



Pittsburg Miners Strike

Special Evening Telegram.

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 31. At midnight to-day approximately orty thousand Union coal diggers in District No. 5. United Workers of Amrica, will strike. At that time the 908-1909-1910 wage contract expired. As yet the operators of the district have not signed new agreements for the ensuing year. It is believed, however that the strike in this district will be of short duration. It is said on authority that a temporary agreenent will be reached between District Union officials, and operators which will allow nine operators to go forward with little delay pending the settlement of the entire dispute. The differences in the Pittsburg District between miners and operators cover vorking hours, the use of certain permissible explosives and a demanded increase of 5 cents per ton on run of nine coal.

Opposition Wants a Strong Second Chamber.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 31.

The official opposition amendment o Premier Asquith's resolutions on the Veto powers of the House of Lords was moved in the House of Commons to-day by Sir Robert Finlay. It declares in favor of a stror and efficient second chamber and expresses willingness to consider proposals for the reform of the Upper House, but declines to proceed with the Government's proposals which would destroy the usefulness of any second chamber. Winston Spencer Churchill made an important contribution to the debate. He declared that when the Veto resolutions were disposed of they would advance with the Budget regardless of the consequences. Unless the House of Commons carried the Budget it was idle. he said, to look to the King or to the country to carry the Veto Bill, but he predicted that at the proper time and under the proper circumstances they would succeed in carrying both the Veto and Budget measures to the steps of the throne. Mr. Churchill closed with a significant statement: The time for action, he said has arrived. Since the Lords have used their Veto to affront the Prerogative of the Crown and have invaded the rights of the Commons, it has become necessary that the Crown and the Commons acting together should restore the balance of the constitution and restrict forever the Veto of Lords. Premier Asquith's guillotiaing motion, which is published tonight, provides that the committee stage of all three Veto resolutions shall be concluded on the night of April 14th.

Train Blown Down an Embankment.

TRIESTA, March 31.

The flercest tornado in years, aced immense damage and loss of life in Southern Austria: A passenger train was blown off the rails near Miggia and rolled down an embankment, killing four persons and injuring 12. Steamer navigation has been suspended as great damage has been done in the harbor. Several steamers of the Austrian line dragged anchors and narrowly escaped disaster.

No Tariff War Between Canada and United States

In the latest papers from the United States we read about the great public agitation against monopolies. The case of the most famous monopoly of all, The Standard Oil, is befcre the Supreme Court of the United States on final appeal, and judging from the remarks of the Judges this gigantic monopoly will be heavily punished. An enquiry is also going on before a committee of the Senate on the cause of high prices throughout the Republic. The great Democratic Party are of course all against monopolies and high protection, but not only this great party but also the general public of America are being roused against the corrupt Protectionist Ring and their monopolies and consequent high prices for all the necessaries of life. The worst and most indefensible of all these corrupt gangs is the Gloucester Fish Ring; of al! burdensome taxes there is none that touches the public so generally as a tax on food.

All over England and other European Countries fish is the common food of the poor everywhere cheap, especially such common fishes as the herring and the cod. Only in America are they excessively dear, due entirely to monopoly and protection. Herring all over Europe are a shilling or 24 cents a dozen; all over the United States they are never less than sixty cents a dozen. Cod in Europe is generally eight cents a pound: in America it is never by retail less than 25 cents a pound. Salmon is still higher. Oysters are the only fish product that can be bought at a reasonable price. The tax on all foreign cod is three-quarters of a cent per pound, when the heavy freight is added this makes a fish trade with the United States almost prohibitory. America with its eighty-seven millions or wealthy inhabitants is the natural fish market of British North America. Two things stand in the way of. cheaper fish for the multitude -the high tariff and combination amongst the fish dealers to keep up prices.




