London, whom Dickens stood by, stands by him, and all the Empire and the reading world do the same.

Why this general enthusiasm? Why is Thackeray decently honored, but Dickens carried like a victorious athlete upon the people's shoulders in a sort of riot? For one thing, Dickens' work shows always the unhesitant force and driving directness of an alert, radiant and self-confident personality. Dickens' sympathies and indignations are equally big and violent; they rank with the big forces nature, the avalanche, flood and earthquake. What a cloudburst of beaevolence in that scene of Pickwick's going-forth from prison, or in that dinner party of love and reunion at the of Martin Chuzzlewit! What opulent agony in the story of Little Nell, what furious delineation of Squeers or the New York boardinghouse, what a tragedy was that of Ham Peggotty! Dickens has more demonic force than Thackeray. Then there is the picturesqueness of the characters in all their London variety of type and costume, a gaudy picturesqueness for every eye to see.

Dickens moves in an active, lively way his wonders to perform. He is a restless knight errant, seeking out monsters to slay with his terrible sword of satire, assailing evils that immediately concern the mass of men. His heart is on his sleeve. His methods are plain and simple. He tickles his people so that the dullest reader will not be left in the dark as to their character. His wit is native and like his power of characterization shines fitfully in flashes. His nervous energy and quickness are revealed in such characters as Jingle and Sam Weller. Ah, Sam Weller! Mark Tapley! Mr. Peggotty! They are the masterpieces executed without a flaw. With his wondrous imagination and wit Dickens lights up the figures of a boot-black, a tapster, a poor fisherman, and they become the heroes of the multitude. Remember also the vividly real characters of Mr. Dick, good old Barkis, Mr. Chuffer, the barbers, servants, impostors, hundreds of them. The overpowering malignance of such visions as Jonas Chuzzlewit, Sairey Gamp, Quilp and Uriah Heep impresses the public as deeply as the overwhelming benevolence of Pickwick and the Cheerybles, or the fantastic wizardry which conceived Micawber and Pecksniff, names and all. Dickens gave the English people the checkered life of London as he saw it, with a pen untamed by classical tradition, but able like a lever to move the earth. He is "the Homer of the mob."

A recent sketch of English literature styles Dickens the eye of the Victorian era, Tennyson its ear, Thackeray its velvet pulpit-cushion, George Eliot its impending brow, and Browning its active brain. Three months hence the centennial of Browning's birth is to be commemorated by his following. But over the brain of that great epoch there will be no such general rejoicing as over its seeing eye; and one might allow that Dickens was its heart and soul as well.

Something theatrical he is, some of his characters smell a little too strong of brandy, the dialogue and narration are both marred at times by stilted or affectedly romantic diction as compared with the sounder style of Thackeray's prose. But Dickens was the life of his time, and expressed it. He is a bold artist, with none of Thackeray's shyness;

ses it, and sometimes, as with a Weller, he is supreme. The whole world worships Dickens for his force, his humorous imagination, with its sudden, his age. England is a better country for the poor and unfortunate than in Dickens' lifetime, and it is better because Dickens lived.

#### A NEW SCHOOL OR AN ADDITION

Board of Education Will Further Consider the Aberdeen Matter.

#### A MATTER OF MONEY

Some of the Trustees Do Not Like the Idea of Spending \$35,000 on an Old Structure.

A special meeting of the board of education will be held to discuss the advisability of erecting a new school to replace the Aberdeen school.

At the regular meeting of the board held Tuesday afternoon, No. 2- committee submitted a recommendation to add four rooms to the present structure, and remodel it, at an esti-mated cost of \$35,000. This would make an up-to-date 16-room school. However, some of the members objected to this. Trustee Gammage did not like the idea of expending \$35,000 on an old building, and thought that the question of a new school should

be carefully considered. "That is a large sum of money to expend on an old building," he stated. "A new school would cost \$75,000, or perphaps \$90,000, and it would do for all time to come.

"Give them a new school," advocated Rev. J. G. Inkster. "I would not expend \$35,000 on an old building, and have nothing but a shell left." "We would have a good school for 20 years or more," declared Trustee Wyckoff. - "A lot of money must be expended on schools throughout the

city, and we do not want to expend too much in one place.' However, Trustee Gammage's motion to send the question back to No. 2 committee to prepare a report and an estimate of the cost of a new school to be considered at a special meeting of the board, carried.





#### DRAGGED BY TAXI CLOSE TO DEATH

Max McEvoy Pulled Over Roadway for Hundred Feet By Heel of Shoe.

CAR ADDS TO HIS PERIL

Trails Behind Young Man as He Is Being Pulled Along-Saved By Act of the Chauffeur.

Dragged for more than a hundred feet by a taxicab in the running-board of which his heel was caught, while a street car trailed behind, threatening to crush him should his foot become free, Max McEvoy, son of J. M. McEvoy, had a spectacular escape from death or serious injury on Dundas

street last night. Mr. McEvoy was riding from the east on the taxicab, and when he came to the National bowling alley he arose to get off. The driver did not stop the car, and as the young man stepped off his heel caught in a heavy strip of brass which was partly pulled off the running-board. He fell on his shoulders to the pavement, and before the car, which had been running a fairly fast rate of speed, could be stopped, he had been dragged as far as the Boomer

A Dangerous Position. A car was coming behind, and the young man was dragged right in its path, while it was but a dozen feet to the rear. The motorman did not see the young man apparently, and the car was creeping up on the automobile. The driver realized the dangerous predicament of Mr. McEvoy and while he was unable to stop his car, for fear that it would be struck by the street car, tried to swerve it to the pavement, and at the same time he reached over and grasped the young man by the coat. He pulled him into the seat, wrenching off the heel of Mr. McEvoy's

shoe in the act. The young man was somewhat scratched and bruised, but not seriousy injured. His clothes were not imroved by their contact with the roadway. The action of the driver was responsible for the saving of Mr. Mc-Evoy from a serious accident.


