LONDON, April 18.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. James Shanks, lord mayor of Dublin, and W. J. lord mayor of Dublin, and W. J.
Doherty, high sheriif of Dublin, appeared
at the bar in their robes of office, and presented a petition from the corporation of
Dublin in favor of the bill to establish
home rule in Ireland. The distinguished
petitioners were received with the honors
due to their station, the corporations of
London and Dublin having the right to
petition Parliament without the intervention of a member of Parliament.

How Emin Died. How Emin Died.

BERLIN, April 18 .- Herr Eugen Wolff, the well-known African correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt, has sent from Kam the Berlin Tageblatt, has sent from Kampala, Uganda, a report which confirms the tumors of Emin Pasha's death. Herr Wolf met in Kavirondo an Egyptian official named Awad Eflendi, who served under Emin in the Equatorial Province, and also stayed with him for some time at Masamboni on his last expedition. In the diary of Awad Eflendi Herr Wolff found

diary of Awad Effendi Herr Wolff found notes to the following effect:

On March 9 last year Emin marched off with several Manyemas in the direction of the Congo. On that day Awad Effendi left Emin in order to return to Kampala. On his way Awad stayed for 28 days with Kitunzi, a native chief. On April 1 Awad received news that several Manyemas who bought ivory at Masamboni had related that Emin Pasha with all his people had been killed by the Manyema tribes, led by a certain Ismail. The murder had taken place on Ituri River, about two days' march distant from Masamboni, on the 12th or 13th of March, last year.

Incessant Earthquake Shocks.

ATHENS, April 18. -Incessant earthquake shocks were felt at Zante throughout last night. The island shook continuously, and the panic-stricken people were in momentary dread of the ground opening and swallow-ing them. The condition of the sick and aged is pitiable. The weather, however, is pleasant and much sufering is thus escaped. The heavy shock yeaterday morning that caused such devastation in the island lasted for 25 seconds. The motion of the earth was from east to west, and the ground swung back and forth like a slowly-moving pendulum. Many people in the streets were thrown violently to the ground. It is estimated that there are only 200 houses remaining that are fit to be inhabited. Many of the structures standing are in momentary danger of falling, and will have to be pulled down.

The Dowager Duchess of Sutherland Sent to Prison!

LONDON, April 18 .- The Dowager Duchess of Sutherland was sent to Holloway Prison to-day, under a sentence of imprisonment for six weeks imposed by Sir Francis Jeune, president of the Court of Probate, for contempt of court. The imprisonment of a

tempt of court. The imprisonment of a British duchess in a common jail is probably upprecedented in England.

The late duke died last year, leaving a will highly favorable to the duchess. This will was contested by the present duke, and the proceedings have been carried on with much bitterness. On Saturday last in the Court of Probate, before Sir Francis Jenne, the counsel for the present duke asked that a writ of attachment should be issued against the dowager duchess on the ground that having obtained an order to inspect certain papers she had deliberately placed in the fire a document which under the order she was permitted to inspect. Justice Jenne stopped the order of inspection and directed that the dowager duchess must make answer to the charge to-day.

When the case came up to-day an affidavit was presented in behalf of the duchess setting forth that the document which she had burned was a private letter written to her by her late husband before marriage; that she had not thought it any harm to destroy a document of that harm to destroy a document of that character; and she closed by offering an

The court said it was evident the destruction of the document had been deliberately planned and that it was effected by violence and deceit. Since the injury and wrong were now irreparable, an apology could only be regarded as a somewhat easy method of atonement. Further, it had been shown that when the duchess destroyed the letter she said it was a letter from her to the late duke. Now she said it was a private letter from the late duke to her. Justice Jeune added that he was unable to say which statement was true, but the action of the dowager duchess had destroyed the possibility of believing her. Justice Jeune then imposed the sentence of imprisonment and also fined the duchess £250.

Belgium to Have Universal Suffrage. BRUSSELS, April 18 -The Chamber of Representatives reassembled after the preparation of the reports on the revision of the constitution, and by a vote of 119 against 12, with 14 abstentions from voting. adopted universal suffrage, with a provision

adopted universal suffrage, with a provision for plural voting by the classes owning property according to the amount and situation of the property.

