"I have no use for theatres, pure or impure, I never was in one in my life. When I was very young my mother gave me the idea of the evil of cards and theatres, and she made me feel that the evil one was never very far from those woh had to do with either." With this utterance Mrs. McKeegan, secretary of the Traveler's Aid Assaciation, who, under the ausipces of the Y. W. C. A. has been looking after the welfare of young women at the Union Station, made clear her position with regard to certain features of the present day social conditions when she addressed the Vigilance Association at its meeting in College street last night. Mrs. McKeegan spoke from a deep. self-avowed ignorance of the social evil and the conditions surounding it, and as she spoke, one gleaned the idea that this middle aged Socteh woman, with the smiling, kindly eyes, was helping mainly thru her terribly earnest desire to do good.

She told of a number of young women with whom she had been acquainted in her work at the station, and whom she had saved from what might have been grave menaces to their moral welfare.

Cool Weather Marks the Finish of the Season and Grapes Are Now Com-

ing In.

Buying was very light at the Toront fruit market yesterday, and as one dealer put it, the retailers were "walking around with their hands in their pockets, and didn't care whether they bought anything or not." This feature was owing, probably, to the sudden stiffening of peach, pear and plum prices, thru the sudden dropping off of the incoming supply. This dropping off of the peach supply marks the com-mencement of the going out of this fruit. All the heavy crop is harvested, and dealers state that few more fancy

peaches will arrive.

A few Leno peaches were selling at around 35c a basket, and better qualities ranged all the way up to 90 cents, the price for fancy fruit. Plums, nearly done, sold from 50 to 75 cents. Pears, also scarce, 50 to 65 cents a basket. Apples from \$2 to \$3 per barrel, with a few barrels of large cooking apples at \$2 to \$2,50. Small baskets of blue and green grapes brought from 17 to 20 cents, red from 20 to 25 cents. It is a little early for beavy buying of grapes. little early for heavy buying of grapes, but the supply continues fairly heavy, and the demand is fairly good,



Subdividing In West Has Gone Too Far

WEDNESDAY MORNING

Says Canadian Northern Land Man Just Returned From Investigating Many Cities - Central Property Will Always Have Good Business and Income

Western cities have been subdivided too far out. The end, and it will be serious, is bound to come soon, the quicker the better. So declares William McBain, land agent of the Canadian Northern Railway, who has just re-turned from a four weeks' trip thru the west, taken with Sir Herbert Rogers, an English investor of some

The tour was made for the sole purpose of examining real estate conditions, and included every city. Mr. McBain found the central property in all the cities was sound, for it would always have a certain amount of in-come and a general demand. He could not say the same for the outside property, unless there were some special enterprises, such as industrial or railway works, to give it value for building purposes. And these did not give an excuse for the subdivisions of land for miles ground social states. an excuse for the subdivisions of land for miles around, as is often done. Some cities, he found, the population of which did not exceed Toronto's annual increase, had laid out areas as large or greater than this city's. If himous efficulties aid ensue from over land speculation, the cities themselves were most to blame. The growth of the cities themselves were most to blame. selves were mos to blame. The gov-ernment, he thinks, should have some sort of regulation over land subdi-

Mr. McBain, when in Vancouver, locked over the C. N. R.'s entrance plans now before the city council and progressing favorably. The project is to tunnel an entrance from the south to False Creek, an arm of the sea, and the earth from the tunnel used to fill the top end of the arm, which at low tide is mud flats. Included in the scheme is a station on Main street, not far from Hastings street.
