



Twelve months or so ago Newfoundland had pride of place in the friendly rivalry as regards re-cruiting here and in Canada. That pride of place we have lost, and Canada has now a great lost, and Canada has now a great lead in the proportion of her population with the colours. We are not far behind as those we have sent to Great Britain to serve on land and sea, but we are a long way behind as regards those who are at present in training and getting ready to be sent forward. Canada has sent forward about 120,000. Newfoundland has sent forward about 3,000 as soldiers or sailors. Canada has about 100,000 at home in training, Newfoundland has a little more than a hundred at home in training. Canada's efforts in recruiting is increasing. Great and enthusiastic recruiting the new Canadian standard, which is more than double this number. That is too high for present aims. Yet this standard is but to reach by next December what Australia expects to reach by next June, and both standard ser a long way behind the standard are a long way behind the standard ser a long way behind the standard set up by Canada, which is to keep the strength of the army and navy from the British Isles up to 4,250,000. That standard is at least 50 per cent. greater than the high standard set up by Canada, which itself means the addition of 280,000 men to the Canadian forces, without counting the making good of losses. da's efforts in recruiting is increasing. ing campaigns are being held throughout the length and breadth of the broad Dominion. In Newfoundland there has been no recruiting campaigns since last winter, and recruiting has fallen to a minimum. The Dominion Government has set up a standard for itself and aims at bringing up the strength of the Do-minion forces to half a million. The Newfoundland Government has set up no standard. 





mentary studies as taught in the schools, if properly taught, would be amply sufficient for a boy to start in life. The cost and difficulty of finding technical teachers to send around

the island, also the trouble of selecting suitable professions for industries for a boy not old enough to judge for

imself.

No T. Soper, for the affirmative, showed how difficult it is for boys to receive technical education along the

lines of their trade or profession and technical colleges should be estab-lished. How many accidents are caus-

ed by unskilled workmen?

Mr. Parkins, for the negative, de-

clared himself in favor of scientific teaching along the lines of local in-dustries and the fisheries, but this

was not Practical Business training, only one out of four would receive any real benefit. Mr. J. Baggs be-lieved that common elementary stud-ies are not sufficient, and boys ought
