SUDDEN DEATH OF PROMINENT CITIZEN

The death of Hon. Donald Morrison occurred at the Miramichi Hospital, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 4th, at 4.15 o'clock. The late Mr. Morrison, became critically ill about 10 days previous to his death, and was immediately taken to the Hospital where everything possible was done, but all of no avail. The community was grieved to hear of his sickness and subsequent death, and not only Newcastle and the Miramichi, but the Province at large has lost one of its most prominent and ambitious citizens. Deceased was born at Blunt Church in 1851, and came to Newcastle when a young man and was employed as clerk for a number of years by the late Mr. Davidson. He then entered into business for himself and for a great number of years conducted a Dry Goods and Furniture Business in the Morrison Block on Castle St. in Newcastle, and also did a large business in blueberries.

He married Miss Janie Fish daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Fish and resided on Pleasant Street.

In religion deceased was a Presbyterian, and for many years was a member of the Board of Trustees of St. James' Church acting in the capacity of Financial Secretary to the Board. He was a staunch Conservative in politics, and was the standard bearer of the Conservative party for the Federal House in 1911, in which contest he was defeated by a small majority by the present representative W. S. Loggie, M. P. For many years he was one of Northumberland's representatives in the Provincial Assembly at Fredericton, and while there faithfully served his constituency. In 1910 he was Speaker of the House at Fredericton, and resigned the honorable position to accept the candidacy for the Conservative Party in the Federal Election in 1911.

He was mayor of Newcastle for a number of years and also served as Alderman. For the past few years deceased was Fishery Inspector for Northern New Brunswick and in that capacity gave most efficient service. He was largely interested in the lumber business, and was Managing Director of The Newcastle Steamboat Co. Ltd.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons and one daughter Sydney of Vancouver, B. C. Leroy and Ray at home and Mrs. Clarence Wright of Fort Fairfield, Maine, U. S. A.

His two sons Sydney and Leroy are veterans of the Great War, and Sydney served in the South African War.

The funeral of the late Mr. Morrison which was one of the largest held in Newcastle took place from

his late residence, Monday afternoon, Sept. 6th at 3 o'clock, under the auspices of L. O. E. No. 47, of which society deceased was a faithful member. Services at the house and graves were conducted by Rev. L. H. MacLean, pastor of St. James' Presbyterian Church. The pallbearers were Messrs. E. A. McCurdy, A. G. Paton, W. A. Park, James T. C. C. Stubbins, and John B. B. Interment in St. James' Cemetery Undertakers: Thom, Shilly & Son.

BLACKVILLE HORSE LOWERS RECORD

Houlton, Me., Sept. 3.—After two days' postponement the card of the Houlton fair was nearly made up today, with racing from sunrise to sunset with twenty-two heats and many exciting finishes. The track record was broken by Bill Sharon, Archie Alcorn's trotter from Blackville (N. B.), which stopped the second heat of the 2.19 class in 2.12 1/4. Blagen Worthy, the Halifax trotter took the 2.30 trot in three straight heats. Harry Nevers of Houlton, had a big day driving winners in three classes. The crowd on the grounds today was estimated at 70,000.

The unfinished races brought over from Tuesday were finished, three more heats were run off before the Fredericton pace, Roy Volo won the 2.13 mixed, dropping two heats to Commodore Douglas. Northern Mac and Marion L. landed first and second money in the 2.30 pace. The 2.25 class was called off with first and second money going to the Boston horses, Alfred King and Neptune Boy of the Frank Fox string.

Four races, including the \$1,000 race-for-all, are on the card for Saturday.

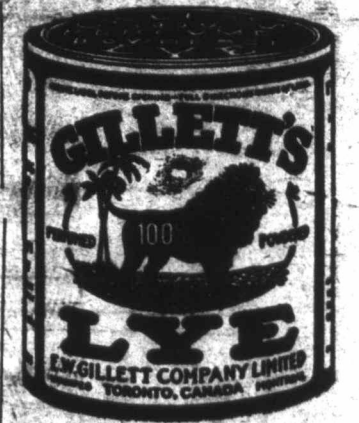

Two howitzer guns captured from the Germans during the war have arrived at Fredericton from the director of war trophies at Ottawa, being part of the number allotted to the government of New Brunswick to be placed in suitable positions in the provincial capital.

In all six guns have been allotted to New Brunswick, the other four being those which arrived here two months ago from Ottawa consigned to the mayor of Fredericton and which it was believed at the time were the allotment to the city.

