THE KITCHENER AFFAIR.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: I have been for many years a reader of The Advertiser, and would be very pleased if you could find it possible to insert this letter, concerning the recent disturbances in Kitchener, in your columns. 

No badges shall be issued to any per son who has been rejected on account of temporary disability or who is obviously unfit for service in the C. E. F. ILDERTON, Nov. 29.-Idlerton disrict has had for the past few weeks a serious outbreak of black quarter among the cattle, and although it was hoped that the cold weather would put a stop to the disease, one death is reported this week. Up to date 30 head of young cattle have been lost. Young cattle from six months up to two years are in nearly every case the victims, and it seems the older cattle are nearly immune.

#### BORDENISM MENACE OF

[From Toronto Globe of Monday, April 23, 1917.]

The spirit of Bordenism is the spirit of faction and disunion. Leadership in these perilous times should transcend all considerations of party, and, by its lofty appeals to the sentiment of patriotism, by its wide vision and masculine grasp of affairs, and by its broad and tolerate sympathies attract to the side of the Government and to the service of the nation the enthusiastic and loyal support of every citizen. Bordenism has been tried and found wanting.

The leadership of Sir Robert Borden during the past two years has been lacking in the masculine qualities of statesmanship that are indispensable to the successful prosecution of war abroad and to the sane and practical conduct of affairs at home. Shortcomings and unavoidable blunders might be forgiven any government suddenly brought face to face with unprecedented conditions of war, but the offences of the Borden cabinet smell to heaven and strike at the foundations of national character. They sap and undermine the codes of honor and standards of public decency to which ministers of the crown are expected to conform and by which their public conduct is judged. Doubly heinous are the sins of the Borden Government in the light of the great issues in this war, issues that distinguish between right and wrong and that raise an insuperable moral barrier between Canada and the Prussian foe. While Canadian troops are facing death that British ideals may prevail throughout the dominion, the prime minister, Sir Robert Borden, shows his contempt for these ideals by flirting with popular applause in the British Isles in the company of Hon. Robert Rogers. Borden and Rogerism! In days when Canada is making tremendous sacrifices, Sir Robert Borden flouts honor and decency in public life and humiliates his country by sailing to England in the company of a minister who is placed outside the pale by the findings of the Galt commission. Under Sir Robert Borden's leadership, or lack of leadership, the country has drifted from its safe moorings. No one can say what the future may bring forth. Bordenism has failed Canada in days of war; it is an unsafe guide for the country in the pregnant days of peace that lie immediately ahead.

Bordenism has failed not only as an instrument of war, but also as an instrument of reconstruction after the war. The first step toward any successful plan of national reconstruction is the creation of a national atmosphere, in which all who love their country and desire to serve her may be gathered beneath a common flag. Bordenism is a menace to national unity. Throughout the election campaign of 1911 and during the intervening period it has been a disintegrating influence in the life of Canada and a serious weakness to the Empire. Instead of consolidating the forces of the nation, Bordenism has intensified party divisions and encouraged the growth of discord and faction. # SHERBROOKE THEATRE IS WRECKED

Serious Disturbance Quebec Has Seen.

MEETING OF UNIONISTS

Minister of Justice and Hon. C. C. Ballantyne Get Bad Treatment.

[By Canadlan Press.] SHERBROOKE, P.Q., Nov. 29 .- The most serious disturbance that has yet occurred in the province of Quebec in the present general election campaign took place here tonight at a meeting in His Majesty's Theatre, where Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, and Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, sought to give ora-

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, sought to give oratorical assistance to the Unionist candidate here, W. S. Davidson. It was a riotous crowd that started the trouble, which ended only after the front of the theatre had been wrecked and a cyclone effect had been given to the interior by numerous fights.

The rioters were held back only by the well-directed use of a fire hose at the stage door when they attempted to storm the stage, where the speakers were. The riot lasted more than three hours, during which period the howling mob broke through the doors of the theatre and were repelled by the citizens who had been occupying seats on the ground floor, and who each time that the mob broke into the theatre rose up in their might and drove them back.

Serles of Pitched Battles.

