



Cold Storage.

In view of the Cold Storage Act, passed last session, giving extraordinary concessions to two American citizens of Portland, Maine, it will be of interest to our readers to learn that fishing merchants in the States who handle fishery products in Cold Storage, are much put out by what is known as the Hayburn Cold Storage Bill, now under consideration by the Committee on Manufactures of the United States Senate. A committee representing those affected is looking after their interests.

The following extracts from their case as given in the New York Fishing Gazette should prove interesting:

The committee directly represents and speaks for producers of salt water fish in all the Atlantic Coast States and on the Pacific Coast; practically the entire wholesale, producing and distributing trade of Fulton Market, New York; T. Wharf Market, Boston; Dock Street Market, Philadelphia, and Portland, Me.; a portion of the concerns engaged in the production and distribution of halibut and salmon on the Pacific Coast; and for practically all the freezing and cold storage plants on the Atlantic Coast, whose entire business is founded on the salt water fish industry.

"The salt water fish industry does not oppose the Hayburn Bill as a whole or the general principles thereof."

"We favor regulations requiring specific and detailed reports at any and all times by cold storage warehousemen and the trade generally, showing the quantities in cold storage, the length of time in storage, etc., and we favor general publicity with respect to these reports."

"The Hayburn bill, however, contains five distinct provisions all vital to our industry, any one of which if enacted into law in its present shape will either wholly or partly destroy the industry. None of these provisions as at present drafted can be of any benefit to the consumer, and will, in fact, work as much harm to the consumer as to the producer. Broadly speaking, these provisions are as follows:

- (1) Fish, or the manufactures or products thereof, cannot be held in cold storage for a longer period than three months.
- (2) Any article of food held in cold storage for any period, moved from cold storage, and returned again to cold storage, shall be deemed to be adulterated.
- (3) No article of food once frozen in cold storage shall be sold or offered for sale except in a frozen condition.
- (4) Any article of food which has been thawed so as to alter its appearance and make it resemble a fresh unfrozen product, shall be deemed to be adulterated.

Will Build Cheese Weighing Six Tons.

Appleton, Wis., July 6.—N. Simon of this city has just obtained a contract for the National Dairy Show Association to build a cheese weighing 12,000 pounds. It will require all the milk from 6,500 cows for one day, and it is estimated it will take 65 tons, or 130,000 pounds of milk and cream. The work will be done by 18 expert cheesemakers and 25 helpers on a specially constructed flat car.

Caught Trout With a Diamond.

Jack London Tells Wondrous Fish Yarn.

Lake Crescent, Wash., July 9.—Tucked snugly in the heart of the Olympic Mountains in Northwestern Washington is Lake Crescent. The chief attraction at present is the author, Jack London. Just why Mr. London chose this region for an outing when the rugged mountains, the Sierra range, are near the author's Californian home, is because of a desire of his sporting blood to respond to a new call of the wild.

In Lake Crescent around the renowned Beardslee trout, found nowhere else in the world. To feel the tug of one on the end of a casting line and to caress its spotted sides, brought London here to spend five weeks.
He came here with the avowed intention of remaining until he had captured a Beardslee trout. For four days he went out in the morning and rowed back at night, ate his meals and retired to his tent. Not a word was said. Guests saw him bring in strings of fine speckled and Dolly Varden trout, but not a Beardslee.

Among the guests is Alexander Pantages, who learned of London's great desire and planned to play a little trick on the author. One morning he approached London at breakfast and offered to bet him \$195 against all the money London had in his pockets that he would not catch a good Beardslee trout during his stay.

London found \$3, and they left the money with the innkeeper. In the flat bottomed boat assigned to each guest, London rowed across the lake, fully five miles, and fished all day. His boat was fairly swamped with various species of trout and some landlocked salmon. But in spite of 47 changes of flies and three hours of trolling, not a Beardslee trout even made a strike at hooks and spoons.

