IS A. B. AYLESWORTH CORPORATION LAWYER AND A PUBLIC ENEMY?

Continued from Page 1.

The chairman: The right to these is not in the crown, not in the province. Mr. Aylesworth: No doubt. The chairman: Then if that is so, I am not troubled over your proposition that the municipalities have no control over the streets.

The chairman: If the municipalities have been given the control of the streets, is it not technically known as property in the streets?

Mr. Aylesworth: That is the point I want to make, that the control of the streets was given to the municipalities, not for the purpose of making gain or profit for the municipalities, but for the purpose of the general public, not merely for their own citizens, but for all His Majesty's liege subjects and for the aliens as well.

The chairman: The right to these is not in the crown, not in the province? Mr. Aylesworth: Precisely.

The chairman: Well, that decision that you read from Mr. Justice Meredith.

Mr. Aylesworth: That was not the decision I was alluding to. The chairman: I know it, went further than your statement of law. He admits that the land is vested in the municipalities.

Mr. Aylesworth: Here is the section, the first section, 600, gives jurisdiction. Mr. Aylesworth: I know that is in the provincial government.

The chairman: Section 601 says: "Every public right shall be vested in the municipality subject to any rights in the soil reserved to the person."

Mr. Aylesworth: That is just what I have been stating. If you look at section 599 you will see that the section in the highways remains in the crown. Section 600 deals with the case of a road that is dedicated and in which the owner may have reserved certain rights.

The chairman: When you have argued that Zulus and foreigners, in the moment they come here, have rights to these streets—they have no rights until they come to the municipalities.

Mr. Aylesworth: Certainly not, until they come and tread there. The chairman: And therefore the municipality is the trustee for the people within that municipality.

Mr. Aylesworth: All that seek to use the rights of travel. They need not use that right until they come to it. The chairman: Therefore it is strictly given to them for the benefit of the municipality, and for those outside the municipality while they are within the municipality.

Mr. Aylesworth: And for the use of the Bell Telephone Company, as one of the public of this Dominion. The chairman: When they come to it.

Mr. Aylesworth: When they come within it. Mr. Maclean: And they have no more rights there than parliament gave to them.

LOCAL TELEPHONE SYSTEMS A NUISANCE. Mr. Aylesworth (page 90): I am arguing simply against the contention that a local municipality, because by the local legislature it is given the legislative control for certain purposes over the highways, has thereby secured the right to make that a commodity out of which it can have gain.

The chairman: The municipalities have apparently been in parliament using these streets to a particular individual, to wit, a company, and out of that sale make gain. I say it is an illegitimate transaction, that is the purpose for which the streets are given into the control of the local municipalities, and that any theory that it is, so, is a false one and demonstrated to be utterly erroneous by the slightest consideration of the general purposes for which that strip of land in any cases was dedicated to public use.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE A NUISANCE. Mr. Aylesworth (page 92): I do not want to encroach at all upon the vexed question of municipal ownership. No doubt there are two opinions upon the subject, but I think there are some members of the committee who would agree with my views, at any rate, that a municipal service is an unmitigated nuisance to the citizens and an unmitigated loss. However that may be, the question is whether it is likely that the people of any community would have a better telephone service under a system where there was some experience and some expert knowledge, or under a gentleman who might, without any previous knowledge of the subject, be pitched into the position of telephone manager and changed and whether there is any preference to the management of some person skilled in the time for nothing to the service of a city and who simply occupies the position of alderman or mayor, perhaps for a twelvemonth, would be come during that twelvemonth, so skilled in the operation of a complicated piece of mechanism or a complicated system of work like the telephone system, as that he could give under his management, better service than men who had spent a lifetime at the system?

The chairman: They do not change municipal employees with electricity. Mr. Aylesworth: I have never heard of it being done. I think the citizens of any municipality have not had such results from any experiments at municipal ownership as would justify the expense of wishing to have it in preference to the management of some person skilled and permanently employed in that line of work.

GOVERNMENT TRUNK LINES A CONFUSION. Mr. Bergeron: And if the trunk lines belong to the government? Mr. Aylesworth: I think the trunk lines belong to the government, but I think we would have confusion worse confounded.

The chairman (page 95): The law requires a railway to carry the cars of another railway? Mr. Aylesworth: To the exclusion of its own. Mr. Maclean: Yes, certainly. Mr. Aylesworth: With all deference I do not think so.

The chairman: You think the railway can refuse to haul the cars of another railway? Mr. Aylesworth: Certainly not. The chairman: Then for a time the Bell Company cannot occupy the place occupied by the other. Mr. Aylesworth: There is no difference is apparent. One message occupies the whole line until it reaches its destination. The chairman: One car occupies an exclusive place also over the line.

