Trinity Merchants Indignant. PROSPERO FAILED TO CALL ON SOUTHERN TRIP. Special to Evening Telegram. TRINITY, Dec. 5, 1921. Much disappointment is felt and great inconvenience caused to people here and adjacent settlements through S.S. Prospero not calling Saturday on the way to St. John's. Fish and other shipments waiting on the Government wharf had to be doubly handled and carted back to the various stores. A big batch of Newfoundland workmen who were employed in various departments of the Dominion Steel & Coal Co.'s plant, who were among the 3,000 employees laid off work owing to the general depression, returned to their homes in Newfoundland last night on the steamer Sagona.

London Barely Escaped Cave-In. LONDON.—(Associated Press) Nov. 16.—This city has just narrowly escaped a great peril, the possible caving in of Oxford Circus, the shopping center of the West End, says a story, circulated by a news agency, the danger of the disaster was known only to contractors and workers underground. They were altering an exit from the Oxford Circus tube station so as to make an entrance into a business building when the contractors discovered a bed of a little unknown tributary of the Thames River which was covered over when Regent Street was made. They also found, to their amazement and consternation, that they were meeting the direct "lines of vibration" of the two underground tubes, the Central London and the Bakerloo. The news agency says that they realized that if the excavations continued the whole Oxford Circus might be literally precipitated underground. There were perilous days and laborious nights occupied in underpinning the buildings above ground and overcoming the side pressure which was being felt. In place of the old river bed there was constructed a retaining wall of cement which, it is declared, has made the great shopping center more secure than at any time since the river flowed down the slopes of the present Regent Street.

SIX MEN WILL BE DEPORTED. Totally unaware of the immigration laws, and not aware of the unprecedented hard times in Cape Breton, as well as elsewhere in Canada, six Newfoundlanders arrived on the steamer Sagona this forenoon, utterly devoid of a dollar. They will go back on the steamer to-night, according to instructions issued by immigration officer J. J. Dooley. Altogether they were upwards of three hundred men who returned to Newfoundland within the last week, owing to the mines being closed down in the southern districts.

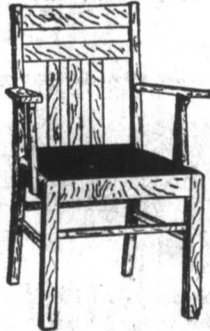

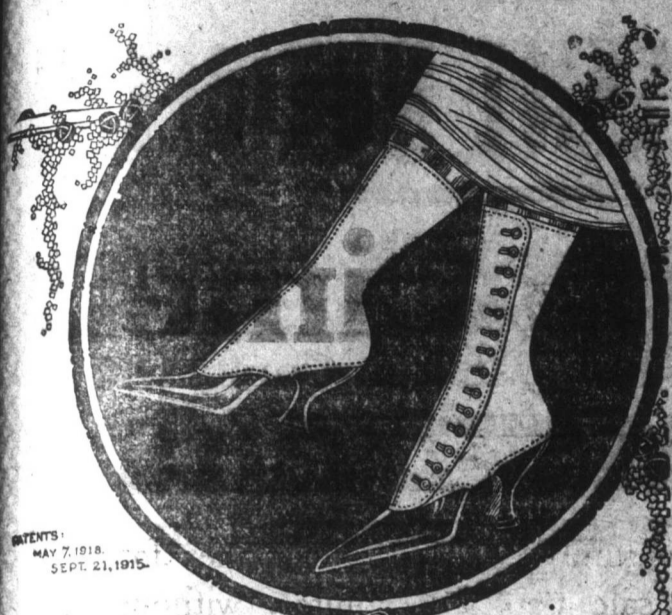

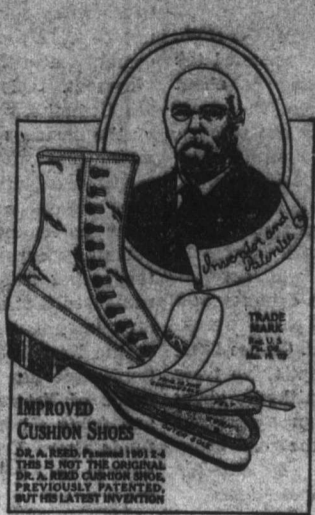

General Hospital and T. B. Patients.

