THE SOUTH AMERICAN WAR.

For the twentieth time, perhaps, we are told that the fortress of Humaita has fallen into the hands of the Allies. About a month ago a similar announcement reached us, but it was almost immediately followed by the counter declaration that the Paraguayans had repulsed with slaughter the attack upon their stronghold, and biography. that it was still in their own posses Advices from Rio Janeiro to the 8th ult. state that the garrison had been starved out, and evacuated the fortress, leaving to the enemy a number of valuable trophies, in the shape of munitions of war. We are also informed that the advance of the Brazil ian commander by land, and the presence of three iron-clads in front of Lopes's position was likely soon to leave the Paraguayans no choice but surrender. Whatever credence may be attached to this part of the story, whether Lopez and his followers will ever lay down their arms except with their lives, it seems not imprebable that the Allies have had the same trick played on them which the Babylonians in days of old played upon the conquering Alexander. A NEW EXPLOSIVE SUBSTANCE.—A Swedish inventor has submitted to a test before a number of scientific gentlemen in England, a new explosive substance called Dynamite, which is solid, granular, and resembles coarse dark sand. The test is thus spoken of: "A thin deal box containing ten pounds of the compound was placed over a raging fire; the box was-consumed, but there was no explosion, the dynamite mingled harmlessly with the sahes. It was placed in immediate contact with fire, with the same results. Gunpowder-was exploded near it without effect. The superiority of the material over the dangerous explosives was acknowledged by several practical persons present connected with the carrying trades. Ten pounds of dynamite were enclosed in a second deal box, and hurled from the top of a cliff. It fell sixty feet upon the rocks below, with no more signs of explosion than would be caused by the fall of a brickbat. Equally striking were the illustrations given of its "deadly strength. A cartridge filled with dynamite was placed upon a two inch plank. A fuse with a strong percussion cap was attached to it and fired, and the plank was split in several places, and had a hole knocked through it. The percussion cap is the explosive agent, and it is claimed that nothing else, so far as is known, will do the work." It is proposed that the new substance should be used for mine and quarry service, as it can be kept by traders without danger.
