Chicago, April 4. - The Republican party today met defeat in an effort to capture the mayoralty of Chicago. As a direct result the city officially is committed to the policy of the quickest possible cessation of private franchises for public utilities. Municipal ownership especially is threatening street car lines, valued high up in the millions. After successively winning four biennial fights of independents against the regular Republican party organized here, John Maynard Harlan, son of Associate Justice Harlan, of the United States supreme court, today was a loser as Republican candidate for mayor. The defeat is attributed to sev. eral causes, starting with political re-venge and in a wide sweep embracing TRADE AGREEMENT Socialism as a factor. The victor is Judge Edward F. Dunne. Democrat. The Republican candidate suffered heavily from campaign attacks, charging that he was a political assassing British Merchants in Marshall Leaders of his own party, who had been thrust from office and power largely through Harlan's acts in previous campaigns, were absent from his support. The result was evident before the balloting today had been in progress an hour. Appeals to fear of lomination by corporate wealth appeared to sway many voters, and per haps more than any other influence was incorrectly gauged by the Republicans. When Mr. Haultain penned these words he must have forgotten section 2 of his own draft bill, prepared in January, 1902, which he claimed constituted the demand of the people of the Territories. The section is as follows, the name of the province being of necessity left blank:

"On, from and after the said first day of January, 1903, the provisions of the British North America Act. 1867, except those parts thereof which are in terms made or by reasonable intendment may be held to be, especially applicable to or to affect only the provinces under that act composing the Dominion, and except so far as the same may be varied by this act, shall be applicable TO THE PROVINCE OF THE SAME WAY AND TO THE SAME EXTENT AS THEY APPLY TO THE SEVERAL PROVINCES OF CANADA AND AS IF THE PROVINCE OF -- HAD BEEN ONE OF THE PROVINCES

SAID ACT. What do honest people think of Mr. Haultain's conduct? Three years ago he demanded that the province or provinces to be erected out of the Territories should be regarded as if they had been provinces at the union of 1867. Now he writes a letter holding up the Federal Government to scorn and ridicule for acting on his suggestion. Mr. Haultain's draft bill and open letter, placed side by side, show that he has written himself down as an impostor. Mr. Scott deserves thanks for calling attention to what he justly terms "a piece of the rankest and most partisan misrepresentation ever witnessed in the Dominion of Canada." This is not all. If section 2 of Mr. Haultain's draft bill were inserted in place of clause 16 of the bill now before Parliament, and became crystallized into law, it would have entitled the minority in the Territories to full. complete and separate control of their schools, so that separate schools, in the wider sense of the word, would be established for all time to come. We make bold to say that this is the construction which any lawyer would place upon it. Bear in mind that this draft bill was passed by the Northwest Assembly, and was the main issue of an election held immediately afterwards. If the Federal Government had chosen to insert section 2 in the autonomy bill it could claim that it was carrying out the wishes of the people of the Northwest. As matters stand, the Dominion Government is actually providing for a more moderate form of separate schools than the Government of Mr. Haultain petitioned for. This information will be surprising to many Eastern Canadians, who have been deluded into the belief that Mr. Haultain is the man of the hour, a heaven-sent champion of western freedom and provincial rights against clerical aggres-





## Domestic Science Move Defeated On Close Vote

Taught Grade VIII. Girls Was Unsucessful.

At the regular meeting of the board of education, held yesterday afternoon, another attempt was made to have domestic science taught the girls of Grade VIII. of the public schools. The matter was introduced in a report of No 1 committee, recommending that Grade VIII. girls be allowed to take lessons in domestic science at the Colegiate Institute and Normal School, if satisfactory arrangements could made. Under the present time card at the Collegiate, it was explained, it would be possible to give the instruction to the pupils of West London. Colborne street, Princess avenue, Talbot street and St. George's schools, leaving the girls of Askin and Simcoe streets to attend the Normal. would mean that the girls at Lorne avenue, Rectory street and Aberdeen schools would not receive any instruc-tion in the subject. The clause was defeated on a vote of four to three, Trustees Fitzgerald, Gammage, and Strong, supporting it, and Trustees Teasdall, English McCormick and Mac-Robert opposing it.
The recommendation of the commit-

tee to allow the Daughters of the Empire to interest the school children in the soldiers' monument movement was struck out. The other clauses of the committee report were adopted. The question of allowing the kinder-garten directors and assistants to attend the international convention of kindergarten teachers at Toronto gave rise to a lengthy discussion. As matters of the utinost importance to kin-dergartners are to be considered, Trustee Fitzgerald moved, and Trustee Gammage seconded, that all directors and assistants who desired should be allowed to attend the convention, each teacher to defray her own expenses. As this would mean the closing of the fourteen kindergartens for three days. very teacher being anxious to attend the gathering, it was strongly opposed by Trustee MacRobert, who moved that Miss McKenzie, the supervisor, and two directors, be allowed to attend.
