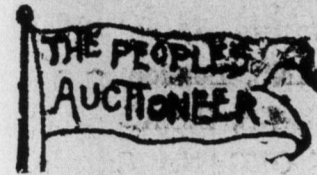

Two Toed Horse and Elephants.

Scientists Make Remarkable Fossil Finds on Prairie Dog Creek, in Texas.

Clarendon, Texas.—Remarkable discoveries have already been made during the few weeks the expedition of Yale students headed by Prof. Richard S. Lull, palaeontologist of that educational institution, has been conducting its research for fossils in this section of the Texas Panhandle.

The party has made excavations in Tule Canon, on Prairie Dog Creek, about thirty miles south of here, and much to the surprise of Prof. Lull there was brought to light the fossilized bones of several giant prehistoric camels, elephants and sloths. The camels were clearly identified by the peculiarities of many of their bones, and while they are much longer and larger than those that roam the deserts of to-day they undoubtedly belong to that species of animal, according to Prof. Lull. The elephants are about one third larger than the average African elephant of to-day. The sloths were giant animals that must have lived at an age of the world when this region was timbered by forests of giant trees.

Another discovery, and the one which really led the expedition to search, was that of a complete skeleton of a two toed horse. Shipments of some of these remarkable fossils have already been made to Yale University, and others are being packed and prepared for forwarding to that institution.

Prof. Lull says that the discoveries already made by his party prove conclusively that the staked plains of Texas and perhaps a great part of the barren region of New Mexico were once occupied by vast forests of large trees.

It is believed by him that there will be found in this section fossilized specimens of the three toed horse, which he says existed long prior to the two toed animal. With a view of finding such a specimen the party has changed its place of exploration to a spot near Clarendon, where conditions are deemed favorable for the possible discovery of the remains of such an animal.

This region is proved according to the statement of members of this party, to be the most prolific in its store of animal fossils of any locality in the world. The discoveries already made were confined to a comparatively small area. The fact that the bones of these prehistoric animals are found here in such large numbers is accounted for largely by the lack of moisture in the soil and the peculiar conditions of the formation, which seems to act as a preservative for these relics of gone ages. Up to this time the work exploration has been confined to such a small area that it is not known to the men of science how extensive the fossilized region is, but it is believed that it covers a considerable portion of the Panhandle country.

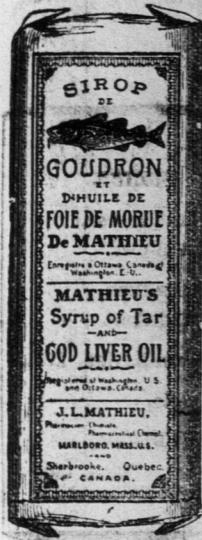

DEAR Sir,—In a letter signed Voter the other day I reminded P. T. McGrath of a part he played in his political life: first in abusing Morris and second in supporting Morris. Whenever he gives sumptuous accounts of Sir Edward's visits to England and dining with so-and-so, do not forget P. T.'s childish remark, often repeated, "reared on Poor House scraps."
There is nothing small about P. T. McGrath. Since he got "honourable," he wants to compare his part with Sir Robert Bond's efforts. It is only a short time ago that W. F. their own individual responsibility in this matter, and not to imagine for a moment that the duty of selecting the right man rests anywhere but upon each individual voter.

For consider for a moment the tremendous issues that lie in the hands of representatives. They may be recklessly extravagant and run the country into a perfect quagmire of debt which will have to be struggled through by generations yet unborn and in which at last they may lose life and liberty; they may be selfishness alienate the country's resources to their own aggrandizement or use the purse of the country for party or partisan objects; they may interfere ignorantly and stupidly by ill-advised laws with the business of the country's fisheries, its commerce or its banks to its great loss; they may even sap the moral foundations of a community, pollute the source of justice and let in a flood of iniquity.

Now, all this is possible, if the people's representatives are either not fixed in integrity or are deficient in education or intellectual equipment. Does not the possibility of such evils stir to the desire to do everything in our power to secure men for the high position of representatives that will put the well being of the country before every personal consideration that will be equipped by character and ability to deal honestly and intelligently with the complex and difficult problems of modern life.

We suppose the first great essential that people must look for in a representative is absolute honesty and straightforwardness of purpose. He must not be open to bribes or corrupt influences of any sort, neither should he receive support by offering bribes. The next thing that is desirable, absolutely necessary as far as possible, is education and intelligence. All the businesses of the country, its trades and industries, its health and its means of education are matters that the representatives will be called to vote upon and he must have knowledge enough to trace out the effect of any measure that may be brought forward for consideration. And last, but in many ways most important of all he must be independent. He ought to have means enough without making any office from the Government to let him be free to vote as his conscience dictates in the best interests of his country. A man ceases to be a true representative when he becomes a servant of the government or to the government he must then acknowledge obedience. He is no longer free. The present condition of things in our Legislature is nothing short of a scandal. There are some 26 members on one side of the House of Assembly and something over 20 of them are either in direct or indirect payment of the government. It is only a fiction to call these representatives—they are only a paid party caucus. Their direct interest is not their districts or their country but that of the party that pays them. It is to prevent this sort of thing that legislatures throughout the world have passed measures penalizing representatives that take office or emoluments or contracts from Governments, and such a law really exists in Newfoundland but is criminally winked out of sight. The independence of members of parliament is of vital and obvious importance and the voters should see to it that they will not elect as a representative any man who is wanting in that essential.

