





Martindale, one of the cidest and most beloved residents of London. The deceased was born in Weardale, County of Durham, England, on the 1st of June, 1824, and hence her 82nd birthday was celebrated only last week. Her father was the Rev. George Watson, of Linga Riggs, Weardale, and a preacher of high local repute, being accustomed to make use of the most was a member of the choir in High House Church-a Wesleyan Church, even now famous among those of that faith, from the fact that a thorn tree yet standing in the church grounds once formed a canopy and shelter under which the saintly John Wesley preached his first open-air sermon in that section. In the choir of that church she made the acquaintance of Joseph Martindale, who was in his day and generation a musician of commanding ability, and largely through his means the choral singing was strengthened by the addition of an orchestra, consisting of clarinets, orpheclides, trumpets, violins, 'cellos and flutes, and the fame of the choir spread for many miles throughout the County of Durham. Joseph Martindale and "Nannie" Watson, as she was called, were married in High House Church in 1844. In 1853 the young family set sail from Liverpool in the good ship "Sarah Jane" for New York, a city in the then land of great promise. Six weeks and three days were required to complete the passage, as the vessel encountered a succession of fierce gales, and after them followed provoking calms. Four children had been born to them before they left the heather-covered hills of Weardale, and these rosy cheeked and rugged youngsters-Thomas, George, Ralph and Sarah-thrived on the voyage in spite of the hardships and short rations. Arriving in New York the family fell victims to sharpers, who sold them bogus tickets to Pittsburg, their objective point, and to further








BUT GOOD PROGRESS IS MADE

The Vast Opportunities of the West Strongly Brought Before the General Assembly.

The members of the General As sembly who are specially interested in the work in home mission flekds could not have been other than gratified with the reports submitted last evening from the eastern and western sections. The session was given over entirely to the presentation of these reviews of the past year's work, and to addresses by several of the clergy. The report of the eastern section, which includes the Maritime Provinces, stated that the darkest page in the cheering retrospect is that which contained the record of the scarcity of men to supply some of the fields so much in need of additional laborers.

Workers Do Not Increase. Catechists were fewer than in previous years, and there had been little f any increasce in ordained missionaries. The latter numbered 24, an in-

crease of three over 1904, and a decrease of ten compared with 1903. They had supplied congregations with 69 preaching stations, 3,871 of an average Sabbath attendance, 1,066 families, 148 single persons and 1,615 communicants, of whom 101 were added in the year. The 44 catechists-ten less than in 1904-supplied 54 fields with 110 preaching stations, and an average attendance of 5,470.

New Brunswick Situation.

In New Brunswick little was accomplished in the winter owing to the severity of the weather. There was a need of more workers, for it was known where missions with 30 to 40 families, and one with 80, that were vacant for six and eight months. No large growth of population was experienced in any part of New Brunswick, but it was hoped that the investment of capital in manufactories would bring about a change in this respect. He said that in New Brunswick the Presbyterians were not the largest Protestant denomination, but they should be. How to get men and money was the question to be decided in the east. The forward movement inaugurated by the Presbytery of St. John, N. B., about 25 years ago, had met with considerable success for ten years; 40 or 50 new fields were organized, 60 new churches were built. The move, however, did not go on, as the population was at a standstill.

"There is hope for the future," said Dr. Ross. "This is only a branch of the industry where there is no growth or a decide improvement. The school and church must do for the people of the west what it has done for the people in the east." The resolution was then submitted

and carried.
