The Gazette adds: An attempt to carry the proposed resolution would be a viola-tion of law and a direct correspondence with a foreign parliament would be a breach of the constitution. The government would certainly visit such an encroachment upon the domain of the monarchy with serious consequences.

Impatience and Acquiescence. "An English minister," says the Globe "once complained of the people's ignorant impatience of taxation. Sir Richard Cartwright truly said the danger in Canada today is from ignorant acquiescence in taxation." This admits the fact of popular acquiescence, at all events. The people may be taxed, but if they do not feel it they may still be happy. With regard to taxa tion and money matters generally, there is a certain very delusive kind of happiness which sometimes obtains, both with the individual in private and with the nation in public affairs. There may be a pledging of future income for present expenditure, thereby making things pleasant for a time, but involving shortness of funds and perhaps a crisis by and by. To all appearance the ignoran acquiescence condemned by Sir Richard is not of this character, at all events. The alleged extra taxation wrung from the people is collected year by year. They do not go in debt for it, but it is paid on the spot; the custom house gives no credit. If the people are fleeced, it is through no pretence of letting them off easily now, in order N. Is hereby given that the City of Toronto has applied to the Ontario Legislature for an Act, entitled "An Act to empower and authorize the City of Toronto to institute an issue of Corporation Stock for Drainage Works." Corporation Stock for Drainage works.

The Bill proposes amongst other things:

1. To provide for the issue of \$1,509,000 (if so required) of Irredeemable City Stock for Drainage Works only; the rate of interest not to exceed five per cent, and be fixed by the by-law authorizing the issue.

2. To limit the taxing power of the Cit Council to one and a half cents in the dolla on the assessed rateable property of the cit for general purposes, instead of two cents, a at present authorized. 3. To limit the borrowing powers of the city to four per cent on the assessed value of all rateable property over \$50,000,000, instead of eight per cent, as authorized by the Consolidation Act of 1879. dation Act of 1879.

4. The Act not to come into effect unless and until sanctioned by the vote of the electors taken as on a bylaw creating a debt.

The above Bill will be considered by the Committee on Private Bills in about ten days.
