages, progressively formed, to suit the gradual changes in the social relations of the community, and the Constitution granted to Canada, is the same as far as the same can be practically carried into operation in a colony.

This Constitution as established by the arrangements of Lord Sydenham, and by the resolutions of September 1841, I am anxious, and shall continue to use, my anxious endeavours to work through responsible heads of departments, for the benefit and contentment of the people of Canada, with the advice and co-operation of an Executive Council which will, I trust, obtain the confidence of the Provincial Parliament; and if this cannot be done successfully, the blame will be due to those who in the pursuit of unbridled power have sought to destroy the Constitution which they pretend to uphold, and are doing their utmost to obstruct the formation of any Responsible Government, while their unfeigned outcry is, that it is intentionally avoided.

Many probably give their support to this party under an honest belief that there is reliance on my part to consult the Executive Council. This is entirely an error. With any Council that seeks the good of the country and does not strive to degrade the office of Governor to the condition of a mere Party Tool, it is my inclination, as well as my duty and my practice, to consult on all subjects. No Governor could dream of administering the government of this Province, without constant consultation with his Council.

Every Governor must be sensible of the advantage that he would derive from the advice, and information of Councilors and Heads of Departments, in whom he can place confidence. But that is not the question at issue. If it were, or if it had been,

the country would not have been troubled with the present dispute. The demand of the Party now obstructing Her Majesty's Government, is that the Governor, who is responsible to his Sovereign and the British Nation for the welfare of Canada, is with respect to the Government of this country to be a Nonentity, or, in other words, the subservient Tool of any Party that may acquire a temporary ascendancy. To this I could not and never can submit. This was the meaning of the stipulations demanded of me, with which my duty to the Crown rendered compliance impossible.

I shall ever retain, Gentlemen, a grateful sense of your staunch support and kind wishes, and it will be the greatest happiness that I can enjoy during the remainder of my mortal life, if your prayer for my success in promoting concord and prosperity in this important Province be heard with favour at the Throne of Heaven.

Singular Escape of a Child.—While the up-midday train was passing along the North Midland Railway, near the Rotherham station, on Saturday last, a little boy suddenly darted from his father's arms over the side of one of the second class carriages. The train was going at full speed at the time, and it was with difficulty the father could be restrained from leaping out of the carriage, so great was his anxiety to know the fate of his child. The circumstance having been communicated to the guard, he ordered the train to be put back for nearly two miles for that purpose, when strange to say, the poor little fellow was perceived on the embankment, unhurt. On seeing his parent, he laughed and exclaimed, "Father, father, I am not hurt!" It turned out that he had fallen on the verge of the line, and fortunately rolled down the embankment, which thus broke the shock that he must have, perhaps, fatally experienced had he come in sudden contact with the level ground.—(London Pic. Times)

Got it at last!—The ingenuity of man has been wonderfully taxed within a few years, in inventing instructions, destructive of human life, it being contended by some that the more terrible and fatal the instruments of war, the more likely will the people be to cherish the blessings of peace. We are now told by a late Marseilles paper, that M. Daniel Barne, a navigator, 28 years of age, has invented a machine of such effect that, defended by it, towns can no longer be carried by assault. This machine, of which gunpowder forms no part of its composition, would be capable of destroying by an explosion, without noise, all the enemy's troops, at a distance of 1000 yards from the town to be attacked.

The Polish refugees celebrated Easter in Paris at the house of Prince Czartorski. More than five hundred persons were present. Among them were the Belgian ambassador and the Princess de Luze, Count de Ramont, Prince and Princess de Beauvau, &c.

The Rev. Sydney Smith had written another short letter—this time in relation to Mr. Everett's visit to him in Somersetshire, and the comments on it in the United States. He says Mr. E.'s visit lasted only forty-eight hours.

Established Church of Scotland.—(Bartholomew.) The Rev. James Smeaton, A. M., agent for the Schemes of the Church, has been presented by Mr. Dundas of Ararat to the church and parish of Bartholomew, in the Presbytery of Dalkeith, vacant by the translation of the Rev. James Smith to Kelso.—(Scottish Guardian.)