The opening of wards in general hospital for tuberculous patients, as recommended by the American Medical Association at its recent annual meeting in Boston, will, it is believed by the U.S. Public Health Service, be of enormous benefit not only to most of the two million known victims of the disease in the United States, but also to thousands of others in whom the disease is incipient and easily suppressible, if promptly treated. Tuberculosis in this stage is difficult and often impossible of positive diagnosis, even by an expert; and many persons, even when told by their family doctor that their case is "suspicious" and that they should take precautionary treatment, fear the stigma of an avowed tuberculous hospital and put off action until recovery has become long and difficult. In a general hospital the diagnosis will not be made public and the family will not be embarrassed but at the same time all necessary precautions can be taken to avoid danger of infection to others.
The resolution was prepared and recommended by the National Tuberculosis Association in 1916; its approval now by the American Medical Association shows a very marked change in medical sentiment. In support of the new policy it is argued that in many small cities two hospitals, one general and one tuberculous, can be run only at a loss, but if combined, would pay operating expenses, especially as the combined hospital would draw many secret tuberculous cases. Many general hospitals could easily enlarge their facilities by fitting up wards, roofs, porches, and unused open spaces; and thus provide greatly needed space for tuberculous patients, both former Army men and civilians. The routine treatment of tuberculosis in all general hospitals, instead of as at present in only about one-eighth of those in the country, should enable people in moderate circumstances to obtain preliminary treatment in their home towns instead of being forced to go without or to go to resorts. Such preliminary treatment would habituate the patient to the regimen essential to his cure and the protection of others, and would enable him to go back to his home and get well under home treatment, as he probably would not have done without such training.
Visits to the hospital will also familiarize members of the patients' family with sanitary precautions such as the sputum cup, which commonly horrifies them and is soon given up by home patients. Visits by the family physician to his patient in the hospital would familiarize him with the treatment and enable him to diagnose other cases much earlier. It would also enable him to supervise the later home treatment of both this patient and others. At present, al-

Late Rector of St. Thomas's Spreads Himself.

Dr. Edgar Jones, Rector, Tragedy of Newfoundland.
(Wilmington, Del.) News.
"Newfoundland, the land of tragedy," in these terse words, Rev. Edgar Jones, rector of St. Thomas's Church, Newark, described the appalling toll of human life exacted of the people in the land of ice, fog, dogs and heroes in the pursuit of the principal industry fishing by the waters along the country's bleak and desolate coast, in an address before the first fall dinner of the Men's Club of St. Andrew's P. E. Church last evening in the Parish House.
Rev. E. Jones was born in Newfoundland, spent eighteen years there and was in charge of a parish at St. John's, Newfoundland, for six years before returning to the States.
Newfoundland, he said, is England's oldest colony. It was discovered before the American continent. There is every reason to believe it was discovered about the year 1000 by some people from Iceland, and later by John Cabot in 1497. Newfoundland, he said, is no part of Canada, having its own laws of commerce and a Governor-General appointed by the Crown.
He described the country as cold, bleak and foggy, and not conducive to the health of people not born there. The island has about 250,000 inhabitants, mostly of English, Scotch and Irish descent, some of whom have intermarried with the Esquimaux, and are known as half-breeds. (query).
Newfoundland, he stated is called "the country without an interior," the Irish inhabiting the bottoms because of their agricultural tendencies, the English and Scotch mostly living on the rugged coasts.
Practically all of the people live along the coast in fishing hamlets and towns and gain their livelihood chiefly by fishing and seal hunting, although logging, wood pulp and iron ore mining now have an important place in the industries of the people.
There is not a single loyal people to the Crown, he declared, although lately some of the Irish have inclined to Sinn Feinism. The island furnishes 20,000 volunteers and gained much distinction for its part in the great war.
Clergy Oppose Schools.
He described the educational system of the island as "the most abominable on the face of the earth," there being no public school system there, the principal opponent being the clergy. He told many interesting facts concerning the missionaries who brave the rigors of the country to minister to the physical and spiritual needs of a people who have practically no social life. This, he said, was particularly true of the island's northern neighbor, Labrador. Dogs, he stated, are the country's best of burden, and described one hamlet of ten families where there were 13 dogs.

Fish Tries to Kidnap Boy

Bradley Sherman, 18-year-old angler, was caught by a fish at Coney Island, Nov. 28. The fish, whose species could not be learned, because it escaped with Sherman's tackle, yanked the young man off a bulkhead and started out to sea. Sherman was unconscious and nearly drowned when other fishermen rescued him and sent him to a hospital.

Killed Sister-in-Law for Fifty Dollars.

Thomas Catherwood, 26, Chicago, confessed recently that he murdered his 21-year-old sister-in-law, Mrs. Betty Sharples, for \$50 which she and her husband had saved to buy Christmas presents. Mrs. Sharples had offered to take Catherwood and his wife to live with her. Catherwood was out of work, and Mrs. Sharples had even offered to divide her Christmas savings with him, that he might be tided over until he found a job. She had provided him also with something to eat just before the murder. And then, Catherwood confessed, he had strangled her, even while she was debating how much of her Christmas savings fund of \$50 she could spare to "stake" him.
