Business in Barcelona.

A Conspiracy Discovered—The Theater Explosion Avenged the Death

BARCKLONA, Spain, Dec. 20. - The police ave traced the connection between the BARCKLONA, Spain, Dec. 20.— The police have traced the connection between the attempt of the Anarchist Pallas to assassinate Gen. Martinez de Campos and the dynamite outrage at the Lyceum Theater. Pallas, who was shot to death on Mont Juich prophesied that his memory would be avenged, and it has now been established that a number of his comrades attempted to make his words come true. Pallas claimed that he alone was responsible for the attempt on the life of Gen. De Campos, but the police havereasen to believe that the attempted assassination was the outcome of a widespread conspiracy. It is stated that five of the six Pollas confederates are now under arrest, Folias confederates are now under arrest, and every effort is being made to capture the sixth man. Jose Codina, the Anarchiat who, subsequent to his arrest, confessed that he had thrown the ab that caused such heavy loss of life in

the Lyceum Theater, has given the police information that, it is hoped, will lead to the arrest of more Anarchists. information that, it is hoped, will lead to the arrest of more Anarchists.

The police have definetely ascertained that the bomb thrown in the Lyceum Theater was hurled from the top gallery. On the night of the outrage a second bomb, which had not exploded, was found beneath one of the seats in the lower part of the theater. It has been ascertained that the bomb was placed there by an Anarchist, who left the theater before the bomb thrown by Codina exploded. All the prisoners will be tried by court martial. The alarm caused by the Lyceum explosion has resulted disastronsly to the theatrical business. A majority of theaters have been compelled to close. Never before have the Anarchists succeeded in inaugurating such a reign of terror as now prevails here, and trade and industry are paralyzed, and it is feared a number of houses will fail.

They also asked him if he knew anybody who would keep the horse for the anybody who would keep the horse for the winter for its feed. Butcher agreed to keep it till morning for them. Monday they took the rig away and sold it to a butcher named Lawry, on Parliament street. Before they left they made an appointment to meet Butcher at the Ontario brewery, King street, where they would remunerate him for his services. He went to this place and met one of them, who told him where to get the cutter and harness. Butcher was to have the use of it until it was disposed of. Butcher got the sleigh and harness, and as the former was slightly damaged he took it to a blacksmith shop at Little York. Brotherson had read the description of the missing cutter, and was struck by the appearance of it. His suspicions were partially confirmed by finding.



NEVER GIVES UP ITS DEAD. A Lake in New York From Which No Drowned Ferson Was Ever Recovered.

"If they succeed in recovering the bodies of Instructor Merriam and Miss Yeargin from the depths of Cayuga Lake by means of instructor Merriam and Miss Yeargin from the depths of Cayuga Lake by means of electricity, as I see they intend to try to do," said a visitor to a reporter for the Rochester Post-Express, "it will be the first time in the history of the lake that the body of any person drowned in its waters was ever seen again. I always had a liking for geological research, and indulged it for many years in investigating the bottom of Cayuga Lake. My experiments satisfied me that the bottem of the lake is a series of large openings and cavities, many of them crater-like. Some of these are 100 feet in diameter. These craters, as I believe them to be, lie at different depths, or rather, their raised edges are of different heights. Their depths are fathomics. They have, undoubtedly, become the receptacles of the hundreds of people who are known to have been drowned in the lake since that country was settled, and of the undoubted thous-

undoubtedly, become the receptacies of the hundreds of people who are known to have been drowned in the lake since that country was settled, and of the undoubted thousnads of people killed in the fierce battles that were frequently waged on the shores of the lake between the hostile tribes of aboriginal warriors during the centuries preceding the coming of the white man. "It was in Cayaga Lake that the fisendish murderer Rulof lowered the bodies of his wife and child 30 years ago, rafter he had murdered them. The bodies were inclosed in a chest, as he confessed before he was hanged at Binghambon for snother murder. The weeks that were spent in dragging the lake for this chest were simply wasted, for it had sunk in the mouth of one of those bottomics openings, and, if it is not sinking yet, is still floating about in those mysterious depths. Within half a century more than 100 persons have been drowned in Cayaga Lake, to recover the bodies of whom the grappling from and drag were used industriously, but in vain. If it were possible for one to make the rounds of this lake's crater-like bed he would, without a doubs, encounter hideous charnel houses beyond number—caverns where hosts of grinning skeletons have found seputcher, submarine catacombs, without end. Perhaps the electricians, exploring the lake bottom with their intense lights as they propose doing, may make some such discoveries. Another mystery about Cayaga Lake that used to puzzle me was its curious tides. They were irregular in their occurrence, but very decided. I remember one year when the phenomenon appeared twice.