Cheers within the Chamber were followed by prodigious acclamation from the enormous crowd that awaited the result of the voting outside the Chamber. The greatest enthusiasm was displayed everywhere, and the people joined in a jubilee in honor of the great triumph which they had achieved.

It is expected that the decision in favor of universal suffrage will have an allaying effect upon the popular excitement and agitation, which had been rapidly assuming the dimensions of a general insur-

The Home Rule Debate.

LONDON, April 18 .-- In the House of Commons to-day the debate on the second reading of the Home Rule Bill was re sumed. Lord Randolph Churchill declared that the crucial test of the bill was the provision for the unimpaired supremacy of the Imperial Parliament, which, he said, was rendered impotent by its being de-prived of all control of the Irish executive and control of the vote of sup-ply for raising taxes. The bill, Lord Randolph concluded, was a mass of blunders. The instinct of self-preservation forbade The instinct of sell-preservation rule while offering to Ireland every just concession. When the controversy has passed the political atmosphere would be clearer, and Irish home rule would become a mere

and frish home rule would become a mere recollection.

Mr. Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, replied to Lord Randolph Churchill. The Opposition had answered arguments for the Home Rule Bill, he said, almost exclusively with prophecies. To all these predictions of evil there was one adequate reply—"I do not believe you." No safeguards within the compass of human ingenuity would suffice to restrain the evils which the imaginations of the Opposition had conjured up. Much had been said about Liberal hopes. He could not perceive why Liberal hopes were not at least as substantial as Unionist fears. (Cheers.) 

Everyone knows that the common steam engine is a very uneconomical machine, rarely utilizing more than 5 per cent, of the energy of the fuel spent upon it, and the same thing must be said of the common incandescent electric lamp, as it gives back in light generally less than 5 per cent, of the energy spent in it—a loss of ever 95 per cent, of the original energy. It is evident that here is a great field for improvement. Whatever waves are given out by a lamp either too long or too short to affect the eye are so far wasteful in the production of light. That high temperature is not essential for luminousness is evident from glow-worms, fireflies, the phosphorescent light on decaying stumps and the luminous streamers in the wake of large meteors, where the temperature must often be many degrees below zero. engine is a very uneconomical machine,

Flies are the agents of propagation of a large number of contagious maladies large number of contagious maladies Persons are very often inoculated with carbuncle by flies. Some experiments of Cornil have demonstrated that they can carry the bacillus of tuberculosis. Dead flies, when dissected, often contain bacilli which have been absorbed from the spittle of consumptives, and these bacilli preserve their virulence. Dissemination of the germs of yellow fever has also been attributed to flies. Some recent experiments of Mr. Simmondi, of Hamburg, prove that flies, during a cholera epidemic, may be a dangerous factor in the spread of the malady, when they alight on food which, like soup, milk, sauces, are an excellent medium of culture for the comma bacillus. Mr. Simmondi took nine flies from the recently opened intestines of a patient who had died from cholera, and put them in a large bottle in which they could fly about. In from 5 to 45 minutes each of the flies was put in a tube containing liquefied gelatine, which, after being shaken, was emptied on a saucer. In 48 hours all the saucers were covered with abundant colonies of the comma bacillus. In another experiment, six flies were placed under a glass, with a fragment of a cholera patient's intestine, and afterwards in a large vase, where they remained for an hour and a half. Then each of them was put in a tube of gelatine. When the gelatine was poured out on saucers, it gave birth to innumerable colonies of the comma bacillus.



WAR VS. HUMANITY.

A correspondent of the New York Herald, who has been investigating the matter, states that five leading powers of Europe have locked up over six and a half hillion francs for war purposes. Germany inaugurated the movement for the establishment of these enormous war funds and how has ever a billion and a half in receive. Fra ce has two billion, Russia over wo billion and a half, while even Austria and Italy have immenae sums in the funds dedicated to the prosecution of future wars.

### CLEAN UP!

Necessity for Having the City in Cleanly Condition.

The General Health of the Community is Good, but Some Streets and Back Premises Are Filthy—An Early House-to-House Inspection Ordered.

The local Board of Health are doubtless impressed with the idea that Canada may possibly be visited by the cholera this year, possibly be visited by the cholera this year, and in view of such a contingency they intend to be well prepared to deal with the scourge. At last night's meeting the principal topic discussed was the means for the proper cleaning up of the city, and steps were taken in that direction. There were present: Aid, John Heaman (chairman), Parnell, Stevely and Scarrow. Mr.

steps were taken in that direction. There were present: Ald, John Heaman (chairman), Parnell, Stevely and Scarrow, Mr. Wm. Skinner, Inspector Bell, Secretary Bell, Medical Health Officer Hutchinson, and Drs. English and Gardiner.

