THE FULLERAL CAL.

The railway carriage, in which the body was conveyed from Wolverton to Windsor, was lined with purple velvet. In it was suspended a large wreath, bearing the letters "A. C." in silver. In accordance with the wish that no public or military procession be held in London, the railway officials made arrangements to convey the body to Windsor without transhipping it at London. This was done by means of a branch line connecting the Great Eastern and Soutwestern Railways in the outskirts of the city, and consequently the people of London had no opportunity of showing their respect and sympathy by marching in

ARRIVAL OF THE TRAIN.

At 3:30 the train bearing the remains came into the station. On it were the Prince and Princess of Wales. Another train, which followed immediately after the funeral train, conveyed the members of the Prince of Wales' household at Sandrigham. The coffin was taken on the shoulders of men from the Tenth Hussars. It was enwrapped in a silken Union Jack, and on it was a single splendid wreath which had he enter the theory of the words, "A mark of the tenderest affection and love from your devoted, loving and sorrowing grandmother."

As the detachment of soldiers bearing the coffin walked slowly along the platform a signal was given to a party of the Life Guards on the round tower of the castle, and immediately the boom of minute guns could be heard. The Life Guards had the right of the line, and were followed by the bands which played Chopin's and Beethoven's funeral marches alternately. A detachment of the Tenth Hussars and of the Horse Artillery immediately preceded the gun carriage upon which the remains had been placed. On each side of the gun carriage walked guards of officers of the Tenth Hussars. The charger which had been radden by the Duke of Clarence, saddied and bridled, and with the boots of its owner reversed in the stirrups, was led directly after the gun carriage. directly after the gun carriage.

When the heavily-draped gun carriage arrived opposite the door of the chapel the coffin-bearers from the Hussars stepped from the ranks quickly lifted their burden to their shoulders, and with bared and bowed heads passed into the chapel. ### "He Was Good to the Poor"

Funeral of the Late Cardinal Manning

Witnessed by an Immense Concourse of Sincere Mourners.

The Working People Turn Gut in The ands—Royalty Represented—The Remains Laid in Kensall Green Cemetery.

London, Jan. 21.—London saw a funeral to-day with less pomp perhaps than that of the Duke of Clarence, but with no less accompaniment of genuine sorrow. No labored culcy is needed to impress upon the hearts of the populace the virtues of Cardinal Manning, nor to remind the people of what they have lost in losing him. Fully 50,000 persons visited the Brompton Oratory yesterday to gaze upon the features of the deceased prelate. The offices for the dead were recited during the afternoon by a corpse of 200 priests. The oratory was superbly drapsed, and the seene was a most solemn one. There was an immense concurse of people on the occasion of the funeral procession from the oratory to the cemetery. The Queen and the Prince of Wales arranged to be specially represented and seats of honor were reserved in their names.

The FINERAL.

The funeral services were held in the Brompton Oratory to-day. Admission to the oratory was by ticket only, for it would have been utterly impossible for the structure to contain a hundredth part of the vast crowd who were desirous of paying a last token of respect to the dead prelate. Notwithstanding the miserable weather conditions prevailing—the city being shrouded by fog which seemed to penetrate with ischilliness and dampness through the heaviest clothing—the crowd began to gather in the vicinity of the cratory at an early hour. It was composed largely of workingmen and their families, and on every side could be heard expressions of love for the man who had devoted so much time and talent to bring about a betterment in their condition, and who having fought the good fight had gone to his reward. "He was good to the poor," people were heard to exclaim. Hundreds of times was this repeated through the vast crowd, many of the members of which had a personal knowledge of kindness of heart of the dead Cardinal which had taken in people of all religion.

BUILDINGS BURNED.

Disastrous Fires in Montreal-Loss Over

Montreal, Jan. 21.—Last night a fire broke out in the stone building at the corner of Victoria Square and Craig street, occupied by Mill & McDougall, wholesale woolens; A. M. Fisher & Sons, importers, and Evans, Sons & Mason, coal and wood merohants. The fire did damage amounting to \$150,000. The brigades from eleven stations responded and played fifteen streams on the flames. It had gained too great a headway, and nothing could be done but to save the adjoining property. It lasted till midnight. The firemen were handicapped by the telegraph and telephone wires, which came to the ground with the weight of ice formed in the intense cold. Feeding Poultry in Winter.

In the morning give the fowls a warm breakfast, prepared the evening previous by cutting up a bucketful of clover hay in half-inch lengths, using a cutter made for the purpose. To this cut hay add one quarr of cornmeal and two quarts of bran; scald with boiling water and let it stand over night, covered with a piece of old carpet of begging. Before feeding it in the morning stir the whole mass thoroughly together and while it is warm place it in the feed troughs. At first they eat sparingly of it, but in a few days they will clean it all un nicely and very quickly. After this feed they will sing merrily and be very happy, and a little later their crooning song is changed to the staccato cackle which announces the much coveted eggs. At filmes time two quarts of wheat may be scattered among the litter, and the fowls will scramble in great confusion for it. They scratch and pick among the chaff, obtaining the exercise needed to prevent storing up fat, which is to be always avoided as are arm to a many terms. pick among the chaff, obtaining the exercise needed to prevent storing up fat, which is to be always avoided as an enemy to egg production. In the evening, before they go to their roosts, give them a feed of whose corn, which furnishes employment to their digestive machinery during the night, and supplies the needed heat while inactive. This promotes a comfortable night's rest, which poultry need as well as man.

Twice a week change the morning feed. Omit the cut clover hay, and give them a warm mess composed of mashed belief pota-

Feeding Poultry in Winter.

