REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.

Your Board notice with much pleasure an increase in the number of Churches, individuals, and parties combined that sustain native preachers, as also the consequent increase of the number of the faithful men thus enabled to devote themselves to the diffusion of the light of the Gospel in benighted Burmah. As there were known to be zealous and efficient Burman preachers in the fields occupied by brethren Douglas

and Rose, and Karens of similar character in the department of the labours of brother Thomas, who must otherwise be engaged in worldly occupations for their sustenance, it was evidently desirable that these men should be employed under the supervision of the Missionaries residing near them, who would furnish reports to brother Crawley, our general Superientendent. From his statements, and their Reports communicated through him, the following particulars are gathered, and laid before the Convention, for the satisfaction of all concerned.

In a letter received on the 3d inst., dated Henthada, May 1st, 1866, after acknowledging the receipt of your Secretary's letter of February 6th, enclosing first of Exchange of bill for £135 stg., Rev. A. R. R. Crawley gives the information which now follows, respecting the native

preachers under his immediate supervision:—

"Ko Aing. This brother, though lacking but a few years of three score and ten, is active and laborious, as the pastor of the Church in this town. He is widely known among the most influential heathen, and much respected by 'those who are without.' He preaches much in town, but his labors are by no means confined there; and there are now several inquirers in the villages which he is accustomed to visit from time to time; and one place in particular, where he has been especially interested, gives most hopeful signs of the beginning of a new interest. Ko Aing is supported, as you are aware, by the Granville Street Church.

"Ko Yan Gin, sustained by the Truro Church, labours in the town of Zaloon and vicinity. He is a faithful and efficient preacher. There are some inquirers, and one applicant for baptism, in his field.

"Moung Doke Gyee and Moung Kyou are associated in labor at the village of Paing-young-nau. There being at this place nearly twenty Christians, it is in contemplation soon to organize a Church, and set within two mile apart Moung Kyou to the pastorate. Five baptisms were reported here four who have I at the Association in January last. Moung Doke Gyee is sustained by a Church-mos the Pine Grove, and Moung Kyou by the 1st Yarmouth Church.

"Moung Shway-tike. This young brother, supported by a sister in from month to the Truro Church, bids fair to be a sterling preacher. 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nation to the pastorate of the Church which he serves so well and so faithfully; and if my brother Missionaries, to whom I have written. coincide with me, he will probably be ordained a few months hence."

Brother Crawley adds :- "I note what you say respecting Nictaux and Pine Grove Churches uniting to support one preacher; and have accordingly altered the list so that Moung Doke Gyee appears supported by these two Churches; and Moung Than Shoon, the brother hitherto given to the Nictaux Church, will hereafter appear in the list as supported by parties under the designation, "Thy Kingdom Come." To be supported by "A Friend in Colchester," I have in view a young man, Moung Shwang-nyo. Please add his name to the list accordingly."

Moung Thu Hare, sustained by a friend in Charlottetown, P. E. I., and one in Halifax, it appears is stationed in Rangoon, under the supervision of Rev. A. T. Rose, from whom a definite report is expected shortly.

Under date of February 27th, brother Crawley says: "I informed you in a previous letter that Moung Myot-zou, of Bassein, had been appointed to be sustained by "A. T. and H. H. Morse and a friend;" and I have now the pleasure to inform you that Shway Oung, the preacher mentioned by Mr. Douglas, is appointed on the fund of the "North River Section of the Onslow Church, and Mrs. C. C. Scott." In the same letter he remarks: "As I said before, let me now repeat, none need withhold from giving for fear that preachers will not be found; for there is not a station in Burmah that would not be glad to receive assistance."

"Myatson, one of our Burman preachers under the care of brother Douglas, is thus spoken of by him: "When I returned to Bassein two years ago, he, his wife and son were the only Christians in the place, or within two miles of the place, where he resides; now there are twentyfour who have been baptized, and were, six months since, organized into a Church—most, if not all, of whom first heard the Gospel from him. He has travelled extensively in that part of the district, and hundreds by a sister is from month to month hear from him the way of pardon and life."

