



Lord Fisher.

THE MOST PICTURESQUE FIGURE IN MODERN BRITISH NAVY.

Anyone who desires to prove that dmiral John Arbuthnot Fisher won the Great War will find considerable Data to assist him: and we think the any dispassionate investigator whe clude that had Lord Fisher not lived ed the decisive part it did play. It is agreed that without the navy the war would soon have been lost, and un doubtedly the British navy was more the creation of "Jacky" Fisher than of any other man. One ventures upon more debatable ground when express ing the opinion that the war would have been shortened had Lord Fisher been permitted to remain First Sea Lord, and that his counsel was worth the counsel of a half dozen Winster Churchills. But the two men, both of powerful, dominating personality, fought, one as First Sea Lord and the other as Lord of the Admiralty. Fisher dropped out. So did Churchill, to be replaced by Balfour, but Fisher venot recalled. He was instead given a post as chairman of the Board of Naval Inventions, although there was a great popular demand that he should be reinstated, and given the authority in the navy that Kitchener had in the

picturesque characters the British gun without friends or influence, and by sheer force of intellect and will advanced to the highest position of all, the position which is the inspiration of every officer in the service. He grew up in a rough school, and learned to take and give knocks. One gathers that he was not an easy man to work with; but he had sufficient brain power to have little need of collaboration, and some of the most important reforms that he brought about were the result of struggles into which he entered single handed. The dreadnought was Fisher's idea; so was the battle cruiser. He did not invent the turbine engine, but it was due to his persistent advocacy that it was generally adopted in the navy. It was also his idea to use the watertube boiler; that is to say, to have the fire where the water was, and the water where the fire was, an improvement that made it possible to get up steam in a ship in twenty minutes, instead of seven hours. To use oil as fuel was

also Fisher's idea. Did any other naval expert ever invent or adapt so many important improvements? Yet they are by no means all that stand to the credit of Lord Fisher. He devised the system of nucleus crews for warships, whereby a ship would always have its comple ment of brains aboard and could send its exten man power wherever it was needed, or take the crude, raw article and fit it into position instantly, But perhaps the greatest stroke of all. whereby the strength of the British fleet was kent in the North Sea, was in your battleground should be your drill ground. Of course, the Entente with France was necessary before this revolutionary charge in naval strategy could be achieved, but the Entente might have been in existence and the British fleet scattered all over the seven seas had the navy been without a man like Fisher. One does not like to imagine the Great War breaking out, the German navy at Kiel and the British ships stationed all over the Mediterranean, the China Sea, and the Pacific, as had been the immemorial practice before Fisher became First Sea Lord

We shall not weary our easily wearied readers with a recital of the various posts held by Lord Fisher but shall merely mention that he was British delegate to the Peace Conference at the Hague in 1899, on which occasion he made a speech that shocked most of his hearers. He said: "There is no such thing as humane war. War should be made as hellish and as direct in effect as possible. There is no excuse for it otherwise When you have to wring a chicken's neck, all you think about is wringing it quickly. You don't give the chicken intervals for rest and refreshment." This, however, does not imply any approval of a policy of "frightfulness." What Fisher thought of the submarine, years before it was supposed to have any great possibilities of destructiveness.



When the Emperor Joseph II. once asked Mozart why he did not marry a rich wife, the great composes proudly answered, "Sire, I trust that my genius will always enable me to support the woman I love." But, in spite of his genius, the most brilliant in Europe, his wedded life was pitifully clouded by poverty and struggle before he was laid to rest in his pau-

Probably no musician has ever been more richly dowered than Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, who was cradled at Salzburg one January day in 1756. "Divine Mozart," Rossini dubbed him; "Mozart was a music made man," declared David; "Mozart is Mozart, as Allah is Allah," said Viardot. 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
