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P R E F A C E.

THIS little work requires no lengthened introductory remarks: Parents and Teachers will, on a very cursory review, perceive its paramount importance. Learning has been styled, the rich man's ornament and the poor man's riches. The fundamental branches of education are the most extensively useful, the the higher departments the most ornamental. Some acquirements are, at once, alike useful and ornamental: and among these, correct spelling, polite pronunciation, and an intimate acquaintance with the meaning of words, hold a high rank. For the simultaneous acquisition of these elementary accomplishments, the following pages have been compiled; and their thus accompanying each other, will be found to lessen the teacher's labor and economise the pupil's time. A suitable class-book of this kind has hitherto been much wanted in British America, and the public must judge whether this publication will supply the desideratum.

The orthoepy has been chiefly taken from the best edition of Mr. Walker's Critical Pronouncing Dictionary; which for some time has been the acknowledged standard of polite usage in that department, in the same manner that Dr. Johnson's Dictionary, for a long period, been generally considered the standard of orthography.

When Demosthenes, the prince of Athenian orators, was asked what was the first requisite in oratory,—he answered, pronunciation: what was the second? pronunciation: what was the third? the great Rhetorician still answered pronunciation.* This shows in what estimation he held elegant pronunciation: and shall it be held in lower estimation in this age of refinement,—in the 19th century! than it was 300 years prior to the commencement of the Christian era? surely not. Undoubtedly it is a pleasing and desirable accomplishment; and youth is the best season for its acquisition. Would teachers then take a little pains to make their pupils thoroughly acquainted with the different vowel sounds in the Key, and to mark the accented syllables with a smart percussion of the voice, they would find them go on afterwards in the most easy and satisfactory manner.

The Scripture Proper Names are taken from a masterly performance by Mr. Walker, entitled "A Key to the classical pronunciation of Greek, Latin, and Scripture Proper Names." This long catalogue of names is not given for an exercise in spelling, but *merely for the sake of pronunciation*: as in all well-regulated schools the Bible is used, more or less, as a class-book. It would, however, be no unprofitable exercise, for teachers to make their advanced classes occasionally read these Names word by word in rotation, for the better infixing in their memory the true pronunciation. This department has been much neglected, for we frequently hear the Scripture Proper Names improperly accented or otherwise mispronounced, even sometimes from the pulpit.

Words in all living languages are liable to change in orthography, pronunciation, and even in meaning and use. What a number of words in our language are changed in spelling since Dr. Johnson's time: for instance, one class of words, by universal consent, now end with *c*, as *almanac*, *arctic*, *ecliptic*, *critic*, *electric*, *fabric*, *mechanic*, *music*, *public*, *tonic*, &c. These and all such words in his dictionary end in *ck*. Another class of words are spelled thus in Dr. Johnson's Dictionary, *emperour*, *superiour*, *inferiour*, *errour*, *horrour*, *honour*,

favour, terror, &c. These words are now spelled by the learned and polite in England and America without the letter *u*. But there are a number of words of the same class and derivation only in a state of transition towards this change in England, such as *ardour, arbour, colour, flavour, humour, harbour, labour, neighbour, regour, splendour, tremour, vigour, &c.* The same change in spelling these and all such words, is adopted in this book: because the Johnsonian mode is 'useless to the orthography, opposed to etymology, and contrary to analogy'.—Pope says,

In words as fashions the same rule will hold,
Alike fantastic if too new or old;
Be not the first by whom the new are tried,
Nor yet the last to lay the old aside.

Another change in orthography, though not of frequent occurrence, is adopted in this vocabulary; viz.—In derivative words the final consonant of the primitive is doubled only *when under the accent*, in conformity with one of the best established principles of the language. Dr. Louth pointed out this error long ago, but its importance has not hitherto met with the attention it deserves. He says, 'The error of doubling the final consonant when not under the accent, frequently takes place in the words *worshipping, counselling, &c.*, which, having the accent on the first syllable, ought to be written *worshiping, counseling, &c.*' An ignorance of this rule has led many to write *bigotted* for *bigoted*, and from this spelling has arisen a false pronunciation; but no letter seems to be more frequently doubled improperly than *l*. Why we should write *libelling, revelling, cancelling, and yet offering, suffering, reasoning*, I am at a loss to determine. What would we say of a man who wrote *audittor, gardener, laborer*?

