

BRITISH NEWS.

THE REFORM BILL.—The following circular has been transmitted to the overseers of all the parishes to be affected by the operation of the reform measure:—
 "WITNESSETH, 30th May, 1831.
 "Gentlemen—I am directed by Viscount Melbourne to request that you will, with the least possible delay, transmit to me, for his Lordship's information, a return of the number of houses, or houses and land held together, in the parish of ———, rated to the poor rate at £10, and upwards; stating whether the rate is made on the full back rent, or on what portion of it. I am, gentlemen, your obedient servant,
 "S. M. PHILLIPS."

The following circular is in the hands of Members of Parliament known to be favourable to the Reform Bill. It is important, as showing that Ministers are determined to bring forward that great measure with all the energy in their power, and without the loss of a single day.—"The preliminary arrangements necessary at the meeting of a new Parliament will be completed, and the business of the session will commence on Tuesday, the 21st June. I most earnestly request your attendance on that day. It is unnecessary for me to call your attention to the importance of the Bill for the Reform of Parliament, which will be introduced at the earliest possible period, and on which a full attendance is most essential."

So general is the conviction that the ensuing Parliament will be of very short duration, that in various counties, gentlemen have already named as candidates for the contemplated divisions.

A numerous meeting of ship-owners took place on Thursday at the City of London Tavern, when it was agreed that an extended Society should be formed, and subscriptions thereunto, for the purpose of protecting the shipping interests.

Mr. Richard Lantier arrived in town on Thursday morning, from Port-au-Prince, having returned from his mission in the interior of Africa, after exploring the source of the Niger. Mr. L. attended at the Colonial Office, and had an interview with Viscount Grey.

A marriage is announced between Mr. Seymour, eldest son of Lord George Seymour, the Secretary of Legation at Florence, and Miss Gertrude Brand, youngest daughter of the Hon. General Trevor, and niece to Lord Palmerston. Miss B. who is one of the most distinguished beauties of the present day, is at present travelling in Italy with her sister, Mrs. Cottrell; but it is understood that the marriage will be solemnized in England.

WALES.—There had been serious disturbances among the workmen in the iron manufactories of Glamorganshire, who had struck for higher wages, and turned out on Tuesday, the 29th June. The strikers, if their demands were not granted. The military were called out; but the insurgents greatly outnumbered them, and drove them with stones to the town of Merthyr Tydfil, where they took refuge in the houses, and were still assailed in them. The soldiers were then provoked to fire into the mob, by which 14 were killed, and many wounded. The militia could not be depended upon. The major and several soldiers were severely wounded. The Marquis of Bute, Lord Lieutenant of the county, was on the spot, and immediately sent despatches to the Home Office. Alderman Thompson, one of the firm owners of the vast establishments in which the turn-out occurred, immediately set off for the place after an interview with Lord Melbourne.

At the latest advices, a large body of military had reached the scene of disturbance. There had been no further attempt to commence rioting; but the men showed no intention of returning to their work.—The affair occurred on Friday 3rd of June.

Site of His late Majesty's Coronation Robes, and Wardrobe.—The site of His late Majesty's costly coronation robes and wardrobe, which were sold by auction, in New Bond-street, in 120 lots. There was very slight competition, and none of the articles appeared to be purchased by persons of distinction.—The following are the prices of some of the lots:—A pair of fine white kid trousers, of ample dimensions, lined with white satin, sold for *twelve shillings*. The coronation ruff £2. The celebrated costly highland costume worn by the late Sovereign on his visit to the Duke of Beauford, £30. The crimson velvet coronation mantle, embroidered with gold, and star of silver, cost £300, knocked down for seven guineas.—A crimson coat to suit the above, £14. A richly embroidered silver tissue coronation waistcoat and trunk hose £13. A purple velvet coronation mantle, embroidered with gold, cost £300, knocked down for £55. A green velvet mantle, presented by the Emperor Alexander to his late Majesty, and cost upwards of 1,000 guineas, brought £125.

On the 8th June the King held an Entree Levee, at which, among other persons who were introduced and had an audience, was Mr. McLane, American Minister, to take leave "on his being appointed to the American Embassy at Mexico."

EMIGRATION.—Yesterday afternoon, the ship General Hewitt, 1000 tons burden, left the London docks for Canada, with 300 passengers on board. Chelsea pensioners, with their wives and families, who have received four years' pay, and grants of land in Canada from the British Government. There were also several passengers going out at the expense of various country parishes; and mechanics and tradesmen, with their wives and children, paying their own passage money. On getting outside the long entrance a steamer was taken in tow by a stranger, and elided majestically down the River, with all her colours flying.—*Atlas.*

The new Parliament assembled on Tuesday, 14th June; on which occasion the Lord Chancellor addressed the Commons, and informed them that the King would, on the following Tuesday, (the 21st), in a speech from the throne, personally explain the purpose for which he had brought them together. The Commons then proceeded to the election of a Speaker, when the Right Hon. Charles Manners Sutton was declared re-elected without opposition. The gentleman has held the same situation for fourteen years, and has now been unanimously re-elected. The custom is that the Speaker should have a new service of plate with each new Parliament, so that the present Speaker will have six official services.