St. Andrew's Church, Bermuda.—We have been informed that Vice Admiral Sir Charles Adam, and Lady Adam have subscribed Ten Pounds each, towards the funds for the erection in this Town, of St. Andrew's Church, in connection with the Established Church of Scotland.—(Royal Gazette, Apr. 9.)

More River Piracy.—We had hoped that our Port was freed from these pests to our foreign Commerce. But yesterday afternoon, as we learn, a boat of the British Ship Douglas, Capt. Brewster, which ship is ready for sea and lying at Tybee, started with Capt. B. and two other Captains, a mate and some men with about eight seamen, handcuffed.

That below the city, about opposite Fig Island, a boat with several men armed, overhauled them, and took from Capt. B. his sea chest. We regret to say that Capt. B. was not prepared to make such resistance as would have brought these outlaws to reason.—(Sav. Rep.)

The Cunard Line.—Three noble Steamships of this line, the Hibernia for Boston, the Acadia for Liverpool, and the Unicorn for Quebec, sailed together on Saturday morning, at 6 o'clock. It was a grand sight and is an astonishing evidence of the rapidity of improvement. Who could have imagined six years ago, that eight steamers, some of them the finest vessels in the world, would have been at such an early period, about the harbour of Halifax. Yet such was the fact on Friday.—(Halifax Times, May 7.)

Confessionary.—The Journeyman Confessioners of London have drawn up a memorial to the Right Honble. W. E. Gladstone, President of the Board of Trade, setting forth the injury to their interests by the importation of confessionary from Halifax, Nova Scotia, at the nominal duty of one penny per lb.—(Ibid.)

The Free Church.—The progress of Dr. Burns in Canada, has not been over satisfactory we presume, in increasing the adherents of the Free Church. It may judge from the accounts of his reception at the various places he has visited, given in the public prints. He has met with more attention from dissenting congregations whose meetings and cha-

pels have been freely opened to him, and whose funds have been more freely bestowed upon him than their ordinary wont, than from the Church of Scotland. In several instances, Church meetings have been called of Members of the Establishment, and Resolutions passed, deprecating his mission, as having the effect of creating division and dissension in the Church. There is one good feature connected with his progress, which is, that he has disavowed all intention of creating division, limiting his design to a solicitation, for aid to the Free Church.

Late Bank Robbery at Annapolis.—We are glad to learn that the parties who carried off the chest belonging to the Bank of Nova Scotia Agency, at Annapolis, have been discovered, and are now in custody. They have made a full confession, and have given up the money, with the exception of the sum of Ten Pounds, which they had expended previously to their apprehension.—(Ibid.)

THE PHILADELPHIA RIOTS.—In this day's impression we have copied from an American paper, an account of the dreadful scenes which took place at Philadelphia last week, since that article was in type, we have received later accounts; by which it appears that the "Native American" party had destroyed 40 houses, two Catholic Chapels, a Catholic Seminary, one of the most valuable Catholic Libraries in the U. States, and the Priest's residence. Upwards of 50 persons were killed & wounded. The first accounts we received, made it appear that the Irishmen were the aggressors—the papers since received tell a very different story—it is now stated, and we believe correctly, that the blame in the first instance rested with the "Native American party" was it any wonder that Irishman's blood was raised, when a party of "Native Americans" assembled in a street solely inhabited by them—and spoke in terms of strong condemnation of their religion and character—in their immediate hearing. Then was it not enough to rouse the Irish, when the same party collected in the same spot with fire arms two days after, and abused them. It is now proved by the accounts which we have seen, that the first fire arms drawn out and used, was by one of the Native Americans, and the first person shot was an Irishman.

The Rev. ROBERT IRVING, of the Free Presbyterian Church in St. John, came passenger in the ship Lady Sale, from Glasgow, which arrived there on Tuesday last.

Large Ox.—Mr. James Healy killed a fat Ox this week, the beef of which weighed eleven hundred and sixty pounds, the rough tallow one hundred and five, and the hide one hundred and fifty—making the total weight 1415 lbs.—The Beef is for sale at the Stall in the Market, and is of an excellent quality.—(Beat this who can!)