Omit the cut clover hay, and give them a warm mess composed of mashed boiled potatoss, turnips, beef scraps and dissolved pork cracklings, some corn meal and wheat bran, all thoroughly mixed and fed warm (not hot). This supplies the variety necessary to health. The beef scraps and pork cracklings supply animal food in place of the worms and bugs they get while at liberty. Occasionally give them corn and oats ground together in the place of pure corn meal.

Frozen Ergs.

In the winter season quantities of eggs are frozen, and it is generally considered that such eggs are worth but little, or, to say the least, are much injured for cooking purposes. This, however, is not strictly true, for if properly treated they are but little injured. Instead of (as was the custom) putting them into cold water to take out the frost and waiting several hours for the thawing to take place, and then finding the yolks in such a solid state that they can be used with no satisfaction in cooking, try the following method: Place them in boiling water and leave them there for from five to twenty minutes, according to the amount of frost in them, when, upon being opened, the yolks will be found soft and in such a state that they can be used for almost any culinary purpose.



When the so-called bill of particulars in the London election case was published in Nevember last, every person who knew anything about the manner in which the campaign had been conducted by the friends of Mr. Hyman reached the conclusion that is contained gross libels. It was freely conceded, even by Conservatives who had hitherto been opposed to Mr. Hyman, that the "particulars" were in many regards a disgrace to the men responsible for their compilation, and wonder was expressed that Messrs. Meredith and Joseph Judd should have accepted the views of the bosses that all sorts of charges should be made against many of the best citizens of London, no matter though it could readily have been ascertained that they had no founds tion. There was the charge, for example, that Mr. Frank E. Leonard, manufacturer, had intimidated the liquor dealers, presumably because some time after the election he was appointed a license commissioner. This charge could only have been put in the particulars to bring Mr. Leonard into disrepute among his fellow-citizens, because there could not be even a shadow of proof that it had any foundation. Then there was the accusation that Mr. John W. Little, wholesale merchant, had bribed Mr. Dufton, manufacturer. As Mr. Little proved in the witness box-and no attempt was made to rebut his testimony-this charge was a villainous slander, Mr. Little not having spoken to or had any dealings with Mr. Dufton for some years before the date of the accusation.

It is difficult to fix the responsibility for such character-stabbing as was indulged in, because the attorneys who prepared these documents take refuge behind their professional privileges. But when the London Free Press printed and commented upor the libelous document, a number of representative citizens resolved that it should go no further. They promptly decided to bring the offender to book, and an action for libel was entered. The plaintiffs willingly agreed to have the case held over till after the election trial, not because they had any fears of the results of an appeal for justice to their fellow-citizens, but in order that the men originally responsible for the libel might have opportunity to do their worst, as they had threatened to do.

The 41st annual report of the Board of Managers of the St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was submitted last night at the yearly congregational meeting of the church. The church basement held a large gathering, over which the pastor, Rev. J. A. Murray, presided. The report, signed by Jas. McSween, chairman, and Alex. McIntosh, secretary-treasurer, was read as follows:

In comparing the year 1890 with 1891, there is a slight deficiency in 1891 of \$202 63. The collections are about the usual sum. The financial statement for the year has been drawn up, and will show the total amount of receipts and disbursements, leaving a balance in hand of \$184 98.

Regarding the election of managers, in order that a judicious selection be made, the Board recommends the appointment of a nominating committee, composed of two managers, not retiring, named by the chairman of the Board, and three persons chosen by the congregation at its annual meeting (five in sill) the duty of which will be to nominate suitable persons for election, and report back to congregational meeting for its adoption or amendment. And in the event of a greater number of names being nominated by the said committee than the required number to fill the places of the retiring members, a ballot to be taken.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last annual meeting, the managers were authorized to borrow \$3,000 by a note, and pay off the large note and several small ones due by the congregation. The money was raised and notes paid off, consolidating the debt at \$2,200.

At a joint meeting of the Session and Board of Management it was agreed that an assistant be given Mr. Murray for the summer months of 1891. Mr. J. S. Scott, a Knox College student, was engaged, and preached and worked very acceptably from June 1 to Sept. 15.

The system of granting rallway charters requires amending, and attention will have to be paid to protect the public from railway monopolies. The public lands should be reserved for actual settlers. Not another acre should be given to railways. While the church is entitled to entire freedom in its own domain, I will oppose the granting to any creed or nationality of privileges not equally enjoyed by all. I believe in complete separation of. Church and State, and will defend to the utmost the rights and privileges that have been handed down to us by our forefathers. A simpler and less expensive method than the present system of preparing the voteralists is desirable, and the principle of one man one vote and the purity of elections I would heartily support. If elected I will support all good measures that may come before the House, independent of party considerable portion of my lite, I can well understand and appreciate the requirements of a farming community, and should the electors of this riding confide their trust in me by securing my return as their representative the interests of the electors of the Dominion, whenever petitioned for the question of prohibition of the liquor traffic or other matters of vital importance to the country.



Warm Water in Winter.

Professor Roberts, of Cornell University, claims that warm water at a very low expense saved him 14 per cent. of the food fed to his dairy cow. John Boyd, of Chicago, tells us that it increased his cow's milk flow 25 per cent, to warm her up to blood heat. Professor Shelton, of the State Agricultural college, says that it saves 12 per cent. of the food to warm the water for his cows. H. C. Adams, superintendent Wisconsin Institute, says that in his experience it has increased his flow at least 25 per cent.

He turther says a cow will not drink all she needs when the water is extremely cold, and she will suffer in digestive processes because she doesn't do it. The first winter he gave his cows warm water they shed their costs along in February, and came out in May as sleek and smooth and looked as nicely as they ordinarily did before in the latter part of June. The large quantities of water which they drank seemed to wash out all the channels of their circulation, and kept them healthy and vigorious and thrifty.
