We suppose the first great essential hat people must look for in a repre-

entative is absolute honesty and traightness of purpose. He must not be open to bribes or corrupt in-luences of any sort, neither should he nduce support by offering bribes. The next thing that is desirable, absolutey necessary as far as possible, is ed-cation and intelligence. All the usinesses of the country, its trades nd industries, its health neans of education are matters that the representatives will be called to vote upon and he must have knowledge! measure that may be brought ward for consideration. And last, but in many ways most important o all he must be independent. aught to have means enough without aking any office from the Governuent to let him be free to vote as his onscience dictates in the best intersts of his country. A man ceases to e a true representative when he beor to the government he must then cknowledge obedience. He is no onger free. The present condition of things in our Legislature is nothing short of a scandal. There are some 26 members on one side of the House of Assembly and something over 20 of them are either in direct or indirect payment of the government. It is tatives-they are only a paid party caucus. Their direct interest is not their districts or their country but that of the party that pays them. It is to prevent this sort of thing that Legislatures throughout the world have passed measures penalizing representatives that take office or emo-luments or contracts from Govern-

ments, and such a law really exists in Newfoundland but is criminally winked out of sight. The independe vital and obvious importance and the voters should see to it that they will hot elect as a representative any man who is wanting in that esential.

Now it will not be many months before the voters in the different Districts will be appealed to for support by this and that candidate. Voters of Placentia Bay will find in the Evening Chronicle of last night a confirmation of the charge made in a letter published on Monday in the Evening Telegram that the Govern-ment had granted away lumber land in Placentia Bay. Here is the substance of the charge:-

"Every fisherman in Placentia Bay knows that there is only two patches of timber in the whole Bay, one is situate in Great Sandy Hr., and the other at Paradise Sound. Every fall the fishermen go for firewood to both of these places; in fact they are the only places where a mast for a boat or her timbers can be cut. In the year 1900 Mr. William Coffin, of Hay-Coun il for the timber land on Great of the Bay heard that their birthright was in danger they protested against it, and the Government of Sir Robert Bond upheld the protest of the fishermen and refused to grant the land in question, because of it being the fishermen's reserve. Now what has happened? A Mr. Bernard McGrath, a schoolmaster from King's Cove, has secured from the Morris Government not only all the land of the Great Sandy Hr. River, but he also secured a grant for all the tim-ber areas of Paradise Sound. So that the fishermen's rights to the only two bits of timber land in this bay is granted to a King's Cove man for purely speculative purposes. Where St. John's. 

Special Evening Telegram, NEW YORK, Oct. 22. Campaign managers are revising plans and altering arrangements for the wind-up of the Presidental fight. The injury to Roosevelt, the voluntary withdrawal of Governor Wilson from the stump, and the fact that neither President Taft nor Vice-President Sherman have taken part in the active work of the campaign, have resulted in changing the plans of all three of the chief political camps. The ensu-ing two weeks will witness the conentration of activities into sections where the respective campaign man where the respective campaign managers believe the outlook to be the most favorable for the capture of disputed ground. Governor Johnson, the Progressive Vice-President candidate, is to fill in most of Rooseveit's proposed engagements in the East, and the Democratic leaders are rushing a number of their chief speakers into take up the work originally planned for Governor Wilson. The Democratic campaign will centre from Pennsylvania, from this time forward. According to statements made here, a score of democratic Senators and Congressmen, who have been speaking throughout the country, will be sent into the State this week, in the hope

of making inroads on heretofore solid

Republican ground. The Republican fight also is to be quickened in the East, with a concentration of forces in New York State. Secretary of State Philander Knox is to deliver a number of speeches in Eastern cities, including Buffalo and New York. It is expected that Senator Lodge and Naval Secretary Meyer will join the last week, when at much inconvenience the staff met them with a special steamer at Portugal Cove.

Mr. Joseph M. Greene had then Republican speaking force, which already includes Secretary Nagel.