It was a series of pitched battles, and there were at least twenty of them. The whole of the front of His Majesty's Theatre, where the meeting was held, was smashed to splinters. Not a single piece of glass was left intact and through the broken windows stones of all sizes were hurled. At the end of the meeting the chairman called on the peaceful people to remain inside for a time, in order that the situation might be gone into with a view to seeing what steps could be taken to get the women away in safety. The men decided to protect their own women and many chairs were broken, so that the arms and legs might serve as weapons, and almost en masse the audience left the theatre. They presented such a determined aspect that they were not rushed as had been expected.

At the close of the meeting only about 800 persons remained in the theatre. Those were the peaceable persons. The others, who had filled the gallery at the commencement of the meeting, had gone out, instead of waiting to be thrown out, and joined their fellows in the streets. 





#### **HUN CHANELLOR BRAGS OF WINS** AND U-BOATS

Germany Still Pins Her Faith On the Piracies of Her Submarines.

Tries To Cheer Up Reichstag With Recital of Past Year's "Conquests."

Berlin, Nov. 29.—Via London, Nov. D.—British Admiralty, via Wireless ress.—The war situation was reviewed efore the Reichstag today by Count deorge F. von Hertling, the new im-perial chancellor. German arms, the chancellor said,

have been uniformly successful and the ubmarine warfare will reach the aim intended for it. He said that the ships sunk will exceed that of those newly constructed. He praised the army and navy, and eulogized the whole population for its patience and endurance inder great privations. Political re-orms would be carried out, but the undamental principles of the imperial constitution cannot and shall not be The Reichstag was packed when the chancellor began his speech. The new state secretaries, the new Prussian minister, the new Bavarian premier, the members of the reigning German houses, the Austrian, Turkish and Bul-

garian ambassadors and all the neutral ministers were present.

Starts With Boast. Starts With Boast.

The imperial chancellor opened his speech, after personal references to his assumption of office, by asking the loyal co-operation of the Reichstag. He continued:

"We are approaching the end of the "We are approaching the end of the year that has been full of far-reaching and decisive events in many theatres of the war. I am proud and thankful to say that the arms of Germany and her allies have been successful on almost every occasion and everywhere."

Count Von Hertling expressed the wish that the territories formerly under Russian sway—Poland, Lithuania and Courland—could have the right of Courland—could have the right of choosing their own governments and could obtain that political form which corresponded to their conditions and culture. He said that affairs in this direction were still completely in a state of uncertainty, and the reports in the press indicating that a definite agreement had been reached on one point were premature.

He referred to Germany and her allies as having placed themselves on the foundation of the papal peace note of last August and said that any ground had been removed for "the foolish argument" that the object of her enemies was to destroy German militarism, which was destroying the peace of nations. He said:

It has been shown where, in truth, the peace-destroying militarism can be sought. The Italian minister, Sonnino, in his speech on October 26, expressly waived the thought of general disarmament, and Premier Clemenceau goes so far in synicism as to expressly shut out Germany and Austria-Hungary from the peaceful community of nations of the future, when right shall take the place of armed force. Premier Lloyd George has declared distinctly that the aim of the war is the destruction of German commerce and that the war must be continued until this end is reached. Indeed, the lust of conquest falsely attributed to us is now placed before the world through the publication of secret treaties by the Russian Government.

#### WHAT SIR SAM HUGHES THINKS OF THE UNION GOVERNMENT

We reproduce herewith extracts from an interview given by Sir Sam Hughes which appeared in the Daily Warder of Lindsay,

What do you think of the new Union Government?" "It is a splendid triumph for the plans long ago laid by Sir Joseph Flavelle and Sir Thomas White," replied Sir Sam.

"How does that appear?" "It is now more than a year since the movement to form a National or a 'National Trust' Government as it was sometimes termed, was proposed by Sir Joseph and his friends. "How will coalltion affect you personally?" "Every candidate and member of Parliament owes alleglance to his constituents and to them only. The people are masters; the members are their servants; and in turn the cabinet are the servants of the members. At least that is what should prevail under responsible government, and just as governments depart from these principles do they become kaiser-like; the machine prevails and liberty is endangered."