He has had the charge of a small church in Kyang meeting of A louge, but his principal labours have been divided between four other small villages, where have been young converts to look after. Four

have been baptized from under the care of Tu Pah.

"3d. Of Shway Tu I can truly say, as is written of one of old, 'He is a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost.' He was ordained to the work of the Gospel ministry in January last, but not simply as the pastor of a church. He has nine little churches under his care. He has visited all these at least once since his ordination. But the Christians in his parish are not the only persons who have heard the Gospel from Shway Tu. The heathen in three places, at some distance from his house, have heard, and some have believed. God, I trust, has blest Shway Tu's efforts in his own village. The members of two families seem to have given up all for Christ. So Shway Tu is now very busy. Indeed he has left his own house, and has gone to remain in the houses of the new worshippers, until they feel quite safe in the hands of God, with no heathen rites.

"4th. Too-tu Kyne is a faithful and capable man. He also has the care of a small church, but can well leave it in the care of his good father. This he is constantly doing, and thus he has time to bear the 'bread of life' to the heathen around him. There have been several conversions under his preaching during the past six months. The case of two of these converts is very interesting. They are young married people, but have been afflicted. They have lost all their four children. While in a village near this preacher, performing some heathen rites, he poured into their ears the words of God. They at once embraced the Gospel; and are now trusting in God through Christ.

"5th. Shway Too has been diligently laboring in connection with his church till within six weeks. He has now gone, at the solicitation of the heathen, to a new place. The heathen there promise, or say they desire, to believe. In the associational letter from his church, two conversions were reported. Oh that our brethren in Nova Scotia &c., could, this very day, know the circumstances of Shway Too! They would

then, most surely, join us in prayer for him,"

To this interesting and encouraging report of the labors of these indefatigable Karen preachers during six months, Bro. Thomas subjoins the following important remarks:—

"Now, my dear brother Crawley, do ask the dear brethren in Nova Scotia, if they are not nearly ready to send two missionaries to Henthada? Tell them we need two about as much as we do one. The Burmese disciples need one more to take your place: but we need a man for the Karen Department quite as much, and quite as soon. Here is a Karen field of a hundred miles square! I refer to the region inhabited by Karens north of the Bassein and Rangoon districts. It is quite impossible for one man to go to every place of interestin this wide field, even once in a year. If I visit at all carefully, east of the Irrawaddy, the west remains unvisited, and vice versa: for there are now at least a few Christians in more than sixty separate places in this district. The number of these places is constantly increasing.

"Will not our brethren in Nova Scotia [New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island,] feel some responsibility in this matter! The American Baptist Missionary Union will not, cannot, I fear, send two men, of even one, to this Mission. My only hope now is, that brethren will

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come to us from Nova Scotia. I am sure the Missionary Society's officers in Boston would be glad to see them doing more for this field. Let the brethren then understand that I am not only willing, but that with my whole soul I say, 'Come over and help us.'"

Our beloved brother Hilbert Black, who "did well that it was in his heart to go," has been taken from us by death. Will not then some other of our young men who are entering the ministry, respond to these impressive calls, and offer themselves for this much needed service? Doubtless many would aid in sustaining them, as well as the native

of the Mission School, in which Ma-O-Za (supported by the Baptist Sabbath School, Windsor) and another female have professed faith during the past year, Brother Crawley says, "The teacher is energetic and able. It is hoped that the number of pupils will soon be much increased, for the school is about to be removed into a building in the centre of the town." For this highly useful institution your Board solicit continued aid. It is likewise evidently desirable that a Karen School should be opened and sustained at Bassein, in accordance with

the desire expressed by brother Thomas in a former communication.

The cheering fact that seventeen faithful native Missionaries, supported by funds raised in these Provinces, are now laboring successfully in Burmah, and that their numbers and usefulness are constantly increasing, may well encourage the friends of this Mission to perseverance in earnest prayer, and to liberality in contributing for its furtherance.

Committee on Obituaries was relieved, and Rev. J. Davis and Rev. I. E. Bill were appointed to prepare suitable obituaries, and forward them to the Secretaries, for publication in the Minutes.

The Report of the Committee to consider certain questions connected with our Foreign Mission, was presented, and after brief discussion, adopted.