Pets of Office.—The Halifax Times says—A Downing Street Circular addressed to the Lieutenant Governor, informs His Excellency that no fees are to be taken in future in any of Her Majesty's Colonial possessions on appointments merely honorary. The Legislative Council of P. E. Island will benefit by this arrangement.

DOMESTIC MANUFACTURE.—Mr. Thomas M. Sime of St. John has commenced the manufacture of Corn brooms, in that city, which are stronger and larger than the American brooms generally imported—besides being cheaper, a great consideration these times. He will accept our thanks for the one sent us which is certainly a good specimen of his manufacture—we trust that he will meet with that encouragement which he merits.

The brig Delaware, arrived at New York last week, from the coast of Africa, with an Ouring Outang, 2 Camellions, and two monkeys of a rare species.

Church and State.—The French Minister of Instruction has directed that Protestant Clergymen, whose congregations are unable to pay for their clerical services, shall be chargeable upon the general ecclesiastical fund. This in a Catholic government is liberal and praiseworthy.

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Tremendous Riot in PHILADELPHIA.

The Pennsylvania of Tuesday, contains the following particulars.—

Yesterday afternoon, a dreadful and disgraceful riot occurred in Kensington. At 4 o'clock, a meeting of the Native American party was held at the corner of Second and Master streets. The meeting was addressed by Mr. S. B. Kramer, Gen. Smith, and L. C. Levin. The rain coming on, it adjourned to the market in the neighbourhood, where Mr. Levin recommenced his discourse; he had not proceeded far before a rush was made on the western side of the market house in consequence of a gun which is said to have been fired across a lot from the vicinity of the Hibernia house; then commenced one of the most dreadful scenes that can well be imagined.

Volley after volley was fired, and a rush was made over a lot in the direction of the Hibernia House house. From every street and house came rushing to the scene of action, armed men—some with muskets, others with bludgeons, and stones; many of these were accompanied by women, who urged them on, and directed them where to fire.—Those in possession of the market house maintained their ground and held aloft the flag—while the squares between Cadwalader street and the German town road in Master street was filled with the combatants. Some of them here ran into houses, but they were watched, and the infuriated mob fell to work and partially destroyed the houses in which they had taken refuge.

In Cadwalader street, a similar frightful scene was presented. The house of a widow woman into which a man ran was attacked, its doors were broken open and the rioters rushed in and broke the furniture into fragments.

The riot lasted about an hour, during which time the reports of fire arms numbered hundreds, and at least 50 persons fell from being wounded. Several persons were reported to have been killed. A young man residing in St. John street, near Beaver named George Shaffer, was killed on the spot instantly.—A young man named Temper was shot in the hip, and was wounded in so shocking a manner, that he cannot possibly survive.

Among the buildings attacked was Hibernia House, the lights of this were all knocked out and the premises otherwise damaged. We believe that the flag was protected by those who had undertaken the venturesome task of protecting it, but what became of it we know not.

The Native American party gradually dispersed and up to a late hour in the evening comparative order prevailed.

1-4 past 12 o'clock.

We learn this moment, that about 10 o'clock an attempt was made by a part of the crowd to burn down the fence which enclosed the nursery. They were fired upon by a party of Irish, and five of them shot. One Nathan Ramsey, a blind maker in Third street, near Brown, was mortally wounded. J. W. Wright, son of Mr. Wright of the firm of Wright & Nephew, salt merchants, who was a silent spectator, was shot through the heart, and fell dead on the spot.

From the Spirit of the Times, May 8.

LATER—MORE RIOTING.

Our city is in a general scene of alarm and confusion—Kensington is the theatre of an unprecedented riot, of conflagration and bloodshed—the fruits of the quarrel between the Native Americans and Irish Catholics. We have only room to continue the account of death and devastation commenced yesterday confining ourselves to the facts as we can gather them without comment.