Perhaps the *pronunciation* of not many common words has been changed since Mr. Walker's time; the last edition of his valuable Dictionary with 'considerable improvements and large additions' by himself, was published in 1806. Since his time we have no further authority or guide. In America Webster's Dictionary, and in England the Imperial Dictionary recently published, both of them great national and standard works in other respects, are deficient in the department of pronunciation. They contain many hundreds of new words, chiefly scientific, technical, and derived from other languages, all which enrich the English tongue and render it more copious, but in pronunciation they are jejune and unsatisfactory. For the orthoepy of these new words we must therefore have recourse to Walker's standard,—*polite usage*.

In this age of wonderful inventions and discoveries, it has lately been found out in a certain quarter that a spelling-book is unnecessary, and the reason assigned is, that in learning other languages no such book is used. But the cases are quite different. It is also urged as a better plan, to teach children to spell from their reading lessons: this should not be omitted, but teachers of experience know well that it requires both methods, *and another also*, (to write to dictation) to make their pupils proficient in orthography. Those who are said to have made this discovery have, however, strongly recommended "The Spelling-book superseded,"—itself being a real Spelling-book, and to be used as such. As we never saw "*The Spelling-book*,"—whether the one Dr. Mavor studied at school, or the one used in St. Patrick's time is alluded to we cannot tell.—Thus far we concede,—that a spelling-book which gives neither the meaning nor the pronunciation of the words in its "interminable columns" may be deemed worthless, but we think such as have *both* these requisites, are really useful to children in learning the language, which, in future, they are to speak and write. And where can a book of this kind be more necessary than in Canada? to assist in the acquisition of correct orthography and pure English orthoepy among a population of different languages and dialects;—in the spell-

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ing and pronunciation of a language, too, probably destined to become the uni-
 versal language of the world.

Mr. Sullivan of the Dublin Normal School, is the author of 'The Spelling-book
 superseded.' Like many other books on education it contains some useful hints
 to teachers; but wherein consists its superiority or practical utility for school
 purposes? In one part of it he gives a long 'collection of the most difficult
 words in the language' without either meaning or pronunciation; which the
 pupils are required to spell, pronounce, and give their own ideas of the meaning
 of the words. The following are a few of the words as they appear in his book
 without even an accent. "Chicane parterre phaeton suasive archives catarrh
 asthma phantasm devoir falchion cuirass demesne glacies marquee turquois valise
 finesse abscond phthisic hautboy morone sombre cartouch sophism yacht eschew
 pseudo furlough paraphernalia pharmacy epigrammatic massacre pneumatics
 orchestre mucilaginous schismatic corypheus heterogeneous mausoleum pleni-
 potentiary vermicelli diaphragm centrifugal metaphysical scholium homologous
 escutcheon poursuivant," and hundreds of others such as these. By perseverance
 children may learn to spell these words, but what havoc they must make in the
 pronunciation! and what ideas they can be expected to have of their meaning
 (if any at all, would be difficult to conjecture!!

Words in Mr. Sullivan's book accompanied with the meaning, are chiefly a
 few monosyllables. In another list of words without any meaning to them,
 occupying 11 pages, and styled *words of disputed or difficult pronunciation*, he
 professes to give the pronunciation: it will be seen, however, to be partial, in-
 elegant, and erroneous, when placed in juxtaposition with Mr. Walker's: We
 give a specimen.

The Irish National School-books are frequently faulty in the division of words into syllables, which must be productive of an erroneous pronunciation; it may be good Irish orthoepy,—it is bad English. 1st. Some words are divided into *one syllable more* than they have in right pronunciation, such as *anx-i-ous* for *anx-i-ous*, *pa-ti-ent* for *pa-tient*, *pre-ci-ous* for *pre-cious*, *fil-i-al* for *fil-ial*, *fa-mil-i-ar* for *fa-mil-iar*, *ra-pa-ci-ous* for *ra-pa-cious*, *un-con-sci-ous* for *un-con-scious*. 2nd. Others are divided into *one syllable less*, as *o-be-dient* for *o-be-di-ent*, *righteous* for *righte-ous*, *in-con-ve-nient* for *in-con-ve-ni-ent*, *pecu-li-ar* for *pe-cu-li-ar*, *il-lus-trious* for *il-lus-tri-ous*. 3rd. A great number of words are divided so as to give a wrong sound to one important vowel in the word, as *gen-e-ral* for *gen-er-al*, *sov-e-reign* for *sov-er-eign*, *in-nu-me-ra-ble* for *in-nu-mer-a-ble*, *ge-o-gra-phy* for *ge-og-ra-phy*, *des-pon-den-cy* for *de-spon-den-cy*, *hor-i-zon* for *ho-ri-zon*, *se-par-a-tion* for *sep-ar-a-tion*, *re-pre-sent* for *rep-re-sent*, *me-an-cho-ly* for *mel-an-cho-ly*, *des-pise* for *de-spise*, *ne-glect-ed* for *neg-lect-ed*, *es-cape* for *e-escape*, *se-ro-ci-ty* for *se-roc-i-ty*. 4th. The termination *ed* should have been made a separate syllable, only when it is pronounced as such. And it would have been of great advantage to the pupils if the accented syllables had been marked. But these Irish books give the pupils as little assistance as possible, and consequently throw the greatest labor upon the teachers.

