FOR FORTELLING THE WEATHER, THROUGH ALL THE  
LUNATIONS OF EACH YEAR, FOREVER.

*Observations.*—The nearer the time of the Moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to mid-day or noon, the phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space of this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter happening during six of the afternoon hours, *i. e.* from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind as is noted in the table.

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## THE SIGNS.—EXPLANATIONS.

The Moon's Place in the Zodiac is given. It has been an ancient custom to apply this to the human frame, as operating on particular portions of it. Those who place reliance in this notion (which has long since been exploded by the learned), will find out what they desire, by substituting the parts of the body, for the astronomical name given in the last column of the calendar pages, as annexed:—

Aries, head,	Leo, heart,,	Sagittarius, thighs,
Taurus, neck,	Virgo, belly,	Capricornus, knees,
Gemini, arms,	Libra, reins,	Aquarius, legs,
Cancer, breast,	Scorpio, secrets,	Pisces, feet.

☿ *Apogee*—The greatest distance from the earth. *Perigee*—The least distance from the earth. *Aphelion*—The greatest distance from the Sun. *Perihelion*—The least distance from the sun. *Digit*—One-twelfth part of the diameter of the Sun or Moon.

### ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON, AND TRANSIT OF MERCURY, FOR 1845.

I. The SUN will be *annularly* eclipsed May 6th; as follows:—

The eclipse will commence before the Sun rises.

At Sun rise the Sun will be about 8½ digits eclipsed.

The Eclipse will end at 5 h. 41 m.

This eclipse will be annular and central in a part of North America situated within the Artic circle.

II. There will be a *Transit* of MERCURY, May 8th. That is Mercury will pass between us and the Sun, so that with a good telescope it will appear like a dark spot upon the Sun's disk.

III. The MOON will be *totally* eclipsed, May 21st, invisible at this place.

IV. The SUN will be *annularly* eclipsed October 30th; invisible at this place. This eclipse will be central in the Southern Ocean.

V. The MOON will be *partially* eclipsed November 13th; as follows:

INTENDED TO BE PUT IN EVERY MAN'S HAT.—To bring the Dead to Life.—Immediately, as the body is removed from the water, press the chest suddenly and forcibly, downward and backward, and instantly discontinue the pressure. the projecting part of the neck (called Adam's apple) and use the bellows actively. Then press upon the chest to expel the air from the lungs, to imitate the natural breathing. Continue this at least an hour, unless signs of natural breathing come on.

Wrap the body in blankets, place it near a fire, and do every thing to preserve the natural warmth as well as to impart an artificial heat, if possible. Every thing, however, is secondary to inflating the lungs. Send for a medical man immediately.

Avoid all frictions until respiration shall be in some degree restored.

Cotton wool and oil, are the best things for a burn.

HOARSENESS.—One drachm of freshly scraped horseradish root, to be infused with four ounces of water, in a close vessel for two hours, and made into a syrup, with double its weight in vinegar, is an improved remedy for hoarseness; a teaspoonful has often proved effectual; a few teaspoonsful, it is said, have never been known to fail in removing hoarseness.

A poultice of wheat bran, or rye bran, and vinegar, very soon takes down the inflammation occasioned by a sprain. Brown paper wet is healing to a bruise. Dipped in molasses it is said to take down inflammation.

TO MAKE YELLOW BUTTER IN WINTER.—Put in yolk of eggs just before the butter comes, near the termination of the churning. This has been repeatedly tried, and it makes very fine sweet butter. It is kept by many as a great secret, but its great value requires publicity.—Cultivator.

In June wash the stems of apple and quince trees with strong lye, to destroy the eggs of the borer and other insects.

## COURT OF CHANCERY.

The Governor General is Chancellor; Vice Chancellor, Robert S. Jameson; Registrar, William Hepburn. There are besides two Masters, an Accountant and a Sergeant-at-arms.

## COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH, C. W.

*Chief Justice*, the Hon. John B. Robinson; *Puisne Judges*, Hon. James B. Macaulay, Hon. Jonas Jones, Hon. Archibald McLean, and the Hon. C. A. Hagerman. *Attorney General*, R. Baldwin; *Solicitor General*, J. E. Small. This Court has a Reporter, whose duties are now regulated under the direction of an Act of the Legislature passed in February, 1840.