Again, after the session, when it was planned to swing an election I objected because of Borden pledges to Laurier during the session, when the Liberals behaved so well. In this I stood alone once more, and was severely condemned by the 'wire-pullers' of the party."

#### **FINLAY PRAISES NOBLE MESSAGE** OF SIR WILFRID

British Chancellor Refers To Splendid Sentiment of the Liberal Chief.

LAUDS NEWFOUNDLAND

Postmaster - General Blondin Banquetted by Empire Parliamentary Association.

London, Nov. 29.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa agency.)—The Empire Parliamentary Association today entertained at luncheon Sir Edward Morris, premier of Newfoundland, and Lieut.-Col. the Hon. P. E. Blondin, postmaster-general of Canada. The largest gathering which ever attended a similar event was present. Lord Chancellor Finlay presided, and many prominent men were present, including Sir George Ferley, high commissioner for Canada.

The lord chancellor, in proposing the toasts to Newfoundland and Canada, said that regarding Newfoundland all had been impressed with the part that that colony had played in contributing men to the British navy and also in sending contingents to fight our battles on land.

A Noble Sentiment.

Lord Chancellor Finlay recalled Sir Wilfrid Laurier's declaration in 1914 that Canadians, whether English, Irish or French, could not contemplate the possibility of remaining quiescent while the Anglo-French were fighting the Germans for the freedom of France and Belgium and the civilization of the world.

Lord Finlay continued:

"That was a noble sentiment. It was not for him to express any opinion about the great electoral contest how going on in Canada, but all were agreed in hoping that the contest might end in such a fashion that Canada will be able to throw her whole strength into the conflict for the freedom of the world."

Premier Morris said that Newfoundland and Canada had lived on the most friendly terms in all the years in which they had been working side by side. A very stormy election was being held in Canada, and a similar one would be held in Australia in a few days, both relating to the question of military service.



## U.S. ENGINEERS AIDED BYNG IN

CAMBRAI DRWL

Pushed Along Vital Railways
Behind the British
Line.

British Army Headquarters in France,
Monday, Nov. 26.—American engineers,
the first American troops to be engaged in military operations on the British front, took a prominent part in the breaking of the Hindenburg line by General Byng last week. Military necessity has made it impossible to speak of their presence before, but it is now possible to announce that engineers of the American army had a large part in pushing up the vital railways been laboring on the roads through the devastated battlefields of the Somme district for nearly four months, and two of their men, who were wounded, were the first American casualties announced with the first

It comprises the terms on which Italy entered the war. Great Britain, France and Russia, according to the published text, agreed to Italy annexing the Trentino, Istria, Dalmatia, the Southern Tytol, certain islands in the Grecian Archippelago, and territory in Asia-Minor and Africa. Article XV of the treaty is reported to read as follows:

"France, Great Britain and Russia take upon themselves to support Italy in her disallowing representatives of the Holy See to take any diplomatic steps for the conclusion of peace or regarding

Orders From Ottawa Includes Them Under M. S. A. Provisions.

Can Report or Claim Exemption in Usual Way Before That Time.

Indians, though liable for service under the military service act, are to have until February 1 to report for service or to claim exemption. This rulling, which was issued yesterday from Ottawa, was made with the idea of clearing up any misunderstanding that may have existed up to the present time with regard to the status of Indians under the draft law.

This will give the Indian citizens who through ignorance of the provisions of the act, or for other reasons, have failed to comply with the military service act by going to the postoffice and reporting for service, or claiming exemption, before November 10, an opportunity to comply with the provisions of the act, without suffering any penalties which might have been imposed upon them through their neglecting to do so. Such men as have failed to comply should do so through the deputy registrar or through any of the Indian agents in their district. It is apparently not the intention of the authorities that they should go to the postoffice, as the postal authorities have nothing further to do with the reports or claims for exemption.

