

LAURIER AND ROOSEVELT FAVOR IRISH MOVEMENT

T.P. O'Connor Cites the Reception Given to Delegates in Canada to Back His Arguments Against Government's Landlord Policy—No Peace Negotiations Proceeding.

London, Jan. 24.—Replying in the Commons today to questions regarding the government's land policy, Lord Cranborne, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, said the occupation of a port on the Persian Gulf by Russia or any other foreign power would be inconsistent with the maintenance of the status quo, which was the policy of the government to maintain there.

In regard to Manchuria, said Lord Cranborne, it was the government's policy to maintain the status quo in China, as determined by treaty.

Mr. A. J. Balfour, the government leader, made a comprehensive denial of the peace stories. He declared that since the negotiations between Lord Kitchener and General Botha no proposals, having in view the termination of the war in South Africa, had been received from anyone professing to have the authority of the Boer leaders to be inconsistent with the maintenance of the status quo, which was the policy of the government to maintain there.

T. P. O'Connor, Irish Nationalist, made a strong fighting speech in support of John Redmond's amendment of yesterday to the address in reply to the speech from the Throne at the opening of parliament. He was frequently cheered.

Mr. O'Connor made a special point of the recent reception of the Irish delegates in the United States by President Roosevelt, who, he said, was in thorough sympathy with the Irish movement, and by the Canadian Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who, he added, held the same views.

The speaker further asserted that the greatest of all obstacles to a good understanding between the United States and Great Britain was the Irish question, which haunted, and which would continue to haunt, Great Britain in all parts of the world. The Irish members, before now, had made ministries, and they would make and unmake more ministries. Landlordism in Ireland was doomed. The government knew it was beaten all over Ireland on the question of compulsory land purchase, and the present debate marked the commencement of a new epoch in the progress of Ireland.

Mr. Redmond's amendment was rejected by a vote of 237 to 134.

Provision Ships on Way New Plan for the Lakes

Steel Trust Will Adopt An Innovation That Will Cause Vesselmen to Talk.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Jan. 24.—Time-saving things in the handling of ships on the great lakes have become the wonder of the marine world, but never has any scheme in that direction caused more comment among vesselmen than the one now being prepared by the steel trust for use here next season. There have been in the navy devices for coaling ships at sea, and the floating blacksmith-shop Vulcan was used around Sault to keep the machinery of the warships in repair. But naval officials never went to the length of provisioning their craft while under way. Yet that is what the steel trust is going to do here.

The large ferry steamer Superior, which has been used as an excursion boat at Cleveland, is now being fitted out with a kitchen and a dining room. It will carry provisions for the length of its voyage, and the steel trust is going to do here.

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NIGHT LISTEN TO CANADA IF PEACE WAS PROPOSED

Member of South African Chartered Company Has No Faith in Boer War Rumors.

New York, Jan. 24.—Lawson D. Smith, of the South African Chartered Company, was a passenger on the White Star liner Germanic, which sailed yesterday for Liverpool. Mr. Smith has been in Canada for several weeks. He would not disclose the nature of his mission there. Asked his opinion regarding the recent peace rumors between Britain and Boer in South Africa, he said:

"I do not think there is anything in these rumors. The British government has already offered to the Boers every reasonable concession, outside of complete independence. The Boer, however, is a warrior, and it is safe to bet he will never accept such proposals. The British, on the other hand, for the sake of their prestige, cannot do anything else but continue to fight. Had the war been between two great powers, and one of them had got as near exhaustion as the Boers are, some other power would have come forward with proposals of mediation. The British government, however, will not brook any interference. This attitude has barred the way to any effort at conciliation. If the government were to accept such proposals, it would be most acceptable."

"From what country, then, would Britain be most likely to consider proposals of mediation, if offered?" he was asked.

"Canada, undoubtedly," said Mr. Smith. "It is well fitted by ability and experience, by sympathies and position, to deal with the problem of self-government to South Africa."

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ALLEGED C.M.R. MUTINY PLANNED BUT DISCOVERED

Troopers at Halifax Said to Have Become Angered at Treatment Received for Trivial Breaches of Discipline and to Have Meditated Revenge.

New York, Jan. 24.—A despatch from Halifax to The World says: A plot among the Canadian Mounted Rifles to mutiny on board the transport Victorian, scheduled to sail for South Africa next Tuesday, leaked out to-night. The men, angered at the treatment they had received for trivial breaches of discipline, decided to seize the officers and non-commissioned officers responsible for it after the vessel had left port.

But for the timely betrayal of the scheme by some who had refused to join in it, it is thought there would have been a terrible fight, with wholesale bloodshed, between the hundred and more mutineers, who are largely from the West, and those who would have remained loyal to the colonel and other officers.

During the last week, about 60 men have been discharged from the regiment, principally those from the Northwest.

Halifax, Jan. 24.—Since concentrating at Halifax, 56 men, two troops altogether, have been given their discharges, some for poor shooting, others for bad conduct and a number medically unfit. To-day Lance-Corporal Searcy and Privates McBrayn, E. Brandon and H. Johnston of C were granted their discharges. Private McVey was sent to the infectious disease hospital to-day, suffering with measles.