SECTION V. DERIVATION OF WORDS,—PREFIXES AND AFFIXES.
 (to be committed to memory.)

Words are either *primitive* or *derivative*.

A *primitive* word is not derived from any other word in the language, as *man, good, teach, work*.

A *derivative* word is formed from some other word or words, as *mankind, goodness, teacher, workmanship*.

The primitive word from which the derivatives are formed, is called the *root*. The letters and syllables which are placed before the root in the formation of derivatives, are called *prefixes*. The letters and syllables which are placed after the root, are called *affixes*.

SECTION VI.—SCRIPTURE PROPER NAMES.

Mr. Walker's Rules for their Pronunciation.

1. Where the vowels end a syllable with the accent on it, they have their long open sound, as *Na'-bal*, *Je'-hu*, *Si'-rach*, *Go'-shen*, *Tu'-bal*.

2. When a consonant ends the syllable, the preceding vowel is short, as *Sam'-u-el*, *Lem'-u-el*, *Sim'-e-on*, *Sol'-o-mon*, *Suc'-colth*, *Syn'-a-gogue*.

3. Every final *i* forming a distinct syllable, though unaccented, has the long open sound, as *A'-i*, *A-ris'-a-i*.

4. Every unaccented *i* ending a syllable, not final, is pronounced like *e*, as *A'-ri-el*, *Ab'-di-el*; pronounced *A'-re-el*, *Ab'-de-el*.

5. Sometimes the vowels *ai* are pronounced as a diphthong in

one syllable, like our English diphthong in the word *daily*, as *Ben-ai'-ah*, *Hu'-shai*, *Hu'-rai*; and sometimes they are pronounced in two syllables as *Sham'-ma-i*, *Shash'-a-i*, *Ber-ai'-ah*, *Ber-a-i'-ah*.

6. *Ch* is pronounced like *k*, as *Che'-mosh*, *Che'-bar*, *E'-noch*, pronounced *Ke'-mosh*, *Ke'-bar*, *E'-nok*. *Cherubim*, and *Rachel*, seem to be perfectly anglicised, as the *Ch* in these words is always heard as in the English words *cheer*, *child*, *riches*. The same may be observed of *Cherub*, signifying an order of angels; but when it means a city of the Babylonish empire, it ought to be pronounced *Ke'-rub*.

7. *G* has its hard sound before *e* and *i* in Hebrew proper names, as *Ge'-ra*, *Ge'-i-zim*, *Gid'-e-on*, *Me-gid'-do*, *Gil'-gal*, *Ig-c-ab'-a-rim*, *Shu'-ge*, *Pa'-gi-el*, &c, with the exception of those words, which, by passing through the Greek of the New Testament, have conformed to the Greek pronunciation; such as *Ge-nes'-a-reth*, *Beth'-pha-ge*, &c, pronounced *Je-nes'-a-reth*, *Beth'-fa-je*, &c. *C* has generally its soft sound before *e*, *i*, and *y*.

8. The unaccented termination *ah* so frequent in Hebrew proper names, is pronounced like *a* in *far*; also when accented, in other situations, as *Tah'-e-ra*, *Tah'-pe-nes*, &c., and the final *h* preserves the other vowels open, as *Col'-ho'-zeh*, *Shi'-loh*; pronounced *Col'-ho'-zee*, *Shi'-lo*.

9. The diphthong *ei* is always pronounced like *ee*, thus, *Sa'-mei-us*, is pronounced as if written *Sa-mee'-us*.

10. Gentiles, as they are called, ending in *ines* and *ites*, as *Philistines*, *Hivites*, *Hittites*, &c., being anglicised in the translation of the Bible, are pronounced like formations of our own, as *Florentines*, *Whitfieldites*, *Durhamites*.

NOTE I.—When a word is succeeded by a word printed in Italics, this latter word is merely to spell the former as it ought to be pronounced. Thus *As'-c-fa* is the true pronunciation of the preceding word *Ac'-i-pha*, and so of the rest.

NOTE II.—Deeming it unnecessary to give the whole of the Scripture Proper Names, we have selected all the most difficult ones, and trust no inconvenience will arise from the omission of those that are comparatively easy.