The Court of Oyer and Terminer, General Gaol Delivery and Nisi Prius, is held in the several Districts throughout the Province twice in the year; being at some convenient time in the Spring and Fall.

A Court of General Quarter Sessions, under the Superintendence of the Magistrates, of which the Judge of the District is Chairman, and a District Court, in which a Judge, appointed by the Executive presides, is held in every District throughout the Province, four times a year—Also a Probate and Surrogate Courts, having jurisdiction in matters relating to Wills, &c.

## *Terms of the Courts of Queen's Bench.*

There are four in the year, and at these times the Judges sit at Toronto and listen to the arguments of Barristers, and decide Law questions, &c.

**EASTER TERM** commences on the first Monday in February, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

**TRINITY**, on the Second Monday in June, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

**MICHAELMAS**, on the first Monday in August, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

**HILARY**, on the first Monday in November, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

**TIME OF HOLDING THE QUARTER SESSIONS.**—These Courts are held at the same time throughout the Province, viz : On the 7th of January, 1st of April, 1st of July, and 18th of November.

**DISTRICT COURTS.**—These are held in every District at the time and place of holding the Quarter Sessions.

The **TERM COURT**, in which Law points and other matters of practice are settled, always proceeds the time of holding the Quarter Sessions, and the District Court as follows :—that is, the terms of the District Court, severally commence on the Monday in the week next but one preceding the week, and at the place in which the Sessions are holden, and end on the Saturday of the same week.

The District Court has jurisdiction in all matters of contract in 40s. to £15 ; and when the amount is liquidated or ascertained, either by the act of the parties or the nature of the transaction, to Forty Pounds. For instance, a Prommissory Note under £40 can be sued in this Court, and an open but unsettled account of £15, or under, but not over that amount. Also it has jurisdiction in all matters of tort respecting Personal Chattles, when the damages to be recovered do not exceed £15, and the title to land is not brought into question. By a Statute of the United Parliament, the Judge of the Dist. Court, presides in the Quarter Sessions. The ordinary costs of a suit range from 5 to £10—in the Queen's Bench from 10 to £30.

There are also **DIVISION COURTS** for the recovery of small debts under £10. By a recent Statute the District Judges preside in these and hold Courts in six Divisions in each District, once in two months. The following are the times and places appointed for holding the said Courts for the year, commencing on the 1st. of December, 1844, for the District of Johnstown ;—

1st **DIVISION.**—In the Town of Brockville, on the 16th of Jan. ; 19th of March ; 16th of May ; 14th of July ; 8th Sept. ; 5th Nov.

2d do. In the Town of Prescott, on the 25th of January ; 8th of March ; 26th of May ; 12th of July ; 1st of Sept. ; 10th of Nov.

3d do. In the Village of Gananoque, on the 14th of Jan. ; 13th of March ; 23d May ; 18th of July ; 12th of Sept. ; 31st of Oct.

4th do. In the Village of Kemptville, on the 23d of Jan. ; 6th of March ; 28th of May ; 10th of July ; 3rd of Sept. ; 12th of Nov.

5th do. At or near Easton's Corners in the Township of Wolford, on the 21st of January ; 4th of March ; 30th of May ; 8th of July ; 5th of Sept. ; 14th of November.

6th do. In the Village of Beverly, on the 28th of Jan. ; 11th of March ; 20th of May ; 16th of July ; 10th of Sept. ; 25th of Nov.

### TOWNSHIP OFFICERS.

Township Meetings to be held annually on the first Monday in January, by notice of the Township Clerk, after receiving a warrant from any two Justices of the Peace acting for the division in which the Townships are situated, at such places as they may appoint. All Freeholders and Householders over 21 years of age are entitled to vote. The officers to be chosen are: one Township Clerk, one Assessor, one Collector, a sufficient number of persons to serve as Pound Keepers and Overseers of Highways, three Town Wardens, and by Stat. 4, Wm. IV, ch. 12, from three to eighteen Fence Viewers. No Magistrate is liable to serve; nor other person of t-ener than once in three years, without his consent. Persons elected are liable to a penalty, if they do not within 20 days after their appointment subscribe to a declaration, to be prepared by a Township Clerk. Town Meetings regulate matters relating to cattle running at large, fines for breach of rules, height and description of Fences, dangerous pits, obnoxious weeds, &c. For the duties of Township Officers generally, see chap. 29, 1st Victoria, 1837—8; also the By-laws of the District Council.