During the forenoon of yesterday the scene of Monday's disturbance was remarkably quiet for some time and circumstances; most of the poor Irish were leaving their houses and moving what they could of their property. At the corners and in the squares around the battle ground were collected crowds of Native Americans, conversing with much excitement upon the doings of Monday.

About ten o'clock a large party of Native Americans assembled at Second and Master streets, and marched in procession through the district of Kensington, passing the Market House where the fight took place on Monday evening, and last night. In the procession was carried the large flag which had been raised on Monday, and which was considerably torn. Preceding this was a banner borne by one man, and having upon it from this inscription:—"This is the flag that has been trampled upon by the Irish Papists!"

The procession moved down Third street to the heart of the city, and cheered at some of the news paper offices—groaning others.

In the afternoon the natives assembled in Independence Square, numbering from two to three thousand. A meeting was organized, and the crowd was addressed by Mr. C. J. Jack. From thence they proceeded in procession to Kensington, headed by Mr. Jack, and marched to Second and Master streets, then to the Washington street market, where the fight had occurred on Monday. Here they again organized a meeting, and Mr. Jack again mounted the stage to address them. It was then about 5 o'clock P. M.

Immediately after the organization of the meeting a scene of extraordinary riot commenced, and which it is alleged by the parties was commenced, some say, by the Irish—others say by the Natives. Some boys who were in the crowd at the market, commenced throwing stones at the Hibernia house opposite on Cadwalader street. Some exhibitions of a general outbreak were apparent, and in a few moments a volley of

stones and brickbats were thrown by both parties.

The mob then placed the flag up before a house at the N. E. corner of Second and Master, and, after getting a number of muskets, again repaired to the market house, headed by Peter Albright, who had been shot in the hands. They then paraded on the space west and south of the market, exposed to the shots of the Irish in the houses opposite. A general and bloody skirmish now took place.

As soon as the armed men appeared in front of the Irish houses, volley after volley was fired into them, and the fire was returned. This lasted nearly an hour, during which upwards of twenty men of the natives were shot—probably near half that number killed.

One daring fellow named John Taggart, rushed out of a house, and fired several times upon the Natives—it is said, killed two or three men. A rush was made upon him, and he was captured, though fighting like a madman, and just in the act of shooting a fourth gun.

Here the mob attempted to hang him up, but citizens interferred, and after some delay he was carried off to the office of Mayor Cannon, still breathing.

TEN O'CLOCK, P. M. We have just learned that an Irish weaver named Joseph Rice was shot through the head while looking over the fence to see how the riot progressed.

The military arrived on the ground at 8 o'clock, P. M. whose presence had the effect of restoring an almost immediate quiet.

ELEVEN O'CLOCK.—A few guns are being discharged at intervals in Master street. Military in motion, but no rioters discovered.

MINUTE.—All quiet. The military are on the ground. The fires are all extinguished, and the firemen returning home.

At a time when an insidious attempt is made to prostrate Her Majesty's Government in Canada, by an unexampled condition of subservience, which would be tantamount to its overthrow, it is highly satisfactory to observe the public spirit and generous zeal, with which those who rightly appreciate the connection subsisting between this Colony and the British Empire, come forward in support of Her Majesty's Representatives, in their endeavours to maintain this Province in true allegiance to our Gracious Sovereign, and to render it prosperous and happy as an integral portion of Her Majesty's dominions.

The objects of the party who are bent on obstructing the Government, and who are actively engaged in exciting disaffection against me by the most unscrupulous misrepresentations, are now disclosed beyond the probability of misconception. It is manifest that they aim at the following state of things. That the authority of Her Majesty in this Province should be a nullity. That the Governor should be a subservient Tool in the hands of the Executive Council. That the Executive Council should be in reality nominated, not by the Crown, but by the House of Assembly.