There are two matters referred to us as a special Committee relating to Foreign Missions: the *first*, whether the will of Oliver Randall has given the residue of certain monies bequeathed by him to the Board, in case his daughter Cynthia should die before coming of age and without heirs; and the *second*, whether the widow of the late Rev. Mr. Burpee, Burmese Missionary, should continue to receive further assistance, now that her sons, who have each been receiving £15 annually, have arrived at the age of 16 years, on which their allowance was to cease.

First, we would recommend that a case be prepared under the direction of both the Board and Executors, for the decision of the Court; in order that the latter, when they pay the amount, may be freed from responsibility, and the Board when they receive it may make use of it. This course may be taken with despatch, and comparatively small expense.

In the case of Mrs. Burpee, having found that the rule in such cases is to continue giving assistance to the widow so long as she remains such; and being now freed from paying £15 a year to the sons, we would recommend the continuance of an annual payment to her, making the amount more than it was while she received her son's money, that is the sum of £20.

Peter McLeod, James C. Steadman, and John W. Titus, all of New Brunswick, attended Lectures in the department of Arts, besides receiving instruction in Theology.

The studies of the past year have been conducted in general accordance with the curriculum. In addition to this, a large class has received instruction in French from Rev. Dr. Crawley during the last Term.

The Lectures on Theology and Ecclesiastical History were finished, and Lectures were delivered on the history of Baptism, and on Religious Denominations. Exegetical readings in the Greek Testament were conducted once a week. A course of Lectures on Biblical Interpretation was delivered to a class of candidates for the ministry studying in the Academy.

It is to be regretted that the number of Theological Students in the College has been smaller than in previous years; and your Board would urge upon the Churches the desirableness of seeking out and encouraging young men called of God, and possessing suitable gifts, to enter upon a course of study in the Academy and College.

It will be remembered that just previous to the last meeting of this Convention, James DeMill, Esq., unexpectedly resigned his position as Classical Professor. In view of this event, the following Resolution was passed by your body:

Whereas, The chair of Professor of Classics in Acadia College is rendered vacant by the resignation of Professor DeMill, and whereas we are informed that Rev. E. A. Crawley, D. D., one of the original founders of the Institution, and whose high scholarly attainments eminently qualify him to fill the vacant position with distinguished ability, is at liberty to accept an invitation to the College; and whereas our absent brother shares largely in the christian confidence and affection of the ministers and churches of this Convention;

Therefore Resolved, That this Convention recommend to the Board of Governors of Acadia College to extend to Dr. Crawley a cordial invitation to a Professor's chair in that Institution.

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Acting in accordance with the above recommendation, an invitation was immediately forwarded to Dr. Crawley by your Board.

In the meanwhile, as some time must necessarily elapse before hearing from Dr. Crawley, and before any arrangements could be made by him in view of this call, it was thought desirable by your Board to secure the services of the Rev. R. Somerville, A. M., of Wolfville, as Tutor in the College, until the vacant Professorship should be permanently filled.

Mr. Somerville discharged his duties to the entire satisfaction of the Board, until the close of the autumn Term.

Your Board are gratified to be able to state that the response of the Rev. Dr. Crawley was favorable; that he arrived in the Province of Nova Scotia, and commenced his duties in the College, in January last.

While your Board are thus enabled to congratulate the denomination on the accession to the Faculty of a gentleman so long and so closely identified with our educational interests in these Provinces, it is with deep regret they are compelled to intimate that the venerable President of the College, Rev. Dr. Cramp, has announced his intention of resigning the position so ably filled by him, at no distant day.

At a meeting of the Governors in March last, the President made certain statements to the above effect, and in view thereof it was considered advisable to hold a special meeting, to consider the question thus

unexpectedly brought before them.

Accordingly, a very large and influential meeting of the Board of Governors, Scholarship-holders, and other friends of Acadia College, was held in the College Library, pursuant to notice, on the second day of May last, at 10 o'clock, A. M., J. W. Barss, Esq., in the chair.