More Print Paper Must be Provided

That the shortage of essentials is due to the world wide war is axiomatic, but the deficit in print paper has more far reaching results than that of almost any other commodity, incidental directly and indirectly, it affects everybody.

Within the last year or two even the layman has become familiar with the term wood pulp, and realizes now, if never before, that a shortage of print paper is vital. Newspapers that had their quota of advertising and circulation have suspended for no other reason than their inability to procure print paper to continue their publications.

One of the results is that considerable capital has been taken out of use. Another is that thousands who know no other occupation have been deprived of their means of livelihood and driven into other lines for which they are unfit. This has increased the demand for expert labor which being scarce has caused a higher scale of wages.

A higher wage means a higher cost of living, of which everybody has heard too much. Like begets like, from an economical point of view.

The suspension of a newspaper deprives a community of a knowledge of events. This creates a state of ignorance. Ignorance means suspicion. A suspicious man or woman is more or less dangerous.

It is up to everybody to assist in every possible way every effort that is being made to supply the demand for the production of print paper.

Canada Has No Cause for Worry


Cleveland Plain Dealer: The situation in which Canada now finds her trade with this country, instead of being peculiar, can be paralleled in the trade of practically every nation of the world. The United States sells to England wheat and cotton of greater value than the English manufactures she imports; she also imports from Brazil coffee much greater in value than the manufactured articles which she sells to Brazilians. England in her turn imports from Brazil produce the value of which is much less than that of the manufactured goods sold in Brazil. All three of these countries present with regard to one of the others a situation entirely analogous to that of Canada and the United States. Yet in every case the surplus of imports from one source is paid for by a surplus of exports to another. A country having the undeveloped resources of Canada and a highly industrious people should be the last to express concern over her trade balance. Even a considerable excess of total imports over total exports would, now that foreign capital is being invested in her railways and industrial enterprises, be no cause for alarm. She will still find advantage in buying in the cheapest source of supply, irrespective of the amount of her own industrial products that may be disposed of there.

SOLDIER'S INSURANCE

The returned soldiers' assurance act, passed by parliament last session, came into effect on Sept. 1st. Applications are now being received and policies will be issued as rapidly as possible.

Any returned soldier who served in the military or air forces of Canada in the great war or who was domiciled or resident in Canada on Aug. 4, 1914, and served in any of His Majesty's naval, military, or air forces, or in the armed powers, may obtain life insurance under the act.

Witness of returned soldiers who have died after retirement or honorably discharge from the service, and having the signature of 1,000,000 soldiers from the coming into force of the act, are also eligible for insurance.

Ocean Freights Coming Down

"Prices are coming down in almost all commodities," said Robert Dollar, president of the Robert Dollar Steamship Company of the Pacific Coast. This statement was made from his knowledge of the carrying trade of the oceans of the world.

"At the present time," he said, "ships can be obtained twice as cheap on the Clyde as they can be built in the United States or in Canada. I am not as familiar with Canadian prices as I am with the United States ones, but there is no question as to facts. Cargo boats can be bought on the Clyde and brought over here with a great saving over having them built here.

"Ordinary cargo boats today are selling on the Clyde at twenty pounds or one hundred dollars a ton. When the money is sent from the United States and the difference in the money of the two countries is taken into account because of the exchange situation this means just about \$70 per ton in United States money. The same ships in the United States cost \$100 a ton to build. I expect the Canadian prices are not far off this figure."

"Ocean freights are coming down materially. At the present time

charters are being made from the lower provinces in Canada to the United Kingdom at 100 shillings. A year and a half ago, the rate was 300 shillings.

Hon. Dr. Smith To Resign From Foster Govt?

Fredericton, Sept. 1.—Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines, is said by the Gleaner today to be about to retire from the provincial government.

In political circles this morning it was declared that Dr. Smith had already tendered his resignation to the lieutenant-governor, but this was officially denied, although it is unofficially admitted by his colleagues in the cabinet that the retirement of the minister of lands and mines is expected.

Incidentally Dr. Smith is not here for the meeting of the government and told the Gleaner over the long distance telephone today that he would not be here. While denying that he had tendered his resignation to the lieutenant-governor Dr. Smith declined to discuss his intentions and would not say whether or not he was preparing to resign. Private business engagements, he said, prevented him from attending the meeting of the government here, and pressure of private business is being given as the reason for his impending retirement by his colleagues in the cabinet.

The Gleaner says, however, that rates of stumpage for lumber cut upon the Crown Lands and matters connected with the location of New Brunswick's first game preserve are the questions over which the differences have occurred causing the first resignation that has taken place in the Foster cabinet.

