The orchestra is a collection of willing, intrepid performers who are hired by the week and can give a program fully that long without experiencing the least inconvenience.

Owing to the fact that the people of this country would rather hear the feverish staccato of the stock ticker and the languorous voice of the coupon bond than sit down in some red plush upholstered and listen to several forms of contrapuntal ecstasy, very few orchestras are able to keep alive without being bolstered up by the idle rich. If it were not for rich people who love music and buy orchestra stock without trying to squeeze dividends out of a Greg concerto, you could count on the third finger of the right hand the number of people who could tell the Peer Gynt suite from a sale of bed room furniture.

The orchestra cannot be trusted to play alone, but has to be led by somebody who can read notes and keep the slide trombones from stepping on the heels of the second violins. The conductor is also obliged to supply large quantities of rhythm, tempo, nuance, accelerando, fortissimo and other trimmings, and he usually carries a larger stock of fortissimo than anything else. This is hard work, especially when some instrument refuses to get within speaking distance of the pitch and emits a long solo in a flat and lugubrious tone of voice.

As a rule, the orchestra jockies the most severe grade of classical music it can wrap itself around, which causes large numbers of thrifty enthusiasts who buy season tickets because they are cheaper by the yard to

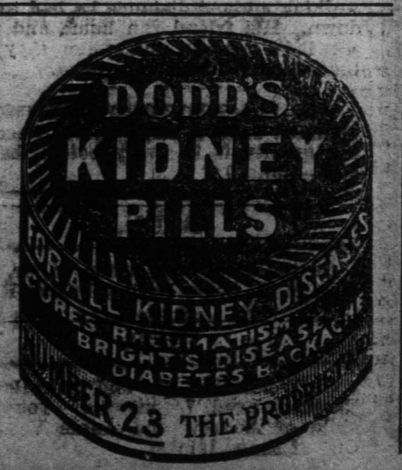

**The Muddling-Through Government.**

One of the most amusing features of the present political situation is to be found in the Daily News this morning. The Morrison organ booms Sir Edward Morris as a business statesman. It will be remembered that the Hon. Donald Morrison before the Morris-Morison commission got possession of the Government was a strong advocate of a business government. During the past four years the country at large has had an opportunity of seeing the Morrison theory carried out in practice, for the Daily News would have its readers understand that the present administration is a business government. The Daily News does not seem to be seriously disturbed by the fact that the Hon. R. K. Bishop is on record as to the failure of the present government to apply business principles to government affairs. Or it may be that the Morrison organ has forgotten this confession of the failure of the Morris-Morison government. The public at large, however, has many concrete examples of that failure before them. They have not forgotten the huge grants of timber limits, nor the Hon. Donald Morrison's connection with some of them. Nor have they forgotten the purchase of the two costly spars. Nor the award of sea-stal contracts to a company, of which two members of the Government were directors. Then again there is the enormous waste which has gone on in connection with the Agricultural Policy of the Government. The grants made to Commissioners for all sorts of purposes in flagrant disregard of the pledge to give the control of such expenditures to Elective Road Boards. What business acumen was displayed in these wasteful schemes it would be an outrage even to pretend. What business foresight was displayed by Sir Edward Morris in agreeing to pay to the Contractors of the Branch Railway Building in gold instead of cash? This financial blundering has already increased the financial burdens of the people largely. Again, what business

In Port on Fire.**

The s.s. Manchester-Port, Capt. Statt of the Furness Withy Line, bound from Montreal to Manchester, laden with general cargo and a quantity of deal, put into port this morning with her bunkers smouldering as the result of fire on board. After leaving Montreal seven days ago the ship called at "Three Rivers." On Monday last fire was discovered near No. 2 hold, which is called the cross bunkers, and amidship and where three hundred tons of coal was kept. Luckily, however, the blaze was discovered in the early stage. The ship has its own apparatus on board, such as hoses, and immediately all the crew were engaged fighting the fire. As soon as the hatches were taken off the bunkers there was a regular outburst of flame and smoke. The efforts of the crew who worked like true British seamen, was made difficult by the fact that there was considerable cargo on top of the burning coal. The work of removing this cargo to get at the fire, which was down underneath, was done under difficulties. Despite the three streams of water kept playing into the hold, the fire began to gain headway as the flames were fanned by a strong breeze of wind. Some workwood adjoining No. 2 hold then ignited and the fire fighters had to devote their efforts to prevent a further outbreak. The seamen were worn out and exhausted after working strenuously all Monday night. They had to take watches to lay down to get a meal, but notwithstanding every man stood to duty's post. On Tuesday afternoon the fire was got under control and featuring the damages were extensive, Capt. Statt decided to put into St. John's and arrived as mentioned. The origin of the fire is somewhat mysterious although the captain and engineers are unanimous that spontaneous combustion is the cause. The ship was examined to-day by Lloyd's Surveyor. So far the extent of damage is unknown and the ship will berth at the Furness Withy Line wharf to have the damaged cargo taken out. The Manchester-Port is a sister ship to the Manchester-Investor, which put in here last year in a disabled state.

