STRIKE ENDS TONIGHT. Berlin, March 7.—The general strike in Berlin will be called off tonight. The labor federation, at a meeting early this evening, recommended that the workmen return to work Saturday.

Copenhagen, March 7.—German Government troops have captured the police headquarters at Berlin and have completely cleared Alexander Platz of strikers, according to a Berlin dispatch re-

Fighting has ceased in the centre of the city, but continues in the Moabit section. The Government troops suffered slight losses and captured many prisoners. 

The Enquirer was published weekly Parks and Hackstaff, and according to their published card, the subscription price was three dollars a year, halfyearly in advance. Advertising rates were £2 for 17 lines up to £6 5s for 100 lines. Yearly advertisers were allowed the privilege of changing their ads quarterly.

One of the striking things about the advertisements is the fact that practically no prices are given. ### Rot of Canadians Made Mention of in the British Commons

LONDON, March 7 .- In the House of Commons this afternoon William Tyson Wilson, M.P. for Lancashire, asked Lord Talbott, representing the Government, for a statement regarding the incidents reported at the Kinmel camp at Rhyl, Wales. Lord Talbot replied that he had no further information.

The gravest view was taken on the news when it reached Canadian headquarters in London. General Turner, chief of staff, went immediately to the Kinmel camp, where he addressed the men, returning to London today.

The Evening Standard says it learns that the Canadian authorities in London this morning estimated that five persons had been killed and nineteen wounded in the rioting. The report that a major with the Victoria Cross had been killed while keeping insubordinate troops from the officers' mess was denied,

the newspaper adds.

## RIOTS IN CANADIAN CAMP IN WALES RESULTS IN NUMEROUS PERSONS BEING KILLED OR HURT

Delay in Return of Men Causes an Outbreak That Leads to Bloodshed—Authorities R egard Outbreak as Unjustified and Promise to Deal Vigor ously With Participants -Twelve Civilians Who Too k Part in the Affray Handed Over to Civilian Authorities, and Many Soldiers Have Been Arrested.

LONDON, March 7.-From eight to twenty-seven persons are estimated to have been killed and from twenty-five to seventy-three wounded in rioting during the last three days at the Kinmel military camp at Rhyl, according to a Liverpool dispatch received here tonight. Great property damage was caused, the dispatch adds.

Canadian military headquarters in London today issued a statement with reference to the riot by soldiers at Kinmel Park. The statement says the disturbance was entirely due to the delay in getting the men back to Canada. It was impossible to keep the promises given the men, the statement adds, owing to shortage of ships, to convey them home.

The authorities, however, the statement adds, do not regard the rioting as justified, and the offenders, many of whom already are under arrest, will be vigorously dealt

A number of civilians took part in the disturbance, and twelve of these also have been arrested and handed over to the civil authorities.

In the course of the trouble three rioters and two sentries were killed and twenty-one persons were injured, including two officers, according to the statement.

FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers. FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers. FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies

FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.
FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000 or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remunera-tion during the calendar year 1918. FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1918.

### Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns in their individual capacity.

GENERAL INFORMATION All returns must be filed IN DUPLICATE. Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Returns should be filed immediately Postage must be prepaid on letters and other documents forwarded mail to Inspectors of Taxation.


