





The transmission of speech through space on a ray of light, no wires or electricity being used for the purpose, is one of the latest achievements of Professor Bell, of telephone fame. The apparatus employed is known as the "Radiaphone," and is on exhibition in the Electricity Building at the World's Fair. The instrument, however, must be considered simply as an interesting scientific curiosity, as the distance the speech can be transmitted is limited and the words, as heard through the speaking tubes, lack sharpness of definition and have a somewhat muffled sound, which is probably due to the tube effects. In Boston under exceptionally favorable conditions articulate speech was transmitted by means of the radiaphone to a distance of about one-eight of a mile, but this distance is beyond its range under usual conditions. Opening into the chamber in the rear of this mirror is an ordinary speaking-tube, into which the sounds are uttered, causing the mirror to vibrate as would the diaphragm of a telephone transmitter. These rays, reflected in parallel lines, are received at the further end by a parabolic reflector, in the focus of which is as small portion of ordinary burnt cork. This bulb is blown into the end of a glass tube about one-quarter of an inch in diameter and four inches long, the other end of which is open, and to which is attached an ordinary phonograph hearing-tube which extends into a small cabinet, where the listener, removed from external noises, receives the message.

The only adjustments required are that the rays be directed from the mirror in the gallery in an axial direction into the parabolic reflector, and that the bulb containing the burnt cork be brought to the focus of the parabolic mirror. This latter is accomplished by pushing the glass tube in or out until satisfactory results are obtained.