LONDON, June 14.—The Great Council of the Nation assembles this day; and although a short period will of necessity be devoted to business of more routine before the awful question of Parliamentary Reform can regularly come under discussion, this is the day which history will mark as the epoch of the meeting of that Parliament, by the decision of which the future weak or woe, prosperity or declension of the British Empire is to be determined.

We have called the question an awful one, not in the spirit or temper of partisans, but under the influence of a feeling, which must, we think, be common to all men whom the spirit and temper of party has not utterly deprived of reason. The same language should be ours, were we even as much convinced of the necessity of a new construction of the Legislature as we are our contemporaries. It must be the language of every man who is qualified to understand the very terms of the question.

What is it to construct anew the legislature of an extensive empire like that of Great Britain, consisting of a multitude of parts, diversified in their several interests as they are widely separated by their geographical position? It is to call into play a variety of impulses and feelings, with respect to which we have no experience, and of which neither the direction nor the momentum can be the subject of accurate calculation. It is to place the great masses of society in a new position with respect to each other—in a position which, for any experience we can have in the country, may lead to strife rather than to harmony, to destruction rather than to improvement. It is an experiment which once begun must pursue its full course, and upon the ultimate success of which depends the welfare and happiness of millions of human beings for countless ages.—*Morning Post.*

LONDON, June 14.—We have heard nothing further of the Russian Pole-murdering-plot to-day, but we understand the idea has not been abandoned. The Times of this morning says that "the Warsaw Bank, at the breaking out of the Revolution, held an inscription of Russian 6 per cent. Stock to the amount of 300,000 paper roubles. Orders have, however, it is said, been issued to the Treasury at St. Petersburg, not to pay any dividends on the Stock held by the Warsaw Bank—and, further, not to allow the transfer of it, or any portion of it, to other hands. This proceeding is the more flagrant, as there is, we believe, an express clause in the Russian loan contracts, that no circumstances whatever, either of war or otherwise, shall be made a plea by the Russian Government for not fulfilling its share of the contract. No honourable capitalist throughout Europe, we conceive, will engage in a treaty for a new loan to Russia until this writer is satisfied to the contrary." The matter is certainly a reason why no capitalist should lend his money to a Government capable of such bad faith; but the great reason against a new loan to Russia is the purpose to which it is to be applied. If "he who allows oppression shares the crime," what is he who not only allows it, but actually aids and abets murder by the "murder of carrying it out? The matter is, we have quoted from the Times, well understood, is perfectly correct; indeed we have heard that the St. Petersburg Bank has refused to pay the dividends on Stock held by private individuals. We shall have something more to say in a few days relative to raising loans for Russia and other despotic States. The practice must be at an end.—*Morning Herald.*

The Deputies from the Belgian Congress are in London, and had an interview with the Prince of Saxe-Coburg; but although the Prince's resolution is not yet made public, it seems to be pretty well understood that he will not accept the Crown of Belgium, until the Belgians have complied with the Protocols of the Allies. The prospect of that compliance is, as yet, too distant for much speculation on the course which the Prince will then pursue, or on the effects which the election of an English subject, with English prejudices, and English habits, may produce in Belgium society, or on the political and moral condition of the people.

There are now lying between this port and New York some of the finest packet-ships in the world. The President and Ontario are at this time lying in the London Docks. The former will leave to-morrow, with his Excellency Louis McLane and family, the late American Minister to the Court of St. James's. The cabins of these two ships are fitted up in a style of elegance not equaled by any drawing-room in London. They are sufficiently capacious to dine with comfort 50 or 60 people each.—*Id.*

RIOTS IN WALES.—Mr. Crawshaw has complied with the demands of the men at Merthyr for an advance of wages. Lewis, the ringleader in the attack on the Court of Requests and on the soldiers, is a desperate character. When the soldiers were supplied with refreshment, he demanded food for the mob, and threatened destruction to the magistracy and military if they refused it. He took out his watch and marked the time allowed, at the end of which the mob pressed all the soldiers till they were deprived of their arms, where thirty of the 18th were deprived of their arms, and several wounded. Twenty-three of the mob have fallen victims to their own act of outrage. All is now quiet at Merthyr; but this morning we received accounts from Pontypool and Abersherwyth, that similar scenes to those at Merthyr, were dreaded in that neighbourhood.

The Times, in allusion to the Revolution of Brazil, observes, that it is a subject of very great interest in the city, on account of the immense state England possesses in that country, in regard to commercial, financial, and also mining undertakings, some of which last are going on very prosperously. The trade with Brazil is one of the best enjoyed by the British, and the English are also creditors of the Government on loans to the amount of more than £4,000,000 sterling; and in mining speculations, there is embarked at least £1,000,000 more of English capital.

Great alarm has been excited in London, by the spread of the cholera on the continent, and a report which had been made upon the subject by a college of physicians. They have recommended the strictest quarantine, both on persons and merchandise. The Globe says:—"We regret to hear, that by the last accounts received, more than 40 vessels had passed the Souda with the green flag, which means an unspiced bill of health."