The medical health officer presented his report on the sanitary condition of the city, which as regards the health of the city was excellent. The report complained of the dumping of refuse matter on Grosvenor and Carling streets and recommended that sanitary inspectors be appointed to give the city a thorough inspection. The report also recommended that any person who refused to take immediate action be punished according to law, and also that all private wells in use be cleaned out before June 1 of each year. There was a bylaw against the dumping of garbage on the public streets. The report was filed for reference.

Ald. Parnell moved and Dr. Gardiner seconded that the matter be referred to the police commissioners, with a request that they instruct the shirt of reclises that they instruct the shirt of reclises that they instruct the shirt of reclines.

the police commissioners, with a request that they instruct the chief of police to enforce the bylaw.

Ald. Parnell moved that the estimates of Ald. Parnell moved that the estimates of the board for \$2,000 be itemized, as based on last year's figures, and submitted for the information of the council, so that that body will understand why they re-quire the amount. Carried. Dr. Gardiner soid that the board had a right to be granted whatever they asked, and if the council wished to reduce the estimates they should meet the board in a friendly manner for that purpose.

Mrs. Mawhinney complained of a closet being too close to one of her houses, and causing much sickness. The health officer will examine the property and order the removal of the nuisance.

The complaint of Mr. Justin re improper condition of drain on Maple street, was also left with the health officer to report back to the board.

A. D. Rodgers complained of the improper condition of the cellar of a building owned by Mr. A. Smith and occupied by Rowat, McMahon & Granger. There was about three inches of fungus matter and slime on the wall, and it was a hot bed for cholera. Referred to the health officer.

The engineer reported on the improper condition of a lane running between King and York, in the rear of the Richmond street stores, and also of a similar thorough.

and York, in the rear of the Kichmond street stores, and also of a similar thorough-fare at the rear of the Hobbs Hardware Company. It was recommended that the lanes be block-paved at the expense of the property-holders.

Ald. Stevely enlightened the committee on the state of affairs, and the matter was referred to the inspector to have the lane cleaned.

CYCLONE IN KANSAS.

Seven Persons Killed and a Large Number Injured.

Little Rock, Ark., April 18.—News was received here to-day of a fearful cyclone in Fourche valley, Scott county. The town of Boles was almost entirely destroyed. Several persons were killed and a large number injured.

The path of the storm was half a mile in width and everything was swept before it. The bodies of a number of the killed were carried over half a mile by the storm. At least seven persons were killed, and the number may be much larger.

A deputation representative of the Dominion Grange waited upon the Government on Thursday evening and presented a memorial which was drafted at the last annual meeting of the organization in Toronto, and which embodies a number of reronto, and which embodies a number of requests for legislative and executive action in the interest particularly of the agricultural community. The deputation was composed of Peter Hopinstall, master, Fordwich; Robert Wilkie, secretary, and Henry Glendinning, Manilla, and Jabel Robinson, Middlemarch, members of the executive committee. The memorial reads:

Executive Action Promised.

'To the Honorable Sir Oliver Mowat and the Government of Ontario: Government of Ontario:

"Gentlemen,—The petition of the undersigned executive committee, by direction
of the annual meeting of the Dominion
Grange, recently held in this city, humbly
showeth.

showethe "That a strong feeling prevails in many

"That a strong feeling prevaits in many parts of Ontario in favor of some measure for reducing the number of members in the county councils.

"We were plessed to learn last session that your honorable body had prepared a bill for this purpose, but regret that it did not become law.

"The Grange has petitioned for some

not become law.

"The Grange has petitioned for some change in this direction on several occasions, and has suggested a plan by which this subject might be accomplished in former years. We admit that there has been some objections raised to it, but we have hear? former years. We admit that there has been some objections raised to it, but we have heard of none which is entirely unobjectionable, and in the absence of any better method we ask that it become law. We ask that the rudiments of sgriculture be taught in the rural schools as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made satisfactory for this purpose.