After some preliminary business, Dr. Cramp having been called upon by the Chairman, stated his reasons for the step he contemplated taking. The most perfect harmony existed between himself and other members of the Faculty. His motives were solely of a personal and individual character. Institutions of learning required the supervision of men in the full vigor of life. While he had endeavored faithfully and efficiently to discharge the duties of his office, he would not say that he possessed the energy and elasticity of former years. He had now been nearly fifty years in public life, and would prefer the tranquility of a less prominent position. There were some projects of a literary character, to the carrying out and finishing of which he desired to devote the evening of his days. He had given timely notice, in order that measures might be deliberately taken to secure the services of a successor. If it were deemed advisable also to reconstruct or enlarge the curriculum of study, especially in the Theological department, to meet the advancing requirements of the age, time would be afforded for this purpose.

After some further conversation, Dr. Cramp withdrew.

The brethren present then freely expressed their views in reference ainments emi to the important question before them. Dr. Cramp had found our institutions in a very depressed condition, and had been mainly instrumental in raising them to their present state of efficiency. He had labored most assiduously and energetically on their behalf. Deep regret was expressed that he should feel it to be his duty to retire. It was proposed that he should be earnestly pressed to withdraw his resignation; but as it was understood that any such effort would be fruitless, the following Resolution was proposed by the Rev. C. Tupper, D. D., seconded by D. McN. Parker, Esq., M. D., and passed unanimously:

"Resolved, That this meeting has learned with deep regret the Rev. Dr. Cramp's determination to resign the Presidency of Acadia College. In his official position at the head of the College, as a Governor, and as connected with our Institutions and the denomination generally, no language can express too strongly the appreciation in which he is held. His retirement, viewed from any stand-point, can only be regarded as a coalamity. The Board of Governors cannot admit that in any respect Dr. Cramp's age has impaired in the slightest degree his usefulness or efficiency.

"This Board would earnestly request that Dr. Cramp would remain in his present position at least another Collegiate year, in order that

suitable arrangements may be matured.

"Also Resolved, That this Board will endeavor to make such arrangements in the Theological department as will be satisfactory to Dr. Cramp."

The above Resolutions having been communicated to Dr. Cramp, he

signified his disposition to accede to the request of the Board.

Dr. Cramp will therefore remain in the responsible position he has occupied for another Collegiate year. A committee was appointed at the meeting, who will in the meantime employ themselves in devising measures to grocure a successor, and provide for the best interests of the Institution; but it should be remembered by this Convention that in order to keep the College even in its present state of efficiency, a much larger outlay will be required than is now made. Dr. Cramp, for several years past, has, with unexampled liberality, contributed four hundred dollars per annum of his salary, to meet current expenses. After the present year, we can no longer look to this source of supply. Unless, therefore, we are prepared to retrograde as a denomination, a much greater manifestation of liberality, and determination to support our beloved institutions, must be made.

More than this, we require at least two more Professors: one in the department of Theology, and one in the department of Arts. These wants should be kept steadily in view, and the Endowment Fund speedily

made up and secured.

In the matter of Agency, as will appear in the Treasurer's Report, comparatively little has been done during the past year. Your Board regret that they were unable to procure the services of the Rev. James E. Balcom, as sole agent, although he has been able to accomplish something by devoting a portion of his time to the object.

ACADIA COLLEGE-TREASURER'S REPORT.

To the Board of Governors of Acadia College-

I beg leave to submit, for your examination and approval, the anaccounts connected with the financial department of Acadia Colege. The Endowment Fund shows but a small increase on last year: bout £500 have been added. £350 of this sum was received from Princi- ale of dyke land as authorized by vote of Convention. Had an agent een in the field, no doubt but the result would be more favorable. The ecurities held by the Treasurer for your Board are of the most reliable kind; and the interest is paid with great regularity and punctuality. The Endowment Fund may be estimated as follows:—

The General Account will be found, as on previous years, balanced; and salaries are paid up to about this date. I have been assisted in meeting current claims by the Government grant of \$400, and a like amount generously given by the President of the College. It would have been impossible to meet all engagements without these sums. The repairs of the buildings are larger than usual, as you are aware that your Board found it imperative to have the premises put in good repair, as they were becoming dilapidated from former neglect, the funds not being sufficient for that purpose: as the work is still in progress the bills could not be settled, but I presume some \$400 will be needed to

pay the balance.

