A member of the Cabinet-Colonel Amery, made a speech to the British Empire Union recently that is very significant. He advocated more trade with the Empire and hinted that the Government might be in favor of a ystem of "Imperial preference."

"The trade of our Empire," he said, is worth twenty-five per cent. more than that of the rest of the world put together." Another member of the Government s advocating a tax on foreign secur-

ities: and a third cabinet minister has declared that the British policy is "to populate the Colonies and in this way make our own markets." At present England's best customers are India and Australia. The Colonies, or Dominions, as they are now being called, bought \$1,000,000,000 worth of goods from Britain in 1913,

while America, Germany and Russia







There is nothing involved in the phraseology of the enswer of James Caines, George Leamon, and Matthew Smurrage, but in straight from-the-shoulder expressions they show the honourable minister that a fair valuation has been set upon his knowledge of West Coast conditions generally, and accordingly they proceed to enlighten him. The spirit of the people of Burnt Islands could not be broken by Mr. Coaker, neither could their sturdy independence be undermined or their aroused feelings cajoled by flattery or subdued by flapdoodle. The arguments set forth in the final message were unauswerable and the statement of facts incontrovertible. The blandishments and the rely-on-me advice of the Minister of Fisheries were not acceptable to the men of Burnt Islands, and in unmistakable language they told him so. The regulations hit them hard, how hard their first message tells. \*Cut off from the means of exstence." That sentence in itself is pregnant with meaning and proves conclus ively that the boasted Fish Regulations that were to accomplish so much good for the fishermen, had the very opposite effect. "Your regulations," continues the memorial, "have completely crippled our industry and thrown us on our backs." Is further testimony needed of the injustice of these same regulations?

#### First Tunnel Through the Alps.

The Mont Cenis tunnel had the distinction of being the first of the great tunnels through the Alps. The work of boring was commenced on March 25, 1857, and the mountain chain was actually pierced at the end of 1870. Several months further work was required before the tunnel was enlarged and completed sufficiently to make possible the passage of trains. The work was carried out under the famous engineers, Sommellier and Grattoni, the first of whom, whose life is commemorated by a statue at his native town of Annecy in Savoy, unfortunately died two months before the great task was completed. Although tunnelling arouses comparatively little interest now, unless conducted under extraordinary conditions., it must be remembered, that at the time of this work, such an undertaking involved a considerable degree of enterprise, and many of the conditions to be met with were entirely novel. The tunnel is just over eight miles in length, and the highest point ('.237ft.) is 5.320 feet below the crest of the range above. The work of piercing the range was comparatively slow until compressed air rock drilling was introduced, this heing the first time in which the system was successfully used for so important a work. The power was supplied by water, wheel, driving air compressors. The successful ending gave encouragement to other schemes, and the St. Gothard tunnel was bebun in 1872 and completed in 1880, to be followed by others.
