American Force on Western Front Within Six Weeks

National Guardsmen With Border Experience All Right, Say Missions-Ought to go in Small Batches-Few Weeks' Training Overseas Sufficient Allied Experts Believe.

only a matter of a few days before United States Militia units now mo bilized in this country are on their way to the European front, and less than six weeks before they are actually embattled with the Germans on the European front, if the Allies urgent recommendations to the American Government meet with the approval of the Administration. It be came really known to-day, following the disclosures of Marshal Joffre, that the Allies want American troops in batches of several hundred to go at once to Europe aboard every ship that sails. This will obviate necesmous numbers of men in one place and the crippling of food and munition ships to carry them.

National Guard Wanted.

The Allies want mobilized National Guard units which were at the Mexican border, because they feel that these men were equipped by their tern front and train within sound of the big guns, so they will be tempered for battle in not longer than five

These American troops, the Allies have assured this Government, will not be fused with French, British, Indian or other troops, but will fight as American units, under their own

The Allies' recommendations today were intended to wean this country away from the idea, that before American troops go abroad they must be trained here for months.

The Allies' idea is to take small American units and specialize them as must be done in this war. This specialized course under the guns is vitally necessary, the Allies pointed out, because they can develop bomb squads, sappers, snipers, trench experts and other highly specialized groups from each unit in a few

"Not only would this help our fighting strength," said an Ally Com mander to-day, "but it would have a most depressing moral effect on the Germans along the entire front."

This plan, however, conflicts with U. S. army. The General Staff does such a scheme in his statement. not want any green American troop
