By these examinations the dis-éase can be located before there is any ex-ternal indication of it in the patients and the contagion can thus be stayed. The alarming prevalence of the disease at the present time calls for prompt work in the direction here indicated.

Boston, Nov. 9.—The greatest week of the year 1894 is over and the country is still too near the facts to appreciate them in all caerimmensity. But it helps to keep running them over to take account of stock in one way and another. Take the great "wave" as a wave, in figures, for instance.

Of the three great "tidal waves" in the congressional elections in the past—the democratic defeat by the whigs, led by Gen. W. H. Benjamin at Port Williams, and was partially insured. The vessel was owned by the captain and others and was also partially insured. The body of the mate was recovered on Wednesday. It is understood the sale was for debt.

The Nova Scotians have in the past sold their cut of deals to go abroad at about \$9 per thousand. It is possible that even this price could be sensibly reduced, not by a reduction in the price of labor, because this will probably tend upward; but there is a good deal that the Nova-Scotia lumbermen have to learn in the way of modern improvements in their business, and it is probable that in a short time more the in coming of American operators will bring about a change in the wasteful method of using an axe instead of a cross-saw for cutting logs in the woods, while in the mills the machinery in use might be improved, with results of producing better lumber, and improvements could also be made, it is thought, in the care of lumber piling and shipping. Another large element of profit that has not hitherto been considered in Nova Scotia is the waste, which might be utilized for the manufacture of wood pulp.

It is estimated that the New England and New York markets consume annually 1,300,000,000 superficial feet of spruce alone, 18 say nothing of hemlock and hard woods, and as there has been, through the excessive cutting of timber in the New England states and the legislative restrictions that have been adopted in New York, a decided diminution in the source of supply, it is of advantage to us that a new source of supply has been opened within a short distance.
