NO ASSURANCES FOR FUTURE MAY BE ASKED BY OFFICERS

And Superiors May Not Inquire Into Subordinates' Hypo-thetical Attitude—New Army Order Issued—Cabinet Wants French and Ewart to Remain.

[Canadian Press.] Gen. Sir John S. Ewart have not yet been withdrawn, and Premier Asquith, after deferring his statement twice, was able only to announce in the House of Comnons this afternoon that the Government was still awaiting the reply of the army officers to the cabinet's request that they

emain at their posts. Premier Asquith reached the House of net meeting held today, both of which were attended by the chief of the general staff, Field Marshal Sir John French. The Premier said matters in the question involved great complexity and difficulty and seemed to the Government to require very full consideration. A partial or provisional statement would be unsatisfactory. No Difference of Views.

Sir oJhn French and Lieutenant-General Sir John S. Destruction of General Sir Hugh McCalmont's Mansion Blamed on Suffragettes— Loss \$75,000.

Belfast, Ireland, March 27.—A militant suffragette "arson squad" is believed to have been responsible for the destruction the owners look with favor on the cash by fire early this morning of Abbeylands, splendid country residence belonging to Major-Gen. Sir Hugh McCalmont, near White Abbey, on Belfast Lough. The house, although fully furnished, was not occupied except by caretakers. The damage is estimated at \$75,000.

Dealers Say Old Time-Eat-as-Many-Eggs-as-You-Can Can Be Economically Observed.

Londoners may be able to indulge in the old-time eating-as-many-eggs-asyou-can contest this Easter, for eggs are cheaper now than they have been for many years, according to happy buyers were found, but as the women recently and disconsolate farmers. According to the dealers, they are likely to continue cheap right through Easter week, and for some time later, as most prices are high and yet have not affected the price of eggs.

17 Cents Wholesale Price. Eggs are selling, on the market square for 21 cents a dozen retail, and were bought yesterday morning for 20 cents retail and 17 cents and 18 cents wholesale. Almost every farmer on the square was selling eggs. Most of the buying was done by wholesalers.

Middlesex hens are making a record, and eggs in London are cheaper than in any other city in this part of the country. One country grocer who collects eggs from the farmers in his vicinity sold 00 dozen to a local wholesaler yesterday afternoon. Several other big lots were

Imported Eggs Responsible. The main cause of the reduction, according to dealers, is "e importation of eggs from the Southern States, where the hens lay much earlier than here, and where poultry men make a business of producing eggs in large quantities for the

The minimum of change will be the object and purpose of the Government.

Union Industrial Farms. Following out the attempt of several counties in Western Ontario to establish one industrial farm in lieu of maintaining separate and distinct county jails, Mr. Hanna brought in a bill empowering several county or municipal councils to enter into an agreement under the approval of the inspector of prisons to establish and maintain an industrial farm. It is provided that where this is done each council shall appoint one member for a term of three years to serve on the board of management of such institution, who, together with the sheriff of the county in which the farm is situated, shall have charge of the place. In situations where the industrial farm is established for one county only, the sheriff of the county, where the farm is situated is appointed superintendent.





The lesson can be easily learned in Britain. Conditions sometimes change very rapidly. And if the ordinary British officer gets the idea that he can dabble in politics and interfere with the powers elected by the people a change may come before he is aware of it.



Hon. Adam Beck Tells Delegates Help Cannot Be Expected at Once.

BY A. D. CLARKE.

Otawa, March 26 .- Though the counties, townships, towns and cities of Western Ontario and the counties of York and Ontario sent down their best representatives, to the number of nearly 2,000 men, to impress the Government and elicit the same consideration in the mater of Federal subsidies for municipal-owned hydroradial railways as had been shown to private promotions, the great deputation which stormed the House of Commons today carried back little encouragement. Premier Borden was certainly not very encouraging in this regard, though he expressed sympathy with the hydro-electric power movement and the proposal that in future all hydraulic power developed on the waterways of Ontario should be under the control of the Ontario hydro-electric power commission for the people of the

After the premier made his speech, Hon. Adam Beck is understood to have said to a group of the delgates that he did not expect that there would be any aid for radial electric lines this year, but that he expected there would be aid for them from the Federal Government next

The great deputation, so large that it crammed the chamber of the House, seats, aisles and galleries, came ready to cheer and expecting to cheer. They cheered Hon. Adam Beck to the echo when he rose to present the three memorials for the Government's consideration, namely, the deepening and enlarging of the lakes, canal route from the St. Lawrence River to the Sault, and the conservation of all hydraulie possibilities in Ontario for publicly-owned hydro-radials. They cheered Mr. Beck all through his speech, and after he had concluded they cheered all the speakers who followed the power minister, speakers representing all communities from Prescott to Lake Huron's north shore; they cheered Mr. Borden long, loud and frequently from beginning to end of his address in reply, except his brief reference to the subsidy matter.

WOULD DEPOSE KING

Supposed Effort Being Made by Certain English Party, According to Dispatch.

[Canadian Press.]

Montreal, March 27.-A London cable to the Daily Mail says: A correspondent of the Financial News states that city circles, which are usually well-informed, believe that Premier Asquith's stern repression of republican manifestations in the House of Commons is not Premier, but is profoundly and personally inspired. It is beginning to be surmised that there is on foot an effort to secure a recrudescence of the republicanism rife forty years ago. The idea is that King George has not acquired his grandmother's supreme personal dominance, or his father's unbounded personal power. It is conjectured that while King George is comparatively young on the throne, there is a chance to effect a coup d'etat, placing at the head of affairs a president, whose identity wellinformed people can guess. He would be assisted by a vice-president, whose essential qualifications would be coarse anguage and coarser actions. The writer admits that these conjectures need not cause anxiety, though he thinks it is worth while to know the kinds of joints that are cooking in the political pot.

CHAUFFEUR IDENTIFIES KRAFCHENKO POSITIVELY

Drove Him From Scene of Murder With Plunder, Under Threat of Death.

His passenger, continued Dyck, emptied two bags of silver into one and asked Dyck if he wanted the bag. Dyck refused it, whereupon the other took a handful of coin and put it into one of Dyck's overcoat pockets and then threw the bag under the seat, remarking that stuff was too heavy. He kept his revolver in his hand all the time.

Admits Lying. About a mile and a half north of Osborne his passenger got out and said he would leave Dyck there. Krafchenko walked on north, and Dyck returned to Plum Coulee, where he was taken in harge by a provincial constable. He admitted telling this officer a false story, the one dictated to him by his passenger, because of threats made by Krafchenko, he

This concluded the direct examination. and Dyck was then taken in hand by J. D. Suffield, defence counsel.