The authority of the Crown and of the Legislative Council being thus annihilated, and every balance in the Constitution destroyed, the whole power of the State would be usurped by either the Executive Council, exercising undue interference over the House of Assembly, or by the House of Assembly, exercising unlimited in the Executive Administration. It would be either a despotic and exclusive Oligarchy, or an absolute and exclusive Democracy. This they pretend is the Responsible Government granted to Canada by Her Majesty's Ministers. It is neither the one or the other. The British Constitution is a limited Monarchy or a balance of the Monarchical Aristocratic and Democratic powers, without the exclusive ascendancy of either, the work of ages, progressively formed, to suit the gradual changes in the social relations of the community—and the Constitution granted to Canada, is the same as far as the same can be practically carried into operation in a colony.

This Constitution as established by the arrangements of Lord Sydenham, and by the resolutions of September 1841, I am using, and shall continue to use, my anxious endeavors to work through responsible heads of departments, for the benefit and contentment of the people of Canada, with the advice and co-operation of an Executive Council which will, I trust, obtain the confidence of the Provincial Parliament; and if this cannot be done successfully, the blame will be due to those who in the pursuit of embroiled power have sought to destroy the Constitution which they pretend to uphold, and are doing their utmost to obstruct the formation of any Responsible Government, while their unfounded outcry is, that it is intentionally avoided.

Many probably give their support to this party under an honest belief that there is reluctance on my part to consult the Executive Council. This is entirely an error. With any Council that seeks the good of the country and does not strive to degrade the office of Governor to the condition of a mere Party Tool, it is my inclination, as well as my duty and my practice, to consult on all subjects. No Governor could dream of administering the government of this Province, without constant consultation with his Council.

Every Governor must be sensible of the advantage that he would derive from the aid, advice, and information of Councilors and Heads of Departments, in whom he can place confidence. But that is not the question at issue. If it were, or if it had been,

the country would not have been troubled with the present dispute. The demand of the Party now obstructing Her Majesty's Government, is that the Governor, who is responsible to his Sovereign and the British Nation for the welfare of Canada, is with respect to the Government of this country to be a Nonentity, or in other words the subservient Tool of any Party that may acquire a temporary ascendancy. To this I could not and never can submit. This was the meaning of the stipulations demanded of me, with which my duty to the Crown rendered compliance impossible.

I shall ever retain, Gentlemen, a grateful sense of your staunch support and kind wishes, and it will be the greatest happiness that I can enjoy during the remainder of my mortal life, if your prayer for my success in promoting concord and prosperity in this important Province be heard with favour at the Throne of Heaven.

Singular Escape of a Child.—While the up midday train was passing along the North Midland Railway, near the Rotherham station, on Saturday last, a little boy suddenly darted from his father's arms over the side of one of the second class carriages. The train was going at full speed at the time, and it was with difficulty the father could be restrained from leaping out of the carriage, so great was his anxiety to know the fate of his child. The circumstance having been communicated to the guard, he ordered the train to be put back for nearly two miles for that purpose, when, strange to say, the poor little fellow was perceived on the embankment, unharmed. On seeing his parent, he laughed and exclaimed, "Father, father, I am not hurt!"—It turned out that he had fallen on the verge of the line, and fortunately rolled down the embankment, which thus broke the shock that he must have, perhaps, fatally experienced had he come in sudden contact with the level ground.—[London Pic. Times.

GO IT AT LAST!—The ingenuity of man has been wonderfully taxed within a few years, in inventing instructions, destructive of human life, it being contended by some that the more terrible and fatal the instruments of war, the more likely will the people be to cherish the blessings of peace. We are now told by a late *Marseilles* paper, that M. Daniel Borne, a navigator, 28 years of age, has invented a machine of such effect that, defended by it, towns can no longer be carried by assault. This machine, of which gunpowder forms no part of its composition, would be capable of destroying by an explosion, without noise, all the enemy's troops, at a distance of 1000 yards from the town to be attacked.

The Polish refugees celebrated Easter in Paris at the house of Prince Czartorski. More than five hundred persons were present. Among them were the Belgian ambassador and the Princess de Ligne, Count de Rambois, Baron and Baroness Desmechies, Prince and Princess de Beauveau, &c.

The Rev. Sydney Smith had written another short letter to the time in relation to Mr. Everett's visit to him in Somersetshire, and the comments on it in the *United States*. He says Mr. E.'s visit lasted only forty-eight hours.