Now it will not be many months before the voters in the different Districts will be appealed to for support by this and that candidate. Let us advise them to take time by the forelock and make their own selection before the turmoil of canvassing and speech making sets in. We think that meeting of voters might be held regardless of party, and the best possible candidate or candidates selected to whom a requisition to become their representative or representatives and pledging support should be sent. What each district wants is the BEST man obtainable, whether he lives in the District, or out of it. Let only these three characteristics—moral character, intelligence and independence be present in the men chosen, and we might look for a new condition of things in Newfoundland. Just, honourable and economical administration of the Government.—The People.

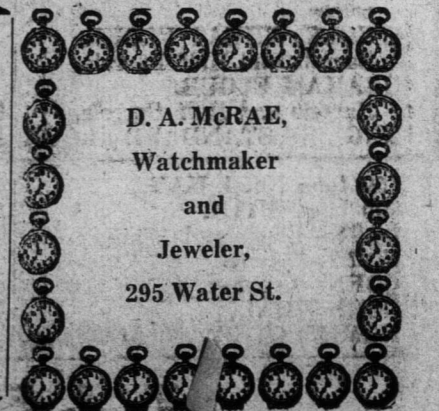

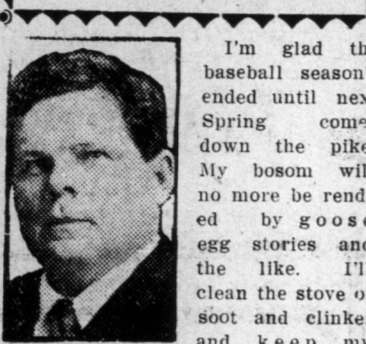

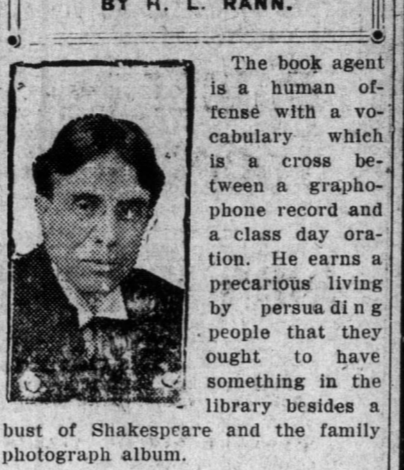

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 10.—C. H. Townsend, a garage owner of Aiglen Pa., and three friends were saved from death late last night when the automobile in which they were riding crashed through the railing of the bridge over the Pennsylvania railroad at Coatsville, Pa. 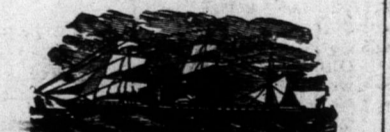

WAR NEWS.

CONFLICTING REPORTS OF MUCH SEVERE FIGHTING.—NO OFFICIAL ACCOUNTS.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. An almost impenetrable veil conceals the most interesting operations of the war in the vicinity of Adrianople, no official account of any kind bearing on these operations has yet been issued.

2,000 BULGARIANS KILLED.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, To-day. Newspapers report heavy fighting around Adrianople and Kirk Kilisseh to the east, three forts in the vicinity of Adrianople being captured. According to one rumor two thousand Bulgarians were killed and four thousand wounded in a desperate engagement outside Kirk Kilisseh. It is quite clear that all reports of the fall of Kirk Kilisseh and the cutting of communications with Constantinople are quite unfounded. Fighting of a more or less serious character continues at all points along the extensive frontiers and an important battle is pending in Kumanova District between the Servans and Sekki Pasha who, according to Constantinople reports, which is probably exaggerated, has a hundred thousand men, and strong artillery.

TURKS RETREATING.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, To-day. Newspapers report that the Bulgarians captured several important positions around Adrianople and Djumbala after severe fighting, but official confirmation is lacking. These accounts represent that the Turks are retreating from three forts adjacent to Adrianople. Bulgarian forces attacked Turkish retreating from Djumbala which is due south of Sofia on the Struma River. Many Turks were killed, hundreds were taken prisoners and three gunboats captured. The Turks were caught between the Bulgarian troops and a band of Bulgarian irregulars and were unable to escape owing to the irregulars dynamiting a bridge over the Struma between Djumbala and Novrokop.