By the late District Council Act, two Councillors are to be elected in each Township having over 300 qualified voters, and one Councillor for each Township having a less number.

### STATUTE LABOUR, OR HIGHWAY RATES.

Every male inhabitant, from 21 years of age to 60, not rated on the Assessment Roll, are liable to work on the highways, two days. And by George III, chap. 8, section 2d, every person inserted on the Assessment Roll, is, in proportion to the estimate of his real and personal property, stated on the said Roll, held liable to work on the highway and Roads, in each year as follows: If his property be not rated at more than £25, two days; from that to £50, three

days ; from that to £75, four days ; from that to £100, five days &

For every £50 above £100, up to £500, one day ;

The Fractional part between the different sums, being always reckoned as a whole and giving one day.

Every person possessed of a waggon, Cart or Team of Horses Oxen, or beasts of burthen or draft, used to draw the same, is liable to work three days.

Indigent persons, oppressed by sickness, age, or having a large family can be exempted at the discretion of the Town Warden.

Any person liable can commute at 2s. 6d. der day, if he think proper.

#### THE GENERAL ASSESSMENT.

By the 59th Geo. III, chapter 7, section 2d, the following is deemed rateable property at the given valuation :—

Every Town Lot in Toronto, Kingston, Niagara, and Queenston, £50 ; every Town Lot in Cornwall, Sandwich, Johnstown, and Belleville, £25 ; every Town Lot on which a dwelling is erected in Brockville, £30 ; do. in Bath, £20 : every acre of arable pasture or meadow land, 20s. ; every acre of uncultivated land, 4s. ; every House built with Timber squared or hewed on two sides, of one story in height, & not 2 stories, with not more than two fire places £20 ; for every additional fire-place, £4 ; every Dwelling House built of squared or flatted timber on two sides, of two stories in height, with not more than two fire places, £30 ; and for every additional fire place, £8 ; every Framed House under two stories in height, with not more than two fire places, £35 ; and for every additional fire place, £5 ; every Brick or Stone House of one story in height, and not more than two fire places, £40 ; every additional fire place, £10 ; every Framed, Brick or Stone house, of two stories in height, and not more than two Fire places, £60 ; every additional Fire place, £10 ; every Grist Mill, wrought by water, with one pair of stones, £150 ; every additional pair, £50 ; every Saw Mill, £100 ; every Merchant's Shop, £200 ; every Store House, owned or occupied for the receiving and Forwarding of Goods, Wares or Merchandize, for hire or gain, £200 ; every Stud Horse kept for hire or gain, £199 ; every Horse of the age of three years & upwards £8 ; Oxen of the age of four years and upwards, per head, £4 ; Milch Cows, per head, £3 ; Horned Cattle from the age of two years to four years, per head, £1 ; every close Carriage with four wheels kept for pleasure, £100 ; every Phaeton or other open Carriage, with four wheels kept for pleasure only, £25 ; every Curricule, Gig, or other Carriage with two wheels kept for pleasure only £20 ;

every Waggon kept for pleasure only, £15; every Stove in a room where there is no fire place, to be considered a fire place.

All lands are rateable held in fee simple, or promise of a fee simple by land board certificate, order of council, or certificate of any Governor of Canada, or by lease. The sum levied in no case to exceed one penny on the Pound, for any one year.

The Queen, should she be possessed of, or in the actual occupation of any property in the Province, is excepted from the payment of Taxes.

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**INTERESTING FACTS.**—The surface of still water is curved 8 inches in a mile.

A person standing on the top of one of the Andes, is 1000 times as far from the earth's centre as he is from the level of the sea.

The distance of the moon is 60 times the semi-diameter of the earth

The distance of the sun is four hundred times that of the moon.

The apparent diameter of the sun is sometimes a little larger than that of the moon. Hence a central eclipse of the sun may be either total, as that of 1806, or annular, as that of 1831. When a man says that the sun seems to him to be a foot in diameter, it is because it seems to him to be only 116 feet off, for a circle of one foot at that distance, is just sufficient to hide the sun.

The diameter of the sun is 1000 times that of the earth.

The velocity of the earth in its orbit round the sun is 18 miles in a second: that is, 50 times that of a cannon ball, or 38 times that of sound, which is 1,142 feet or almost one-fourth of a mile per second,

The cause of the fixed stars appearing perpetually in the same position, is the immense distance. Astronomers conjecture them to be suns or centres of other systems as extended as our own.
