The baccalaureate sermon was given by the Rev. Dr. Saunders in Assembly hall on Sunday afternoon. The speaker spoke from Galatians vi. 10.

The display of work in the manual training held in the "Edward Young Manual Training Hall" at the close of the exercises was much admired.

LADIES' SEMINARY.

Despite the showers of Tuesday night a very large audience attended the closing exercises of the Seminary held on that evening.

HORTON COLLEGIATE ACADEMY.

The anniversary exercises in connection with the Horton Collegiate Academy took place on Tuesday afternoon.

The programme for the afternoon was much enjoyed. Music was furnished by Messrs Slipp, Leonard, Goudey, Miss Lina Burgess and by Academy and Seminary choruses.

Of a class of twenty-four students six delivered papers. William H. Dyer, discussed in an intelligent manner "The Power of Habit."

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The poem by Miss Grace Harriet Patriguin, of Wolfville, on the classic motto "Perseverando" evinced considerable poetical merit, and was charmingly rendered.

Diplomas in various courses of work were presented to the class of seventeen, after which the class was addressed by Dr. Steele, of Amherst, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, N. B., and Hon. J. W. Longley.

Seldom on previous years have the Anniversary exercises been more largely attended than on this. On Wednesday at the public meeting for conferring degrees, the hall was not nearly large enough to seat all of the large audience which assembled.

Mr Franklin S. Morse, of Digby, in a very thoughtful manner treated "The Permanency of British Civilization," showing that the argument for its decline from the analogy of other nations did not hold, and that the nature of the British constitution and the Empire were adopted to perpetuate its constitution.

Mr Fred Fenwick, of Bonnet, Montana, discussed the "Monroe Doctrine." The object in view in first originating it was self-defence, and in the case of the Venezuelan dispute it could not correctly be applied.

Mr Lyman M. Denton, of Little River, N. S., delivered a much appreciated essay on the "Aesthetics of Rhythm."

Mr Frank E. Bishop, of Somerset, in a very philosophical manner discussed on Societas as a Revealer of Unwritten Law.
