



Wireless Operators and Proficiency Certificates

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-In a recent issue of your journal there appeared a contribution from "Wireless Operator" dealing in part with the situation as it now obtains in this country re that profession. It is not my intention to criticise, but to endorse all that "W.O." has said, and to add in my humble way one or two other suggestions. "W.O." states that Mr. Southgate of the Halifax training school, is now in St. John's with the intention of opening a school where those inclined that way, may take a preparatory course of practical and technical instruction in wireless telegraphy. Mr. Southgate is to be commended for his enterprising spirit, and I am sure there is not one operator who would refrain from wishing him every success. Neither, I believe, is there one which would allow to pass unnoticd the opportunity now offering for the gaining of the necessary instruction as an aid to obtaining a wireless operator's certificate of proficiency. However, the certificate seeker is right here up against a wall, for after the would-be operator has had the course, etc., he will find that it is impossible to obtain an examination in this country, and will be obliged to go to Halifax or some other Canadian city for that purpose; and here let me say that it is only the fortunate few who can avail themselves of the advantages offered thereby, for the average operator is out of work five months of the twelve. and some of them having families, how can they afford the \$200 or \$250 it would cost for travelling, board, etc., to Halifax. Thus being unable to put up the necessary cash for the trip (as before mentioned), they have to go on year in and year out at the minimum rate of salary, viz., \$70 per month, wherein if they were given facilities here in St. John's for that purpose they could obtain their certificates if proficient, and by doing so they would be in the running for an increase of salary.

In some other professions, such as masters, mates and marine engineering, the Government appoints a board of examiners for the purpose of examining parties seeking certificates, I am fully convinced that we only need bring this matter to the notice of the proper authorities and they will move in the matter, and see that a board of examiners are appointed for the purpose of examining wireless operators; and I may say here that I do not think such a board would be any expnese to the Government, for I feel certain that our local superintendent, Mr. Collins, would think it only a pleasure to act free of charge in that or any other capacity, if by so doing he thought he could benefit employees. (I hope he will excuse this liberty). Another gentleman I would suggest is the officer in charge of Mount Pearl Wireless Station, who no doubt would also act there with our genial P.M.G., would make a trio hard to beat. I am sure Hon. Mr. Halfyard would be only too pleased to take action in our behalf. Come along Wops, see what can be

Barnham, Humorist in Press and Poetry.

On Saturday, December 6, 1788. Richard Harris Barham was born at Canterbury, and there he received his education until he entered Brazenose College, Oxford University, as an undergraduate. He felt himself called to be a clergyman, and performed the duties of that sacred vocation very properly. But he was by nature a humourist, and attempted not to restrain the wit and fancy with which he had been appointed a minor canon of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, he found a congenial comrade in Sydney Smoth, who was called the "witty canon," and who lent to him a residence the house that belonged to himself as a canon, at Amen Corner, in the yard of the cathedral. Barham was appointed also rector of St. Augustine and St. Faith's, in the City of London. As an author he far many years contributed to the "Edinburgh Review," "Blackwood's Magazine." and the "Literary Gazette," but his most popular series of paper were given to "Bentley's Miscellany," under the title of the "Ingoldsby Legends," which caused him to be best known by his literary name of Thomas Ingoldsby. These were published in two volumes, as his popular novel, "My Cousin Nicholas" was in three. 





The routine treatment of tuberculosis in all general hospitals, instead of as at present in only about one-eighth of those in the country, should enable people in moderate circumstances to obtain preliminary treatment in their home towns instead of being forced to go without or to go to resorts. Such preliminary treatment would habituate the patient to the regimen essential to his cure and to the protection of others, and would enable him to go back to his home and get well under home treatment, as he probably would not have done without

Visits to the hospital will also familiarize members of the patients family with sanitary precautions such as the sputum cup, which commonly horrifies them and is soon given up by home patients. Visits by the fam-ily physician to his patient in the hospital would familiarize him with the treatment and enable him to liagnose other cases much earlier. 