**MESSINA, July 2.**

**HENLEY, July 2.**  
 The banks of the Thames, and the boat houses are being carefully watched to prevent outrages by the female arson squad.

**LONDON, July 2.**  
 The Marquis of Northampton has agreed to pay \$250,000 to settle the breach of promise suit against him by an actress, Daisy Markham, whose real name is Violet Moss.

**EPERNAY, July 2.**  
 Capt. Rey, of the French Army, was killed, and a private of the Engineer Corps fatally injured to-day, by the capsizing of a military biplane.

**OTTAWA, July 2.**  
 A cheque for \$75,000 deposited by the Halifax Dredging Company for building the P.E.I. terminal for the I.C.R. car ferry, has been forfeited for failure to carry out the work. New tenders are being received.

**BELOGRADE, July 2.**  
 "We are at war with Bulgaria," said Minister of the Interior, M. Protles, speaking on behalf of the Government, last night, in the Skupstina. The Bulgarian have been given to the Commander in Chief to defend the entire line. Bulgaria has attacked us along the whole of our lines," he said.

**HALIFAX, July 2.**  
 Capt. Simmonds, of the 66th regiment, hardware dealer of Dartmouth, and Adjutant of the Bisley team, for this year, has been fined \$5,000 for an assault on a former friend, Lewis Hill, of Dartmouth, two years ago, in which Hill's eyeglasses were smashed and his eyesight destroyed as a result. **SEATTLE, July 2.**

He left June 10th by way of Berlin and Warsaw to St. Petersburg, returning by way of Stockholm, Copenhagen, Hamburg, and the Hague. During his journey he was received by the sovereigns of Russia, Sweden, Denmark and Holland.

**COBALT, July 2.**  
 The Temiskaming district is ablaze with forest fires. All along the railway and Northern Ontario is a roaring fiery furnace, fanned by high winds. Valuables are being sent out by every train by those who remain to fight the flames. Others are burying their treasures. Porcupine has been reached, and Golden City is endangered. At Jackson City 100,000 logs have been destroyed. Hearst is imperiled. Hundreds are homeless.

**LONDON, July 2.**  
 At the moment of cabling, the situation in the Balkans is most obscure. Early this morning telegrams from Belgrade gave different complexion to the situation. Fighting has been renewed with great vigor. None of the despatches, however, are confirmed. No further fighting between Greeks and Bulgarians is reported, but latest despatches tend to confirm the report that war has begun by them.

**LONDON, July 2.**  
 Lord Strathcona presided at the Dominion Day dinner, with the Duke of Connaught as chief guest. Other guests were the Japanese Ambassador, Lewis Harcourt, Earl Grey, Earl Aberdeen, Col. Seeley, Premier Sirton, and leading Canadians now here. Strathcona referred to Canada's pride and gratification at the news of the Duke's extension of time as Viceroy. Harcourt read the following telegram from the Acting Governor General: "Prime Minister desires me to say that the Government and people of Canada have learned with the greatest pleasure that H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught has consented to one year's extension of his term of office as Governor General, which has been already fruitful of the best results to Canada. All rejoice that Her Royal Highness may also be seen with him in the full enjoyment of her health." Referring to Strathcona, Harcourt said the laurels, or should he say the maple leaves of an unselfish, industrious life made a crown to his ripe, old and honored age.

# TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

## Five Persons Killed,

### And One Other Dreadfully Injured by Boiler Explosion --- Proprietor Alex. Rose Among the Dead.

Yesterday forenoon news reached the city that an awful accident had occurred at Alexander Bay, in Mr. Alexander Rose's Mill, at Roseville. When the news was first noised abroad people would not believe that the number of dead—five persons—was so large and that Mr. Rose himself was a victim of the accident. Later, however, the information was confirmed, and the many who well and favourably knew Mr. Rose in St. John's will learn of his tragic fate and that of the other hapless beings who were killed and the many who were seriously injured and it is feared cannot live.

Shortly after 10 a.m. the Reid Mfd. Co. had a message from Operator Hartigan saying that five men had been killed by a boiler explosion at Alexander Bay, in Rose's Mill, but no particulars, and it is likely at that hour could not be gleaned, as the station is a long distance from the mill.

Inspector General Sullivan was one of the first to be given news of the affair and there were enquires for details but the Telegraph Office being closed and the nearest office being several miles from the scene of the disaster no replies to messages sent

were received until a late hour last evening.

At 6:35 p.m. Const. Forsey advised T. G. Sullivan of the blowing up of the mill, that five men were killed and a girl seriously injured. Const. Forsey was then leaving for the scene of the tragedy.

The following wire was received by the Postal Telegraphs last evening from Gumbo:—

"Const. Forsey and Dr. McDonald left for scene of tragedy at Alexander Bay."

The messages received were in some cases contradictory, stating in some that the girl Babstock was killed, and in others that she was badly injured but not killed outright. More than likely the full facts of the terrible affair will become definitely known today.

Though it is not definitely known the belief is that cold water being put into the over-heated boiler caused the accident.

Alexander Rose, the proprietor of the mill, one of the victims, was a young man well and favourably known especially in St. John's East. He served his apprenticeship with the Mfd. Furniture and Moulding Co. as a cabinet maker, worked with the Horwood Lumber Company for a while and later carried on business in the furniture line on Duckworth Street, later going to Alexander Bay. His widow was Miss Sarah Ward. To the relatives of the victims the Telegram extends sincerest sympathy.

### Obituary.

On Friday, the 20th inst., a centenary in the person of Mrs. Alan Parsons passed to her eternal rest. Deceased had attained to the ripe old age of one hundred years and five months. She was one of the hardy race which is seldom seen now-a-days. In her younger days she went fishing in an open boat, and often went to Bonaville, a distance of 20 miles from here, in quest of squid bait. She also went to the woods in the winter and dragged out firewood, and to hear her relatives her adventures both at the fishery and in the woods was something one could listen to with interest. She never had any sickness until after she had passed the four score and ten mark. When ninety-two years of age she could be seen at work in her garden putting in vegetables. At the age of ninety-four she had the misfortune to fall and break her thigh, the limb was set by Dr. W. Roberts, now practising at St. John's, and although at such an advanced age it grew together but was not sufficiently strong after for her to work with. She was taken ill on the 15th and died on the 20th. The deceased lady leaves one brother, two sons and one daughter, twenty-eight grandchildren, sixty-two great grandchildren and twenty-one great great grandchildren to mourn their loss.

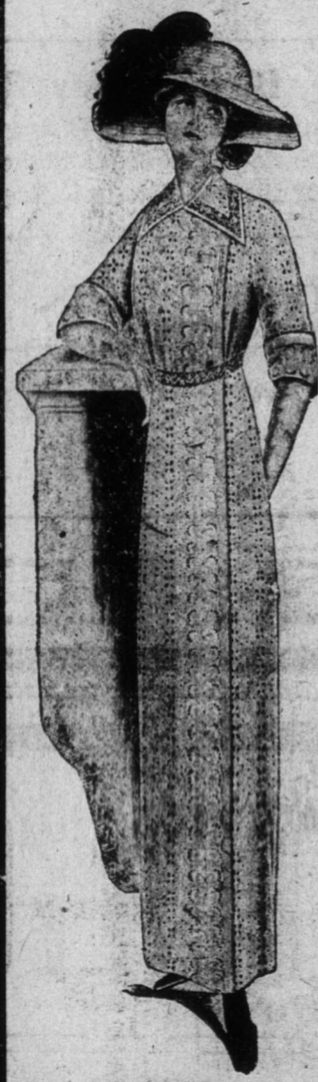