"We ask that the game laws be so amended as to allow the rabbit known as the 'cotton tail rabit' to be destroyed at all

amended as to allow the rabbit known as the cotton tail rabit to be destroyed at all seasons of the year, as it is an animal very destructive to shrubs and fruit trees; and that the killing of quail be entirely prohibited at any time, as it is one of the farmer's best friends for destroying insects and picking the seeds of foul weeds, while it is perfectly harmless to the crops.

"Bicycle riding has become very common and great speed has been attained by them, and in consequence of their unique appearance and rapid motion they are objects of terror to the most horses, and innumerable accidents are caused every year by

of terror to the most horses, and insumerable accidents are caused every year by frightening horses and causing runaways and danger and damage to life and limb, while the bicyclist glides away with lightning-like rapidity, and dissappears without recognition.

"As they are of less use and more dangerous than the traction engine, the driving of which is regulated by statute, we ask that some means be taken to prevent them from causing so much danger to life and property.

property. "That chapter 30 of the Consolidated

property.

"That chapter 30 of the Consolidated Statutes of Ontario for 1892, entitled, 'The Workman's Compensation for Injuries Act for 1892,' be amended by adding the follow-lowing words after the word 'act' in subsection 2 of section 2: 'Save and except where such employes shall have been engaged in the ordinary work of the agriculturist, including husbandmen, gardeners and fruit growers,' and that sub-section 3 of section 2 be amended by striking out in the third line thereof the words 'servants of husbandry.'

"Our attention having been called to the necessity of the Government giving assistance for the development of the mineral wealth of our Province, we have considered the matter, and come to the conclusion that it would be of advantage to us as a class for the Government to grant some assistance toward the establishment of a custom smelter at some point in the Sudhury district for the treatment of nickel ore, subject to such conditions as will insure the establishing of it for the purpose for which

trict for the treatment of nickel ore, subject to such conditions as will finure the continuation of it for the purpose for which it was established at fair and just rates, as we believe it would lead to a great increase in the population of that district, and create a market for much of the farm produce raised in other parts of the country.

"A grievance has been brought to our notice from the country of Elgin, where it seems the members of the country council from the eastern and western portions of the country united in making their high school grant to do an injustice to the central portion of the country. Your petitioners refrain from making any recommencentral portion of the county. Your petitioners refrain from making any recommendation as to the changes in the law, lest it might be prejudicial to some other portion of the country, but we respectfully ask the consideration of the honorable Minister of Education of this matter, that some change may be made if possible to prevent a repetition of the injustice."

Mr. Mowat, in reply, said that the Government had listened to the representations made with a great deal of interest. The suggestions made were important, and he

suggestions made were important, and he believed that in regard to some of them the Government would be able at an early day to take action.

Problems Solved by Canada, it not for the selfish firebrands who wish to make money, or secure votes, or obtain popularity, or place, or power, by fanning the embers of traditional hate. Catholies and Protestants would live together as the best of neighbors in Ontario. We have solved the Indian problem in the Northwest. Our dusky wards are well cared for, and many of them will soon be fairly well civilized. We solved the church and state problem in Ontario. We had two established and endowed churches not long ago. Now we have none, and nobedy wants one. It may take 100 years to bring about the Now we have none, and nobody wants one. It may take 100 years to bring about the same state of affairs in England. The Presbyterians of the Dominion solved the union problem eighteen years ago. It may take 1,800 years to unite the Presbyterians of Scotland. Webber Company, all in New York; the Jones Stoltz Company and the Taylor Company, in New York; the Jones Stoltz Company and the Taylor Company, in New York; the Jones Stoltz Company and the Taylor Company, in Brooklyn, and the Morris Manufacturing Company and Flood & Co., in Newark. These firms together represent a capital of \$10,000,000. They do most of the casket and coffin making that is done in the State. They want to do it all, and it is their effort to crush other manufacturers who won't come in with them. Already the coffin trust has driven most of its rivals out of business. There are not more than eight or ten manufacturers in the State which have not been forced to terms. The six which now offer the boldest front are the Asbestos, Lake City, Bristol, Oswego, Owego and Woodruff & Co., of Oswego. These are not united, and the capital which they could control is insignificant compared to the \$10,000,000 of the coffin trust. They are unable to protect themselves or the undertakers who are not in the Undertakers' Association. They have thus far refused the offers which the trust has held out.
