On Wednesday evening, May 2nd, instead of the usual service, an illustrated lecture of English Church history was given. The Rev. F. A. Allen comes from the diocese of Ottawa, where he spends most of his time delivering these instructive lectures.

On Monday evening, May 13th, Rev. Marmaduke Hare, lectured on the Transvaal and the war. As Dr. Hare has spent many years in South Africa and was for a time chaplain to H.M. forces there, it was no wonder the lecture proved most enlightening.

The Chancel Guild no longer hold their weekly meetings, but their Church duties still continue. Each Saturday flowers are brought to the Church and arranged for the Altar on Sunday, and those members of the congregation who have gardens might perhaps spare a few flowers for the Church at this blossoming season. Guild were visited on May Day by the Mother Superior of S. John's. She came to inspect the embroidery for the new dossal and gave great encouragement to the workers.

On Sunday, 20th May, the services were specially joyous, in recognition of the relief of The doxology, national anthem and general thanksgiving were all said with "special intention."

The Synod of the Diocese meets on Tuesday, June 12th. Before our representatives can take their seats the parish has to pay to the Synod the sum of \$97, our assessment for Synod expenses this year. The Church of England Day School will hold their closing exercises in St. George's school house on the evening of Thursday, June 28th. The Sisters of the Church will give a hearty welcome to all who value Christian education.

### THE MEN'S BIBLE CLASS.

The Men's Bible Class closed on April 29th for the season. It was organized on Jan. 22nd. The number of names on the roll reached 21, and the average attendance was about 9. The subject for the year was "the missionary travels of St. Paul." The war took away three members: Tom Pepper, who went with the second contingent, and Charlie Godard and Albert Mc-Laughlin, who joined the Halifax regiment. Another member—Beauchamp Tesseman—unfortunately had to go to the Isolation Hospital with diphtheria. He had hardly recovered from this when he had scarlet fever, and has been in the hospital ever since. Beauchamp has many friends, and they will be glad to know that he will be quite well in a few days now. Eight dollars and forty cents were contributed by the class, which was devoted to the purchase of a Chalice and Paten, through the Dorcas secretary. At the final business meeting the director and secretary were instructed to send them to the Rev. J. E. Kimberly, and to have the following inscription engraved on the Paten: "St. Paul's Church, Wawanesa, from the Men's Bible Class, St. George's Church, Toronto, Easter, 1900."