I need not repeat what I said last year respecting the contributions from the churches, only to add that indifference or neglect seems to increase from year to year; and the amount received, as will be shown by present account, is less than on any previous year since the appeal began to be made, and the whole amount is not greater than could be contributed by some one church in our body. The estimated income and disbursements are similar to last year, leaving a deficiency of about \$1000, to be met from such source as your Board may direct. The impression may prevail that a less sum than is asked for, would do from the churches; but this is incorrect, as the deficiency of income to meet salaries is taken from rents and other sources that are required for improvement and repairs of the premises, and in using these funds to supply the deficiency of income from the churches, there is a serious inconvenience felt in keeping the property in that state of repair that is absolutely necessary.

The question of agency is one that has been so frequently before your Board, that I need not dwell upon it; but would say in a word, what must be evident to all our denomination, that there is an imperative necessity to raise the Endowment immediately to a more respectable amount. A permanent agent, of wisdom, devotedness, and financial ability, should be sought for in the denomination, and no church should withhold their consent to reliaquishing their pastor for so important a work, as we have gone on from year to year amidst many discouragements. It becomes us to gratefully acknowledge the good providence of God in watching over this Institution, and the gradual improvement in the financial matters, with the strong desire felt by our young ment for a higher education, are unquestionable indications that the duty of the denomination at this time, is, peculiarly, to go forward.

Not that this amount of success should be regarded as satisfying the aspirations of Christian faith and hope; for we are warranted and encouraged to look for greater things than these, and we ought to ask for the continual rain from heaven, rather than occasional showers of grace. Nevertheless, any progress, however small, should be contemplated with thanksgiving, and animate us to vigorous and sustained effort.

That there is a large amount of unemployed talent in the churches, cannot be doubted. It will be a happy day for the Baptist denomination, when all its members shall recognize the fact that they are "members one of another," each being bound to "please his neighbour for his good to edification;" and when they shall all become so deeply conscious of obligation to "the Lord that bought them," as to live, not "unto themselves, but unto him who died for them, and rose again."

The cry for help is heard from every quarter. Many churches are destitute of pastors, and in many districts the moral wastes lie uncultivated. There is a growing demand for earnest, well-instructed labour 1866, ers. The churches are responsible to the Lord in this matter. It is Aug. 1. By bal their duty to seek out the gifts for edification that may be among them, and to encourage their improvement and use by all appropriate methods.

The destitution, so far as churches are concerned, may be partly tributable to indiscretion in the formation of churches where pastors labour cannot be adequately supported, and partly to hasty and incom siderate ordinations. The growth of knowledge and experience will remedy these evils; and your Committee would rather rely on such growth, aided by the exertion of salutary influence, than recommend any attempt to effect reform by legislation, since legislation would volve interference with that scriptural freedom of action which is right claimed by our churches, and is especially dear to Baptists.

On a review of the whole, the Committee repeat the suggestion former years, that the Churches be recommended to observe the firmer, on account Thursday in December as a day of thanksgiving and prayer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEPARTED BRETHREN.

committee on departed brethren reported, and Reort adopted :-

Chief among those whom the Head of the Church has removed from suggestion ong us during the past year, must be noticed the Rev. We extract the particulars rered for our present purpose from a memoir of our departed father in Treasure rist, furnished by Dr. Cramp to the Christian Messenger for January h and 17th, of this year.

Mr. Dimock was descended from pious ancestors, who, in 1760, emigrated to Nova Scotia from Connecticut, to escape the impositions to which they were there exposed, on account of their conscientious dissent from the "standing order" of that colony. He was born July 17th, 1777, and was ten years younger than his brother, the well known and justly honoured Joseph Dimock. In his thirteenth year he was "born again"—born into the heavenly kingdom. In 1799 he was baptized at Horton, by the late venerable T. S. Harding. He then became a consistent member of the Baptist Church formed at Newport in August, 1799, and consisting of nine persons. His father, Daniel Dimock, was another of these members, and was ordained pastor of the little church

in October, 1799, while himself was appointed deacon.