Established Church of Scotland.—Borthwick.—The Rev. James Souter, A. M., agent for the Schemes of the Church, has been presented by Mr. Dundas of Arnishton to the church and parish of Borthwick, in the Presbytery of Dalkeith, vacant by the translation of the Rev. James Smith to Kelso.—*Scottish Guardian*.

St. Andrew's Church, Bermuda.—We have been informed that Vice Admiral Sir Charles Adam, and Lady Adam have subscribed Ten Pounds *stg.*, towards the funds for the erection in this Town of St. Andrew's Church, in connection with the Established Church of Scotland.—*Royal Gazette*, Apr. 9.

Mare River Piracy.—We had hoped that our Port was freed from these pests to our foreign Commerce. But yesterday afternoon, we saw a boat of the British Ship *Douglas*, Capt. Brewster, which ship is ready for sea and lying at Tybee, started with Capt. B. and two other Captains, a mate and some seamen with about eight men, handcuffed. That below the city, about opposite Fig Island, a boat with several men armed, overhauled them, and took from Capt. B. his seamen. We regret to say that Capt. B. was not prepared to make such resistance as would have brought these outlaws to reason.—*Sav. Rep.*

THE CUNARD LINE.—Three noble Steamships of this line, the *Hibernia* for Boston, the *Aecidia* for Liverpool, and the *Unicorn* for Quebec, sailed together on Saturday morning, at 6 o'clock. It was a grand sight and is an astonishing evidence of the rapidity of improvement. Who could have imagined six years ago, that eight steamers, some of them the finest vessels in the world, would have been at such an early period, afloat in the harbour of Halifax. Yet such was the fact on Friday.—*Halifax Times*, May 7.

CONFECTIONARY.—The Journeymen Confectioners of London have drawn up a memorial to the Right Honble. W. E. Gladstone, President of the Board of Trade, setting forth the injury to their interests by the importation of confectionery from Halifax, Nova Scotia, at the nominal duty of one penny per lb.—*Ibid*.

THE FREE CHURCH.—The progress of Dr. Burns in Canada, has not been over satisfactory we presume, in increasing the adherents of the Free Church. It may judge from the accounts of his reception at the various places he has visited, given in the public prints. He has met with more attention from dissenting congregations whose meetings and cha-

pels have been freely opened to him, and whose funds have been more freely bestowed upon him than their ordinary wont, than from the Church of Scotland. In several instances, Church meetings have been called of Members of the Establishment, and Resolutions passed, deprecating his mission, as having the effect of creating division and dissension in the Church. There is one good feature connected with his progress, which is, that he has disavowed all intention of creating division, limiting his design to a solicitation, for aid to the Free Church.

Late Bank Robbery at Annapolis.—We are glad to learn that the parties who carried off the chest belonging to the Bank of Nova Scotia Agency, at Annapolis, have been discovered, and are now in custody. They have made a full confession, and have given up the money, with the exception of the sum of Ten Pounds, which they had expended previously to their apprehension.—*Id*.

THE PHILADELPHIA RIOTS.—In this days impression we have copied from an American paper, an account of the dreadful scenes which took place at Philadelphia last week; since that article was in type, we have received later accounts; by which it appears that the "Native American" party had destroyed 40 houses, two Catholic Chapels, a Catholic Seminary, one of the most valuable Catholic Libraries in the U. States, & the Priest's residence. Upwards of 50 persons were killed & wounded. The first accounts we received, made it appear that the Irishmen were the aggressors—the papers since received tell a very different story—it is now stated, and we believe correctly, that the blame in the first instance rested with the "Native American party" was it any wonder that Irishman's blood was raised, when a party of "native Americans" assembled in a street solely inhabited by them—and spoke in terms of strong condemnation of their religion and character—in their immediate hearing. Then was it not enough to rouse the Irish, when the same party collected in the same spot with fire arms two days after, and abused them. It is now proved by the accounts which we have seen, that the first fire arms drawn out and used, was by one of the Native Americans, and the first person shot was an Irishman.