## Our Consumers' League

Our Consumers' League Department is a year and a few weeks old. So swiftly do the days slip away, and so many are the questions of live interest popping up all the time, that the anniversary was unnoticed until it had gone by. The object in starting this page was primarily to help the housewife readers in solving the problems arising from the increasingly high cost of living, and to discuss questions of conservation. The subject of conservation has extended its scope to include not only conservation of "leftovers," of all good handled in the household, of money, but of garden plots and of life itself. The question of "Conservation" early in the year became inseparably associated with that of greater production, in order to supply home tables, reduce the cost of living, and release portable food for the fighting men and Allies. As early as the issue of November 24th, 1916, we were urging the importance of backyard gardening and poultry-raising, and shortly after, the utilizing of vacant city lots for gardens, the Women's Gardening Association taking up the campaign before the members had begun to think of extending to one another Christmas and New Year's greetings. It was some months later that the Government flung across the whole of the Dominion the slogan, "A garden for every backyard in Canada in 1917."

Everybody knows that practically everybody in London talked, thought, worked, ate, slept, dreamed and harvested gardens in the past spring, summer and autumn seasons. And in connection with this, they canned and pickled and stored as they had never done before. So much for food conservation,

Concerning the conservation of incomes, one of the first subjects discussed last year was that of systematic keeping of both household and personsal accounts. Any of our readers carried out the experiment for the first time this year and found it a success, or have they found it a failure? In any case, we would like to hear from them. Numbers would doubtless be glad to improve on would like to hear from them. Numbers would doubless se sad to haptore su their own methods and to learn from the successes and failures of others. Owing to the high cost of everything and the way every commodity has jumped people have been obliged to count the cost or they couldn't get along at all.

Probably no subject has been given greater prominence in this department than that of conservation of life, the end of conservation of garden plots, of food and of money. Money and food and land have no significance to a man after he is dead, beyond the cold comfort of providing a funeral and a place to y what remains when the spirit is gone.

For this reason much space has been devoted in our weekly column to eneavor to awaken the public to the seriousness of the wastage of life, the un avor to awaken the public to the seriousness of the wastege of the public essary loss of life of children, and especially those under one year old in Vestern Ontario and in our own city. Considering that we have been urging the importance of definite, systematic, civic child welfare efforts for months pon months, backing up appeals by facts and figures to prove that conservaion does conserve, it is naturally a matter of rejoicing that a grand baby wel fare campaign has been launched in London, and that a baby welfare exhibit will be held here the first week in February. The medical officer of health has taken a leading part in getting the wheels moving, and has associated with him the Children's Aid Society, the Mothers' Clubs, and, Indeed, every leading oranization of men and women in the city.

In addition to this the organization which perhaps more than any other elds a powerful influence in rural Western Ontario, the Women's Institute,

Such consideration as the foregoing encourages the Consumers' League Deng gardening on city lots and the conservation of child life in age; in other words, getting back to the very foundation of life conservation. In any case, coming events have cast their shadows before them in the Consumers' League Page in the year and few weeks of its existence, and it is still in a position to continue its place in the Friday paper each week, and give its backing to welfare movements, along conservation lines.

#### WANTED-EVERY HOUSEWIFE.

If we have been successful in enlisting the interest of a number of readers for this department, as comments would indicate, it has been largely due to the fine support and assistance we have received from specialists along various lines, specialists who never have been too busy to give time to answering questions even writing articles, when it meant that a number of people might be reached by information of real, vital importance. We have had among our conributors several practical housewives who have given, not theories, but actual experience, in regard to domestic and personal bookkeeping, cooking, menu planning, and food and money conservation. One of our very first contributors was an expert on raising poultry, who wrote a number of letters on the subject of choice of stock, housing, feeding, and care otherwise of poultry, and of great interest to the consumer, how to select poultry for the table. (By the way, a reader has requested us to publish again Miss Nicholson's rules for buying poultry, in view of the fact that Christmas is drawing near. These rules will found in this department next week). Domestic science experts have come to the rescue on several occasions, and through leading medical men of London, we have been able to get the "last word" on child welfare to pass along.

Every housewife has some favorite economy recipe, some time-saving and energysaving device, some suggestion about systematizing housework that would help others just as it has helped herself. 
