Crown Land Rent Shortage.

The Auditor General draws attention to a shortage of \$69,000 in revenue from Crown Lands. It declares that he has acted in accordance with the traditions of America ance with the traditions of america. and of his party in refusing to recognize President Huerta, but contends nevertheless that Britain and other European nations acted soundly in re-cognizing the present Government of Mexico, because it seemed that he would be able to enforce financial and industrial order. Continuing the Review says "We must accept the position that nobody can rule in Mexico without the good will of the United States. On the other hand Wilson's policy of watchful waiting cannot continue for ever. It can only continue as long as it does not lead to finan-

as long as it does not lead to inau-cial catastrophe. President Huerta's financial policy will clearly lead to financial catastrophe. President Hu-erta's financial policy will clearly lead to eventual chaos. It is impossible for the British Government to remain inactive, while the authorities are inactive, while the authorities a Washington wait for that chaos. Tha course would mean the disaster and would perhaps ruin hundreds and even thousands of honorable families and the duty of any Government is to protect its interests. Official and unfficial declarations have proved our eluctance to take any action which is likely to be disagreeable to the States, but President Wilson may force our hand. He really cannot wait indefinitely.