Mr. Aylesworth: One car occupies a space of 33 feet, and is continually shifting. Of course any company is very glad to haul the cars of another company instead of using its own rolling stock. Mr. Maclean: Why not the Bell Company then? Mr. Aylesworth: Because they are perfectly willing to take charge of the message, but they are not willing and ought not to be asked to defer their own legitimate business while some person who is an active competitor is using their property for his own purposes. Is it not manifest that if he takes his cars to Ottawa or Montreal, the business of the Bell Telephone Company, all its own business, is being suspended while that conversation is going on? As a matter of fact you have it in evidence already that the present long-distance lines of the Bell Telephone Company barely suffice to accommodate the business it has.

The chairman: Why? Mr. Aylesworth: Because it does a business now which occupies all the money it has invested, because it is difficult, if not impossible, to go on increasing its capital. Mr. Maclean: Because they have only got a single wire. Mr. Aylesworth: Is it then the proposition—I do not know what the gentleman is proposing—is it the proposition that the shareholders of the Bell Company are to be required by act of parliament to put their hands into their pockets and to supply out of their own private purses a vehicle of traffic for a rival or competitive concern? I do not know whether this is their proposal, it does not seem to be equitable or just for parliament is a court of equity. Is it just that a man should have the right to take coin from my pocket? Is it any more just that a competing company should lay hold of the property of the Bell and use it for their own purposes, if we want it, and you will stand back with your own legitimate business?

Mr. Maclean: Parliament has over and over again passed laws to compel railway companies to receive traffic from other companies. Mr. Aylesworth: No objection is offered to receiving messages from people and transmitting messages from any other company, as that is our corporate purpose, but we do object to being turned out of the use of our own property even for five minutes. And if five minutes, why not for five hours or five years? Mr. Maclean: Your line is there for serving the great public and it is earning money. Mr. Aylesworth: We are serving the greater public when we are serving our own subscribers, because if we were serving some farmer who has built his independent line to connect with ours. The chairman: If it were not for the farmers your company would not amount to much.

Mr. Aylesworth: I have made the suggestion over and over again today to take their messages and transmit them. Mr. Miller: When? Mr. Aylesworth: As soon as we receive them; just as the general public is served. Mr. Maclean: But do not compel you to switch. Mr. Aylesworth: Do not put them in possession of our property to the exclusion of our own customers. Is it right or fair? Would any merchant submit to such a thing that he should be asked to serve his rival's customers to the exclusion of his own who had been dealing with him for years? That is literally our position. We have built up a business and are endeavoring to give the best service we can. One of our subscribers wants to use the line to Montreal, but he finds that it is being used by somebody else who is a rival in the trade.

The chairman: Upon proper terms. Mr. Aylesworth: It might be perfectly fair to the shareholders, but I am speaking rather in the interests of the customers whom we serve. Am you to injure a thousand subscribers? The chairman: Who is proposing that? Mr. Aylesworth: I think those who propose physical connection. The chairman: Regardless of terms? Mr. Aylesworth: I cannot see any difference. The chairman: Is it your contention that there should be no arrangement under some proper tribunal to regulate an interchange of traffic on proper and just terms? Mr. Aylesworth: Again and again I have tried to say that an interchange of traffic means reception and transmission of messages. The chairman: You object to that?

CHARLES WALKER IS KILLED TAKES REVENGE ON GIRL

Slashes Her With Sharp Knife and Then Turns Weapon on Himself.

Flint, Mich., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—With a knife ground to the keenness of a razor, for the occasion, James Pritchard this evening attacked and killed 17-year-old Hazel Pettis in her home and gashed her throat three times. Then the girl's mother, attracted attention and Pritchard was seized by two workmen in an adjoining yard and held until arrested. Next day he was found in the girl's room, likely to prove fatal, as the knife did not reach a vital spot.

The girl was about six months ago from Chatham, Ont., and worked in a local second-hand store, when Miss Pettis also was employed. He became very much smitten with her, but his attentions were distasteful and she finally told him day or two ago that they must cease. In his cell to-night Pritchard did not seem to be very sorry for what he had done, saying that the girl had jilted him and he wanted revenge.

AYLESWORTH A PUBLIC ENEMY

The Globe yesterday in bold lines asked W. F. Maclean of The World to prove the charge.

Mr. Aylesworth is a public enemy because he can be retained and has been paid to say a parliamentary committee.

(1) That parliament has no right to revise or further regulate the franchise it originally gave to the Bell Telephone Company.

(2) That the municipalities do not own the streets and have no right to toll or demand terms from the Bell Company for the use of the streets.

(3) That parliament must not make the Bell Company interconnect telephone connection with other companies.

(4) That public ownership of telephones is an unlimited nuisance—also the independent lines of farmers.

(5) That it would be unjust to put an end to the Bell exclusive telephone entry to railway stations.

Is that the kind of man to put in charge of the postoffice of Canada (owned by the people) or to look forward to as a likely minister of justice?

While he indulges in some general platitudes in his speech of Thursday that he had cut his connection with the Bell Company, and that when the business of the country warranted it, the government would see that a telephone was put in the house of every farmer, he did not repudiate a single one of the above set-out contentions of his made in the interest of the Bell Company.