Suddenly the author was seized with an inspiration. Selecting a wondrously well made trolling spoon, London took his diamond pin and tied it to the gut leader, an inch above the cluster of hooks, and then bent to the task of trolling the placid waters of the cove. Hardly had the hook touched the water when a strike was caught, to the view of the author that a fish was hooked. Fish and man fought a battle for 15 minutes. In the end the man won. Soon in the stern of the boat lay a beautiful spotted trout, 34 inches long and weighing about nine pounds.

About dinner time London carried the trout to the veranda where guests had assembled, and displayed it, remarking that a fine mounted specimen it would make. Then he walked to the clerk's counter and pocketed the \$195. It cost Pantages another \$50 to learn how the trout was caught, as the owner told of the diamond display on his trolling spoon.
"And it's no nature fake," said London, "for there is the trout and here is the diamond stud."

38,000 Volts Didn't Kill Him.

Marquette, Wis., July 7.—Thirty-eight thousand volts of electricity passed through the body of Max Engles at High Falls yesterday, and he is still alive. While fishing in the rear of the power house, Engles touched one of the power wires with his steel rod. He was knocked unconscious and for some time it was feared he was dead.

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



Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
CARNARVON, July 13.
 At the old and well preserved Castle of Carnarvon, the young Prince of Wales was invested to-day with the insignia of his high office. Two hours before the arrival of their Majesties with the Prince, great crowds assembled along the route from Griffith's Crossing, where the royal party alighted, to the Castle Gate. Troops, bluejackets and marines kept open the way through which the procession passed. In the vicinity of the Castle a thousand London Police Firemen held an open place. The scene within the Castle was most picturesque. The King and Queen, with the Prince, came on the Royal yacht Victoria and Albert from Ireland to Holyhead this morning. A special train brought them from Holyhead to Griffith's Crossing, a station seven miles north of Carnarvon. The Prince entered the Castle at the Ancient Tower, while the Royal Welsh choir of 600 voices sang The King and Queen followed. As they entered the Castle, the Prince's flag was lowered and the Royal Standard was run up. The party proceeded to a raised platform in the centre of the great inner courtyard where the investiture took place. As the King and Queen appeared in the open air, the choir sang "God Save the King," and this was followed by singing "God bless the Prince of Wales." As the Prince appeared he approached his parents, who had taken their places on the dais. The Prince presented himself before the King, who placed the crimson velvet cap, ornamented with ermine, and coronet on the head of his son, as a token of Principality. In his hand His Majesty placed the Golden Vex, as the emblem of Government. On the middle finger the ring of gold was placed, signifying that he must be husband to his country and father to his children. While His Majesty was investing his son with the insignia, Letters Patents authorizing the Prince to hold the Principality, in trust for the King of England were read and handed to him. The service of Consecration followed.

Destructive Fire.