BOMBARDMENT OF FORT.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, To-day. Despatches say the bombardment of Tarabosch continues, but although the fort has been greatly decimated, there is no sign of yielding. In naval matters the honors so far are with the Greeks who have captured Lemnos, thus securing a base from which they can attack the Turkish squadron should it even emerge from the Dardanelles. Seemingly, however, the Turks not disposed to leave the Black Sea a risk encounter with the Greek fleet.

BULGARIANS RETREATING.

Special Evening Telegram. CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. A despatch sent about midnight gives a report of a battle begun practically all along the line from Adrianople to Kirk Kilisseh. Turkish troops are advancing and Bulgarians are falling in heavy losses. Montenegrins are apparently making slow progress in the direction of Scutari.

SERVIANS CAPTURE TOWN.

Special Evening Telegram. The first column of the second Serbian army captured the town of Koschana, forty miles east of Uskup. One report has it before retiring the Turks massacred many Christian inhabitants. The first Serbian army began an attack yesterday on Taumen, ten miles north of Uskup and expect to capture it without much difficulty.

Supreme Cour

Before Mr. Justice Johnson. Fishermen's Union Trading Company vs. the Chronicle Publishing Company. This is an application on the part of the plaintiff to strike out the defendant's certain paragraphs of it as the plaintiff alleges they tend to embarrass and delay the fair trial of the action. Argument of Counsel was heard. The Court takes time to consider.

THEFT AT WORK.—Mr. Mark Pike of Phoenix Street who keeps a store there, on Monday last discovered that boys had stolen hundreds of billets from a store where thousands are kept. These will be prosecuted. The same gang had also been stealing pickets from fences there and are terrorizing the children of the place with air guns.

Special Evening Telegram.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.
Campaign managers are revising plans and altering arrangements for the wind-up of the Presidential fight. The injury to Roosevelt, the voluntary withdrawal of Governor Wilson from the stump, and the fact that neither President Taft nor Vice-President Sherman have taken part in the active work of the campaign, have resulted in changing the plans of all three of the chief political camps. The ensuing two weeks will witness the concentration of activities into sections where the respective campaign managers believe the outlook to be most favorable for the capture of disputed ground. Governor Johnson, the Progressive Vice-President candidate, is to fill in most of Roosevelt's proposed engagements in the East, and the Democratic leaders are rushing a number of their chief speakers into Pennsylvania and New York State to take up the work originally planned for Governor Wilson. The Democratic campaign will centre from Pennsylvania, from this time forward. According to statements made here, a score of Democratic Senators and Congressmen, who have been speaking throughout the country, will be sent into the State this week. In the hope of making inroads on heretofore solid Republican ground, the Republican fight also is to be quickened in the East, with a concentration of forces in New York State. Secretary of State Philander Knox is to deliver a number of speeches in Eastern cities, including Buffalo and New York. It is expected that Senator Lodge and Naval Secretary Meyer will join the Republican speaking force, which already includes Secretary Nagel.

Special Evening Telegram.

PARIS, Oct. 22.
Fears, expressed in Constantinople, of possible aggression by Russia in Transcaucasia, while Turkey's hands are occupied in the Balkans, are not shared by the French Foreign Office. All the Powers, both the Triple Alliance and the Triple Entente, remain united in their determination to localize the fighting and end the war at the earliest moment. Mediation at the first opportunity has been decided on and in the opinion of diplomats this may come after the great battle which will, doubtless, be fought around Adrianople. It is expected that the battle will be so far reaching as to leave both sides weakened to such an extent that European intervention will be welcomed.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22.
During a dense fog this morning, the Dartmouth ferry boats, Dartmouth, and Chebucto, were in collision on the Halifax side. The Chebucto broke into the Dartmouth's starboard side, breaking the guard and a portion of the paddle box. In backing away, the Chebucto hit Pickford & Black's chartered steamer Anita, lying at the Furness pier, bow on, denting the plates and buckling her own stem also slightly injuring the Furness Pier. No one was injured.

ATHENS, Oct. 22.
After a short engagement with the Turkish carriers, a landing party of five hundred Greeks to-day occupied Kastro, capital of Island of Lemnos and hoisted the Greek flag. Three Turkish officers and fifty soldiers were made prisoners. Admiral Count Ouroutis issued a proclamation to the inhabitants, announcing the occupation of the Island by Greece.

LONDON, Oct. 22.
Greek troops landed to-day at Katarina, Turkish territory, in the Gulf of Salonika, according to a despatch from Constantinople.

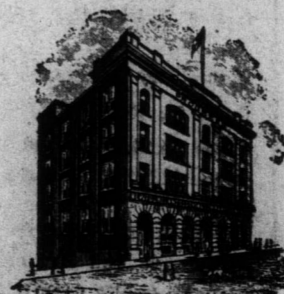

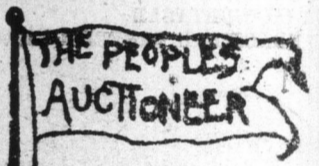