One of the government caucuses last evening was the occasion when the row over the game preserve was staged, says the Gleaner. "The location which had been approved by Dr. Smith as Minister of Lands and Mines, for the sanctuary interfered with hunting grounds and other interests in Victoria county, and Hon. J. P. Tweedale, Minister of Agriculture, after the matter had been often discussed at cabinet meetings, took the question to the caucus as a court of last resort. The result was a stinging row before all the government supporters, which caused a lot of talk about the liberties but never reached the public print. When the stumpage question came up it is said Dr. Smith personally favored a rate not less than \$7 a thousand and it is even declared that, supported by his deputy minister, he thus recommended to the government as Minister of Lands and Mines. The government's decision was a 15 rate and Dr. Smith's impending retirement is said to be the direct result.

When Premier Foster was asked this morning if Hon. Dr. Smith had resigned, he declined to either confirm or deny the report and said he had nothing to say on the matter at this time.

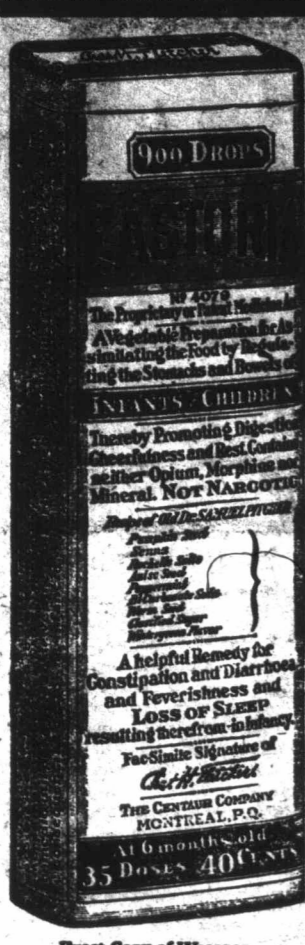

VACCINATION OF EMPLOYEES

The following is published for the information of the public, generally, and especially of those directly concerned

1. "Section 80 of "The Public Health Act, 1918," being § George V., Chapter 50, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:

"No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other place wherein the employees come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless and until each person produces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate, signed by a regularly qualified medical practitioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate that he is immune to vaccination as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had the disease and no employer shall employ any person in employment as set forth above, without such certificate being produced. When any person contracts small-pox, who is at the time of the inception of his sickness employed as set out in this section, or was so employed within fourteen days prior to the inception of his sickness, and who has not complied or been required to comply by said employer or employer's representative, with the foregoing provisions prior to his employment, then in such case the employer shall be primarily liable to pay all such costs, charges and expenses as the sub-district Board of Health concerned may have incurred in necessarily protecting the public health; provided such charges, costs and expenses were incurred in or about the necessary precautions relative to, or immediately appertaining to, any such case of small-pox, and such costs, charges and expenses may be used for and recovered with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liability shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act.

The terms and conditions of this section shall not become operative until the first day of July, A. D., 1920."

Power Project Moving Along

The engineers of the New Brunswick commission have been actively engaged in the preliminary plans for the works, many of which have been looked over and approved by Henry Holgate, the consulting engineer. Mr. Holgate has set his seal of approval on the general scheme of development by which not only the cities and towns of the province will receive the benefit of cheaper light and power, but the municipalities will also share in the convenience.


It is planned to supply current from Musquash and Logansport to all points from the source of supply through St. John and Moncton, where the system will be linked up with that from the North Shore. The power from the Shogomoc will be used to supply the St. John river valley, connecting at St. John with the Southern line. It is understood that the commission will be in position to ask for tenders for the first work in the near future.

Canada's Customs \$23,000,000 Higher

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—Customs receipts for the five months of the fiscal year ending today show an increase of \$23,108,359 over those for the same period in 1919. From the first of April to the end of August this year, total customs receipts were \$90,544,330 while during the same period in 1919 they were \$67,435,971. For the month of August alone the increase as compared with August last year was \$2,703,549, the

Roads Must Take Canadian Funds

The interstate commerce commission suspended pending investigation, rules of certain southwestern railroads requiring payment of freight charges in United States currency on through shipments to Canada.

Some doubt was expressed as to the right of carriers to impose such a rule on traffic moving in Canadian territory and the commission postponed the effective date of the regulations until December 29.

Applications of the requirement to traffic between points in the United States was not affected by the suspension.