It was not until 1818, when more than forty years of age, that Mr. Dimock began to preach. In 1820 he became pastor of the church at Newport, being ordained in August of that year. He continued to sustain the pastoral relation thus formed until 1860. He laboured on, quietly but perseveringly, during the forty years of his pastorate. The Lord blessed his labours. His immediate charge grew under his hand. He lived to see Baptist Churches spring up in various places in Hants County, which, in the year of his death counted up more than nine hundred members. The nine in Newport, formed into a church in 1799, had increased more than a hundred-fold. On Saturday, September 30, 1865, he entered into the "rest that remaineth for the people of God." If Mr. Dimock was not what is called a great man, he was an eminently good man-great in his goodness, and greatly honoured for his goodness, "in his own country"—the land of his nativity, of his whole life, natural and religious both, and of his prolonged and useful ministry. And there, too, he "sleeps in Jesus," his spirit joined to the fellowship of the "just men made perfect," and waiting in calm and joyful expectation for the coming resurrection.

In the Messenger for August 29, of the present year, the Rev. M. P. Freeman has supplied a sketch of the life of the late Rev. W. Dobson, of which we here avail ourselves. He was born at Little River, Cumberland County, N. S., February 19, 1818. When he was about thirty years of age, it pleased God to "call him by his grace." Soon after this he was baptized by Dr. W. Hobbs, and became a member of the Baptist Church in his native place. By and by he was elected a deacon of the same church. Then in 1858 he was sent out by his brethren to preach the Gospel, and in July, 1859, he received ordination as an evangelist. He laboured as an evangelist in various portions of his ministerial life, at Tryon, P. E. I., and in the western portion of that Island, and again at Pugwash, at Point de Bute, and at other places on the main land. In these efforts the Lord was with him, and gave efficiency to the ministry of his servant-particularly at Tryon, at Pugwash, and in the western portions of P. E. I. In September, 1860, he became pastor of the churches at Bedeque and Tryon, P. E. I., sustaining this relation until the summer of 1862. In the autumn of last year he returned to P. E. I., after a season of absence from it, to finish his work, and to die. Through the last autumn, and then through the succeeding winter, he performed pastoral labor at Tryon, continuing to do so until the month of March, on the eighth day of which month he closed his eyes on earth and opened them in heaven. His ministerial course was brief, but useful

His death was safe and happy, yea triumphant, though without the signs of rapture. He was taken away in his 49th year, when he had in him as yet, to all appearance, much strength for continued work. But his Master has done with him as he pleased, and our brother now pursues a loftier career, in the pure, and perfect, and endless world to which he has been thus early translated—too soon for those who loved him here, but in good time for Him who loved him with an infinite and all-wise regard.

Rev. Levi H. Marshall, son of the late Elisha Marshall, of Wilmot, N. S., entered the ministry as a licentiate in 1843, and was ordained in 1847. He served, during his pastoral life, the churches of Argyle, Onslow, and Londonderry, N. S., and the churches of Sackville, Harvey, and Hopewell, N. B. In each and all these places, he was made a blessing, in the conversion of sinners, and in the promotion of truth, and was highly esteemed as a sincere Christian and as a good minister of the Lord Jesus. His last illness was very protracted, and he was for years laid aside from active labour, but the Gospel which he so faithfully preached to others, sustained him in the hour of trial. He lingered until April 15, 1866, when, at his residence at Hopewell, he resigned his spirit into the hands of his covenant God and Father, in the joyful assumance of a blessed resurrection to everlasting life.

The Minutes of the Western Association contain the following notices, prepared by Rev. Dr. Spurden;

Since the report of last year, others of our number have been called away. Isaac Lawrence, a brother dearly beloved and highly esteemed by the community where he laboured for a short time, was early removed from the scene of his useful though unostentatious labours. His affectionate disposition endeared him to all who knew him, and though the promise of future usefulness was cut short by death, yet we rejoice in the thought that while he lived, he lived not in vain.

Bro. E. McInnis also has been removed from the Church on earth to the Church in Heaven. He was latterly engaged as a missionary in the vicinity of St. John, but for some time previously to his death he suffered much bodily indisposition, and was laid aside from active duties. He was a good man, and much esteemed in the sphere of his labours. May we all follow the faith of those who are gone, and at last enjoy with them the promised rest.