UPPER FLAT OF HERALD OFFICE GUTTED BY FIRE—ORIGIN UNKNOWN—LOSS COVERED BY INSURANCE.
 A few minutes after 7 last evening a fire broke out in the top flat of the Evening Herald Office on Prescott Street and that part of the building was gutted out, its contents being almost all destroyed, while the second flat and basement, where the presses are, were damaged by water. The loss is approximately placed at \$10,000, but the building and its contents are covered by insurance. How the fire occurred could not be determined up to 9 o'clock last night. The six members of the staff of the paper who will row in the coming Regatta had a spin on the harbor, after stripping for their work in the reporters' rooms. They landed at Marshall's wharf and were in the building donning their attire all unconscious of anything being amiss when a boy named Field, who was passing and saw smoke issuing from the roof, ran up the stairway and rushing into the room told them the place was on fire. Almost at the same moment Mr. John Calvert, who has a store on Duckworth Street East, saw the flames burst through the windows and turned in an alarm from box 22, bringing the Eastern and Central firemen with their apparatus quickly to the scene. The outbreak occurred in the S. E. corner of the upper flat, and when Field apprised the men in the reporters' apartment of the fire, they rushed upstairs, but the place being a mass of flame and filled with dense volumes of smoke, the employees were driven back and had to retreat downstairs. On the arrival of the work by Inspector General Sullivan and Supt. Dunne, several hose lengths were quickly coupled to fire plugs on Prescott and Duckworth Streets and taken up the stairs and into the building, and in a few minutes copious streams of water were playing on the burning fabric. Firemen on the hill at the rear of the building also played water through the windows through which the flames were shooting high in the air, and after an hour's work the blaze was quenched but not before much damage had been wrought. The employees from the start concentrated their attention to the press room on the ground flat and with the aid of willing citizens and the police, who were present in force under Supt. Grimes, they quickly transferred the three smaller presses there to the sidewalk with tables, various kinds of paper printed matter, &c., and after a comparatively short while had a lot of valuable property safe from damage either by fire or water. Next they went up to the compositors' room and hauled out reams of paper, type and other property of value. Still great damage was done by water both in the composing and press rooms, and the upper flat is a complete wreck. The linotype machine, which was worked there and which was roughly valued at \$4,000, was warped out of shape by the intense heat, the keyboard was smashed, most of the parts broken, and it is doubtful if it can be repaired sufficiently to be again of use. A great quantity of type was either destroyed or damaged, also a lot of paper, cases and the great variety of paraphernalia that go to equip a printing office. The book-binding outfit was practically all destroyed, as well as the stereotype machinery. Mr. George Walsh turned the gas off at the meter before leaving the office last evening and the fire used for melting the metal for the linotype had been out since the morning. Had the fire occurred late at night with a strong westerly breeze blowing, it might have swept the Duckworth Street. The firemen worked admirably, and while the fire was in progress thousands of citizens watched it from the sidewalks.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

The House of Lords yesterday concluded the report stage of the Venio Bill and fixed July 26th for the third reading. It now seems certain that the bill will go to the House of Commons with the considerable changes made by Lord Lansdowne and Cromer unmodified. In the Commons Premier Asquith will then move the rejection of the amendments of the bill and will state what the Government intends to do with respect to securing the creation of new peers to overcome opposition, in case the House of Lords reject the bill. The amendment moved by Lord Cromer with the object of preventing the lack of extraneous legislation on finance bills was carried without a division. Lord Newton moved an amendment providing that no bill for the further limitation of the legislative powers of the House of Lords shall be introduced until after another general election. The amendment after adverse criticism was withdrawn.

Big Forest Fires.

Special Evening Telegram. BOSTON, To-day.

Thousands of acres of forest land in New England, chiefly in Maine and New Hampshire, have been swept during the past few days with fires which are still raging unchecked in many sections. It is estimated that damage amounting to half a million dollars resulted from the Maine fire which destroyed South Waterboro. Men, spread to woods and threatened farm buildings.

The Big West

Ripper Kills Eight Girls in 8 Weeks.

A Negro in Atlanta Imitates Crime of London Whitechapel Field—No Trace of Monster Found—Pure Blood Negro Women Not Touched—Young Women Afraid to Go Out—Conjuring up a Being Something More Than Human.

Atlanta, Ga., July 12.—A series of murders of attractive-looking maidens and quadroon women—eight murders in all, in eight consecutive weeks, each occurring on a Saturday night—has completely baffled the police department and sent terror to the hearts of the negro population of the city and surrounding territory. The latest victim was murdered last Saturday night.

Killings of negroes by negroes are frequent enough on Saturday nights when blind tiger whiskey has been flowing freely, and if the murders had been of the ordinary kind where there is a heated quarrel, a blow, the crack of a pistol, or the glitter of a knife in any of the many dives and dance halls of the city, little would have been thought of them.

Heartless and Unerring.

But a new variety of negro murder—er—for it is assumed beyond question that he is a negro—has suddenly appeared. He is as heartless and unerring as "Jack the Ripper," whose gruesome murders in the Whitechapel district of London over 20 years ago started the whole world.

He displays the same diabolical cunning, the same fiendish desire for life and tear and mutilate after one death has been inflicted. And strangely enough, the bloody work betrays the fact that he possesses no little knowledge of anatomy.

The first stroke is always in a vital spot and death is dealt out with absolute certainty. It is afterwards that the swift, silent carving up of the victim—always in the same region of the body—begins. The body is then left in some dark, obscure alley, post-