Small Attendance At Normal School

The number of students who have applied for admission to the Provincial Normal School for the coming year, shows a big decrease compared with attendance in former years. This year only 178 students have applied for instruction at that institution, this number being between 40 and 50 less than last year's classes. Compared with the classes of a few years ago, when upwards of three hundred students attended the Normal School, the attendance has fallen off about 40 per cent.

Forty-five applications for 1st class, 127 applications for 2nd class and 31 for 3rd class have been received up to date.

With a shortage, at present, in the number of teachers in this Province the falling off in the attendance at the Normal School is regarded as indicating even more serious conditions for the future.

Electrical Storm Does Heavy Damage

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 31.—A woman killed by lightning in her home, and some six or seven barns burned as the result of the severe electrical storm which passed over this section this morning, marked the worst thunder storm experienced in Moncton and the surrounding country for some years. Mrs. Alpha W. Bourque was struck by an electric bolt while sitting in her home, and died about half an hour later. Mrs. Bourque was sitting near an open stove-pipe hole in the chimney when hit. Her sister was in the same room and was slightly stunned. The eaves were stripped from the feet of the stricken woman and her shoulders badly burned by the deadly fluid.

Seven barns burned.

Barns belonging to George Hopper at Little River, Emerson Steadman and John Hour, Salisbury Road; Charles Mason, Springhill, Kings county), and two barns at Meadow Brook were hit by lightning during the storm and burned, together with the contents. The lightning did not hit in Moncton city, the storm being less severe here than in the surrounding districts.

Mrs. Bourque, the victim of the tragic death, was thirty-five years old and leaves a husband and seven young children.

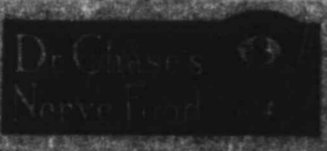

Big Increase In the Price of School Books

Although school books have steady-
ly advanced in price the last two
years, the provincial government's
school book department is still sup-
plying them at the price fixed nearly
twelve years ago. This means that
they are being sent out at a loss in
some instances of more than one hun-
dred per cent, and the people who
have children of school age are reap-
ing the benefit of it. For upwards of
a month past the department has
been sending out from \$2,000 to
\$3,000 worth weekly, the shipments
being made to every part of the
province. It is estimated that the
revenue from school books for the
year will amount to \$30,000, while
the expenditure will be in excess of
\$40,000. The advance in the cost
has been general all along the line.
For instance readers which sell at
3 cents cost 7 1/2 cents; the 7 cent
readers cost 12 1/2 cents and the ten
cent ones 22 cents. The arithmetic
which sell at 10 cents now cost the
department 23 cents. The govern-
ment has to pay a sales tax on all
purchases in addition to the freight
and postage, but the tax is not passed
along to the vendors. A discount
of fifteen per cent on the purchase
price is allowed to the vendors.
All of the school books being
handled by the department this year
were ordered prior to last December
and the government got the benefit
of the price then prevailing. There
has since been sharp advances in
the price of paper, which means that
the province will be in for much
higher prices on school books next
year.

Borden May Be Minister For Dominion

While Sir Auckland Geddes' visit
to Ottawa is primarily to attend the
annual conference of the Canadian
Bar Association, it is known that
while there he is informally dis-
cussing with Premier Meighen the
forthcoming appointment of a Ca-
nadian Minister Plenipotentiary to
Washington.

The status which the Canadian
representative is to enjoy was, of
course, definitely agreed upon some
time ago, but there still remains the
hardly less difficult task of securing
a man suitable for the post.

Talk of Sir Robert
Sir Robert Borden can have the
appointment if he desires it, but for
the time being Sir Robert seems
more interested in the role of the
fisherman than in state affairs, and
he has not given the least indication
that he desires the appointment.
Should he refuse, there is a likeli-
hood that Premier Meighen's next
choice will be between Sir George
Perley or Sir Douglas Hagen. When
the creation of the Washington post
was contemplated once before Sir
Douglas Hagen was practically se-
lected for it. It is understood the
appointment will be announced with-
in the next few weeks.

THE BEAVERBROOK SCHOLARSHIP
Although September 1 was set as the date for receiving applications for the Lord Beaverbrook scholarships to be awarded New Brunswick high school graduates, it is expected that the governors of the trust will give consideration to any additional applications which may be received up to the time of their meeting. A number of St. John and other students have made applications and it is hoped that announcement of the awards can be made within a few days.

NEW INSPECTOR FOR ST. JOHN

R. in the New Brunswick district, has been appointed district chief inspector under the Prohibition Act for the St. John district.