Voted unanimously, That the thanks of the Convention be tendered to the brethren of the City of St. John, for their kindness in entertaining the members of the Convention on the present occasion.

Constitution of the Baptist Convention

OF

NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK AND P. E. ISLAND.

I. That the Convention be called "The Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island," and shall consist of the Members and Delegates hereinafter specified.

II. That the objects of the Convention shall be to maintain the following Institutions, viz.: Acadia College and Foreign Missions; and to advance the interests of the Baptist denomination generally, by devising and carrying out, as far as possible, such means as may, by the Divine blessing, tend to promote its welfare.

It is earnestly recommended that at the Annual meetings of the Associations, brethren be appointed to furnish Reports to the Convention on the State of Religion and the progress of the cause of God, within Lute's W. 0. the limits of those Associations respectively.

III. That the business of the Convention shall be conducted by a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries (one residing in Nova Scotia, and the other in New Brunswick), and a Board r, Jemseg, Co of Directors, consisting of twenty-five members, all of whom shall be members of Baptist Churches, in good standing (in addition to Life Directors), to be chosen annually by the Convention. The Board to have the power to fill up any vacancies that may occur previous to the next Harvey, A. C. meeting of the Convention.

IV. That every member of a Baptist Church, in good standing, who shall pay annually ten shillings or upwards towards any of the objects Embraced in the Union Societies, or into the funds of the Convention, and also every ordained Baptist minister in the three Provinces, in good standing, shall be a member of the Convention; any person payng five pounds or upwards shall be a life member; and the payment of wenty pounds or upwards, at one time, shall constitute a life director. Wery Church connected with an Association, and contributing ten shilags towards any of the objects embraced in the Union Societies, shall

be a member of this Convention, and be at liberty to send one delegate to represent such Church, and if five pounds are collected, two delegates. Every local Union Society collecting annually five pounds or upwards, shall be a member of this Convention, and shall be at liberty to send two delegates to represent them therein, and one delegate for every additional five pounds collected: so as no Church or Union Society be at liberty to send more than five delegates; and that each Association connected with the Convention be allowed to send five delegates. The Missionary and Educational Boards shall also be at liberty to send one delegate each.

V. That all monies contributed by individuals for membership, or for the general purposes of the Convention, shall be appropriated, after the payment of incidental expenses, as the Convention shall direct, unless otherwise ordered by the donors.

VI. That the Board of Directors shall be empowered to meet quarterly, or oftener, for the despatch of business, at such places as the Convention shall from time to time appoint; nine members shall form a quorum. The Board shall also be empowered to convene special meetings of the Convention, whenever the same may be judged necessary by a majority of its members.

VII. That the Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 18th day of August, annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body; when, in addition to the appointment of the Office-bearers and Board of Directors, and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the meeting in accordance with Article 2 of this Constitution, a Missionary Board or Boards shall be chosen, each consisting of fifteen members of the Convention, all of whom shall be members of Baptist Churches, in regular standing. These Boards shall hold their meetings at such places as the Convention shall annually appoint; at least one-third of the members of each Board shall reside in the place of meeting, or in its vicinity; and five shall constitute a quorum.

The Convention shall also appoint, once in three years, six Governors of Acadia College, in place of six who will then go out in rotation, in accordance with the Resolution passed by this Convention at its annual meeting in September, 1859, and in accordance with the Act 14 Vic. of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, chap. 37.

VIII. That this Constitution may be altered or amended at any Annual Meeting of the Convention, by two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

Rule 1.—At every sitting, business shall be opened and concluded with prayer.

RULE 2.—Ministers and members of Churches, not Delegates, invited to a seat with us, may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.

Rule 3.—No member of the Convention shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.

RULE 4.--The names of Delegates leaving the Convention without permission of the body, before the conclusion of the business, shall be publicly reported in the Minutes.

Rule 5.---No object shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded.

RULE 6.---No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.

RULE 7.--Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.

RULE 8 .--- The Moderator of the Convention shall nominate all Committees, unless otherwise ordered by the Convention.

RULE 9 .--- These Rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair immediately after the opening of the Convention.
