CLAIM SHAVING BY THE MUTUAL RESERVE.

The Editor of Our Monthly issues a straight challenge to Auditor Cameron of the Mutual Reserve—A Red Hot Editorial. Editor World: In your issue of the 9th inst. appears a letter stated to have been written by Mr. D. E. Cameron of the Mutual Reserve to Managing Director Ellis of the Manufacturers' Life, in which Mr. Cameron has the gall to request Mr. Ellis to withdraw an editorial which appeared in Our Monthly for Dec. 1924, headed "The Mutual Reserve." That editorial, which was written by myself, is characterized by Mr. Cameron as a "vulgar and disgraceful attack," and a "spoof of falsehoods from beginning to end," about the worst that could be said of any article whatever. Mr. Cameron has been with the Mutual Reserve nearly four months, and, of course, knows all about that mutual institution. Mr. Cameron also is a gentleman of the utmost integrity, so much so, that whatever he says goes. Good. The issue is therefore between myself and Mr. Cameron, and the editorial which he has been good enough to characterize as "vulgar and disgraceful" is published hereunder, and I will give the sum of \$250 (two hundred and fifty dollars) to Mr. Cameron's pet charity, if he has one, if he can prove a single statement in it, or if he can prove in substance or fact, this is Mr. Cameron's supreme chance, if he can prove any work to be a true and honest matter, he begins to end he will do a good day's work for the Mutual Reserve, and if he cannot, of course it will not matter, he loses nothing. This offer holds good one week from date of publication.

CLAIM-SHAVING IN THE MUTUAL RESERVE.

The October number of The Vigilant contained a facsimile letter written to an agent by Vice-President O. H. Baldwin of the Mutual Reserve, in which that worthy gentleman (we presume he is a worthy gentleman) was indiscreet enough to say, that the Death Claim Department of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association had authority to approve any case for payment in full, and that it was useless to expect it to do so. Now anybody reading The Vigilant would naturally jump at the conclusion that it was useless to expect the Mutual Reserve to pay any death claim in full. But the Mutual Reserve pays some of its death claims in full, in fact it does not have or wriggle out of altogether (it has no other alternative), and the money thus saved in the course of every year amounts to an enormous sum. The Bulletin of Toronto for November editorially referring to this subject says "it is becoming a matter of common remark and complaint that the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association is 'shaving' its death claims." Well, we should say it is. The insurance and Commercial Gazette of Belfast, Ireland, which has always fought well for the Mutual Reserve, and therefore cannot be accused of being a "subsidized old line journal," calls attention in a recent issue to several cases of claim shaving in the Mutual Reserve. (The Gazette) is at a perfect loss to understand the conduct of the association, which calls for full official explanation, and unless that explanation is forthcoming, the immediate results cannot be otherwise than disastrous in the extreme. The Gazette recites among other cases of claim shaving the case of Mr. Satter of Belfast, who was "insured" in the Mutual Reserve for \$5000, which after negotiation was declared settled for \$4500, but it had not been paid and no reason had been given for the delay. First of all the widow was offered \$1200, then \$2500, then \$3750 and finally \$4500, (2500, 2500, 2750, 3000), and afterwards agreed upon the last sum as a basis of settlement. A death claim in the Mutual Reserve is not "due" until 90 days after being finally approved of. The Mutual Reserve is the most old line company, but few of them are under the necessity of putting the rule in force. The Mutual Reserve, however, is in the habit of delaying the "approval" of claims upon the most trivial pretexts, and, of course, if there is any noise made about it, "it's" it very easy to say that "Profratid Harper" and his office so recklessly "shave" the funds of the institution over which they preside, that not "one dollar" will ever be paid out on a claim until they are satisfied of the honesty of it? On account of this care and watchfulness, Harper is able to hold down in a single night two or three thousand dollars of the advances which rightfully belongs to the "widows and orphans he babbles so much about." The honesty of any single transaction which Mr. Harper is concerned in appears to be always all on his side—somebody or other, and in order to give better flavor to the delusion his tin trumpet, The Insurance Economist, reminds us every now and again that Edward B. Harper is a member of the Ontario Baptist Church in the city of New York, and not only a member, but the senior member of the Board of Trustees of "Albany Baptist Church," which church is a member of that to whom the Mutual Reserve offers \$500 in payment of \$1000—Ed. B. Harper, president, who offers it, or else it goes to church.

THE BATTLE AT MESSORO.

Telegrams Received in Rome indicating that the Situation is Critical. Rome, Jan. 16.—The Dog Chamberlain declares that it is uncertain whether the Italian troops under General Barbaresi or the Abyssinians under Chief Ras Mangasha have won the battle which has been fought at Messoro. The Government has received telegrams of the gravest character from Massawa, indicating that the situation is not as hopeful as has been officially stated. Official telegrams have been received stating that the battle with loss of the Abyssinians, who were pursued on Jan. 14, resulting in the defeat of the Abyssinians, who were pursued by the Italians. The Abyssinians lost hundreds of men, including several chiefs and several under chiefs. The loss of the Italians during the two days fighting was 250 men.

THE WORLD'S SUNDAY EXTRA.

The case against The World for a breach of the Sunday law is printing an extra on Sunday, Jan. 6, the day of the Globe fire, was settled in the Police Court yesterday. Mr. Murdoch said that while Mr. Murdoch was not as a matter of fact the publisher of the paper he would admit it and acknowledge having printed an extra involving an hour's work for each of six men early on the morning of the fire, that the paper had been printed, not to break the law nor for profit, but solely to allay the great excitement that prevailed on account of the extent of the fire and the loss of life and limb, and that once a reasonable number of papers had been printed he refused to allow the press to run in the afternoon, though there was a great demand for extras. The lawyer said he could bring scores of witnesses, leading citizens, to testify that they considered the extra a work of mercy or necessity, but he did not intend to do so. His Worship said that the staff-officer had in view, was merely to vindicate the law; he imagined that the paper was printed for the reasons assigned, though he did not think that the paper was a necessity, and therefore imposed a nominal fine of \$1 and discharged the boys who had sold the papers.