FINLAND RESUMES RIGHTS

On Tuesday a meeting of Finland constitutionalists drew up a declaration of intent to the administration of the country in accordance with the terms of the constitution of the grand duchy.

On presentation to Prince John Obolensky, the Russian governor-general, he announced that he had been instructed to submit to the emperor a bill to legislate for Finland. The Finlanders however, have now taken the matter of recovery of their ancient rights and liberties into their own hands.

A peaceful revolution, during which the government-general virtually abdicated, has resulted in the re-establishment of the ancient constitution. In addition, however, the leaders demand further democratic reforms, including universal suffrage, and appeal is to be made to the czar to grant the concessions asked.

It was in 1899 the first of the recent steps to abrogate the Finnish constitution were taken. The czar then ordered that all new laws affecting Finland should thereafter be submitted to the Diet, and then sent up to the imperial state council for approval and promulgation. This destroyed the exclusive right of discussion enjoyed by the Finnish parliament, and was intended to effect the Russification of the country.

Both Diet and senate opposed the ruder and also the scheme of obliging military service, but their protests were unavailing. The civil administration of the army was transferred to the Russian minister of war and other measures taken to deprive it of its national character. In June, 1900, an imperial ukase commanded the gradual introduction and use of the Russian language, and in 1902 the people refused to elect the conscription boards. This was followed by an edict placing the senate, which is the supreme court of justice, under the direct supervision of the governor-general, thus placing the whole judicial system under his control.

These arbitrary invasions of the provincial rights have now been swept away by the revolution—it remains to be seen whether the czar will effect the situation or make another attempt to coerce a peaceable and liberty-loving people. There is little doubt that the indignation of the Finlanders from whom the crews of the imperial navy were largely drawn, resulted in the improvement of its maritime triumph of the Japanese fleet.

The destruction of Finland's constitutional autonomy turned against the imperial reactionaries and has added to the long list of humiliations other than the loss of her islands that they have had to suffer. If the czar is

DOCTOR'S TREATMENTS DISCOURAGE MATRIMONY

So Say Those Who Keep an Eye on the Marriage Rate—Poor Men Oftenest Marry.

There is alleged to be a big falling off in the number of marriages among young men in comfortable circumstances—that is, men who earn from \$1200 to \$2500 a year. There is no falling off in the marriage returns of laborers and clerks who earn less than \$1200 a year.

A partial explanation of this state of affairs, in the opinion of some men of experience, is the growing popularity of the bachelor apartment house. The decline in marriages of men in easy circumstances, they remark, has kept pace with the increase in the number of houses put up solely for men's use.

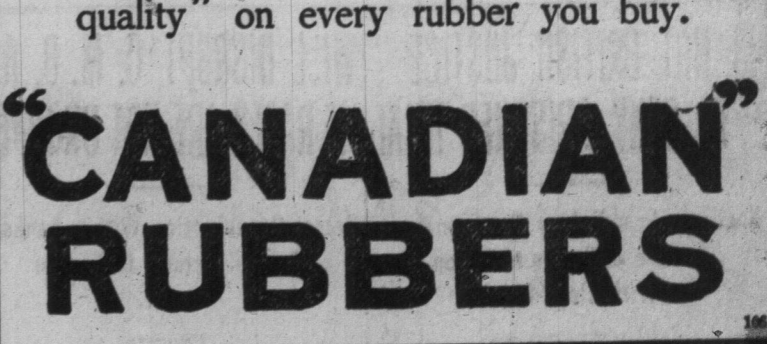

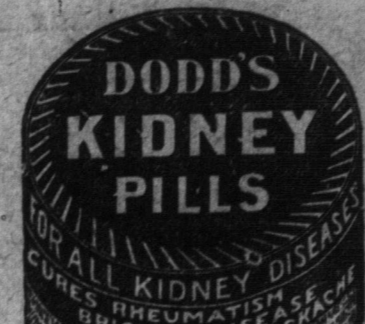

Plumbers' Troubles Are Added to by Another Accusation—Books Show Collusion.

"I think the books I obtained at the offices of the Central Supply Company, and the home of George Kincaid, the secretary of the Plumbers' Union, will prove that there is collusion between the masters and the journeymen," said Crown Attorney Curry yesterday. The attorney-general's department have been interested in the case, and it is possible proceedings will be stopped if the association is dissolved, although the crown attorney has refused to consider any overtures. As a result of the information contained in the books seized in the raids, Crown Attorney Curry directed another information to be laid yesterday for conspiracy in restricting trade in plumbers' supplies. The defendants are Vice-President Curlick, O. J. Curney Foundry Company, A. McMichael of the James Robertson Company, and H. P. Bush of the Ideal Sanitary Company. Port Hope, all members of the Central Supply Association, and Fred Armstrong, H. J. Allen and C. H. Beavis, all master plumbers.
