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

IT IS A RADIAPHONENOW

SPEECH TRANSMITTED THROUGH SPACE BY MEANS OF LIGHT.

Prof. Bell's Latest Idea—A New Instrument that is Said to be Much More Interesting Than Useful.

The transmission of speech through space on a ray of light, no wires or electricity being used for the purpose, is one of the latest achievements of Professor Bell, of telephone fame.

tern, whose rays, reflected parallel by a lens, are reflected from a thin diaphragm mirror to the receiving instrument about 80 or 90 feet away, at the north front of the Bell Telephone building.

Opening into the chamber in the rear of this mirror is an ordinary speaking tube, into which the sounds are uttered, causing the mirror to vibrate as would the diaphragm of a telephone transmitter.

These rays, reflected in parallel lines, are received at the further end by a small portion of ordinary burnt cork. This bulb is blown into the end of a glass tube about one-quarter of an inch in diameter and four inches long.

The only adjustments required are that the rays be directed from the mirror in the gallery in an arc which gives an upright, parabolic reflector, and that the bulb containing the burnt cork be brought to the focus of the parabolic mirror.

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WENT AGAINST THE COMPANY.

A Jury Assesses the Toronto Railway Company for \$1100.

Mr. Laidlaw exhausted his powers of oratory on the jury in Gossell against the Toronto Street Railway yesterday at the Assize Court for damages received by the plaintiff by being tumbled out of his cart by a trolley car.

On the 25th of last April Mr. Edward Gossell of 38 Wilton-avenue was driving a load of coal down Yonge-street. When near Scollard-street and while in the act of turning off the tracks his vehicle was struck by a motor car.

The wheel which was torn off the wagon was trundled into the court room by Mr. Fullerton, the counsel for the plaintiff.

Mr. Laidlaw objected to the rate of speed on an element in the case, when Mr. Fullerton volunteered the remark that the car was going 25 miles an hour.

Defendants counsel also drew the attention of the court to the fact that the car had the right-of-way, and vehicles must not obstruct it.
