He characterized the criticism of Toronto newspapers as most unfair and misrepresenting, and declared the Northwest got only what they had already made for themselves, and what was given Canada in 1867 for the protection of the Protestant minerity in Quebec. Likewise, Sir Wilfrid had upheld provincial rights in 1896, when he protected Manitoba in her right to make her own educational laws.