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THIRTY FIRMS IN UNISON WILL FIGHT STEEL TRUST

With a Capital of \$100,000,000 They Will Control European Trade.

New York, Jan. 24.—The London correspondence of the European edition of The Herald says: Some 30 steel manufacturers of Great Britain have entered the ring against the American Steel Trust. A fierce fight is impending. The combined capital is said to be \$20,000,000 (\$100,000,000).

To a reporter of the Daily Express, one who is said to be a high authority on the English steel trade in Birmingham said:

"The English steel trade is about to make a move which will shatter American ideas. The combination will have the command of sufficient coal mines, together with the modernized ironworks, to have the trade to such an advantage as to resist the threatened American invasion."

"When the scheme is matured, it will comprise the cream of the iron-works in this country. It will have possession of European mines, and sufficient steel to bring the trade to England."

TO UNITE IN MISSION WORK.

An important conference was held on Thursday night at the residence of Principal Caven of Knox College, when a movement was inaugurated, which will have far-reaching results concerning the labors of the various evangelical denominations in the foreign and domestic missions fields. Representatives were present from the various denominations. It was felt that there was much overlapping of work and consequent waste of energy; that in many instances there were several church bodies working together in one field, where one could as well do the work, and in other instances there was a neglect of a reorganization of the work, and better results would be obtained. Thursday night's meeting was of a private nature, to get the idea into shape. There was unanimity of opinion that some definite action should be taken, and a committee, composed of Rev. Principal Caven, co-convenor, Principal Sheraton, Wycliffe College, Prof. James Ballantyne, Knox College; Rev. F. C. H. Heathcote and Rev. Dr. Chown, was appointed to prepare a memorial to be presented to the various churches, asking them to take such steps as will produce cooperation, especially in the home and foreign mission fields, and in the prevention of overlapping work, and consequent waste of time and means.

MOVED HER FIFTY FEET.

New steamer Montreal was shifted back on the blocks. It has been decided to launch the new Richelieu and Ontario Navigators Co.'s steamer, Montreal, at the Bertram Shipyards on Monday, Feb. 3, at 3 o'clock p.m. A fifty-foot water-tight compartment on the extreme bow of the vessel has been attached. In doing so, it was found necessary to move the vessel about 50 feet, which was done with comparatively little difficulty, owing to the complete arrangements made for the task. The vessel, when she was moved, weighed about 500 tons.

RECEIVED FROM TIMBER SALES.

CANADIAN FLAX MAY BE USED

If Suitable, in the Manufacture of Binder Twine and Rope. The inquisitive members of the legislature had their inquiring yesterday afternoon, and the greater part of the session was taken up with the replies from Ministers to their questions. Mr. Breithaupt inquired if the government had considered the question of utilizing Canadian-grown flax in the manufacture of binder twine and rope, instead of procuring the raw material from foreign countries. The Provincial Secretary replied that \$5000 would be placed in the supplementary estimates for the purpose of experimenting in connection with the matter.

Y.M.C.A. CONVENTION.

Berlin, Jan. 24.—There was a large attendance at the convention this morning, and good progress was made in the hearing of reports. Mr. D. A. Budge of Montreal spoke on "The Education of a Community," pointing out the invaluable services of the Y.M.C.A. work towards this end. The report of the Educational Department was read and adopted. Mr. R. K. Colquhoun reported on the association work in middle class work, and it was brought out that the last convention for South Africa was well supplied with literature. It was decided to leave Halifax. This afternoon Dr. Harris entertained the convention with a Bible study lesson, after which an open parliament was held.

HOW SMALLPOX SPREADS.

Hagerstown, Jan. 24.—The Health Officer of Walpole Township, Hagerstown county, writing in regard to the recent death from malignant smallpox at Jarvis, says the original case was that of a blacksmith who had been employed in a lumber camp. He was staying at a Jarvis hotel, and was quarantined with the hotelkeeper and his wife. The quarantined employee, in hotel went home, and later developed smallpox. He had also his sister, in the latter case the disease was introduced as chickenpox, but people who came in contact with the patient developed smallpox. In this way the disease spread thru Rainham and other townships in the county. The case in Rainham Township, the head of the family, who is a Christian Scientist, refused to allow himself, his wife and younger children to be vaccinated. Four other children of the family, having one of the unvaccinated members of the family, but those vaccinated escaped, although living in the same house.

CITY AND COUNTRY GROWTH.

More Census Figures on Population of Ontario and Manitoba. Ottawa, Jan. 24.—A bulletin was issued this morning giving the rural and urban population of the Provinces of Ontario and Manitoba, by census districts, as enumerated at the last census, compared with the same classes of population in 1891. In Ontario during the last decade there has been a falling off of 48,138 in the rural population, which now amounts to 1,247,190, as against 1,295,328 in 1891. On the other hand, the urban population amounts to 935,752, as against 818,098 ten years ago, or an increase of 117,654. This shows the extent to which the population in the rural districts has been drifting to the cities since 1891. In Manitoba, however, the case is somewhat different. In that province the rural population has increased in both classes of the population, but especially in the rural districts. The rural population has grown from 118,498 in 1891 to 184,714 in the last census, a gain of 66,216. The urban population, which was 108,818 in 1891, now stands at 170,233, a growth of 61,415.
