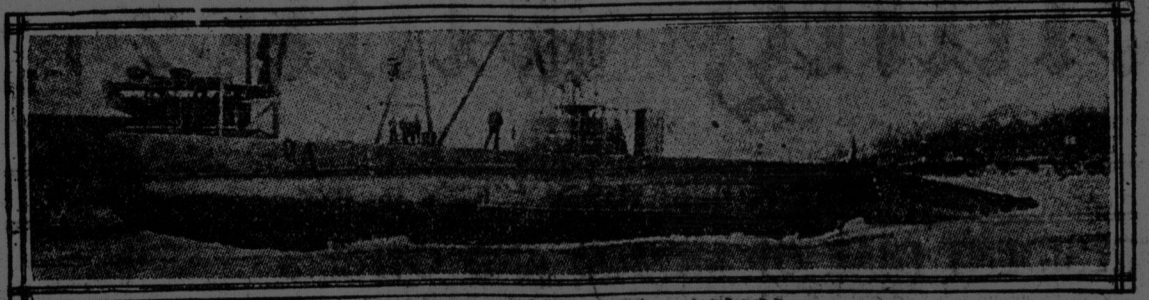

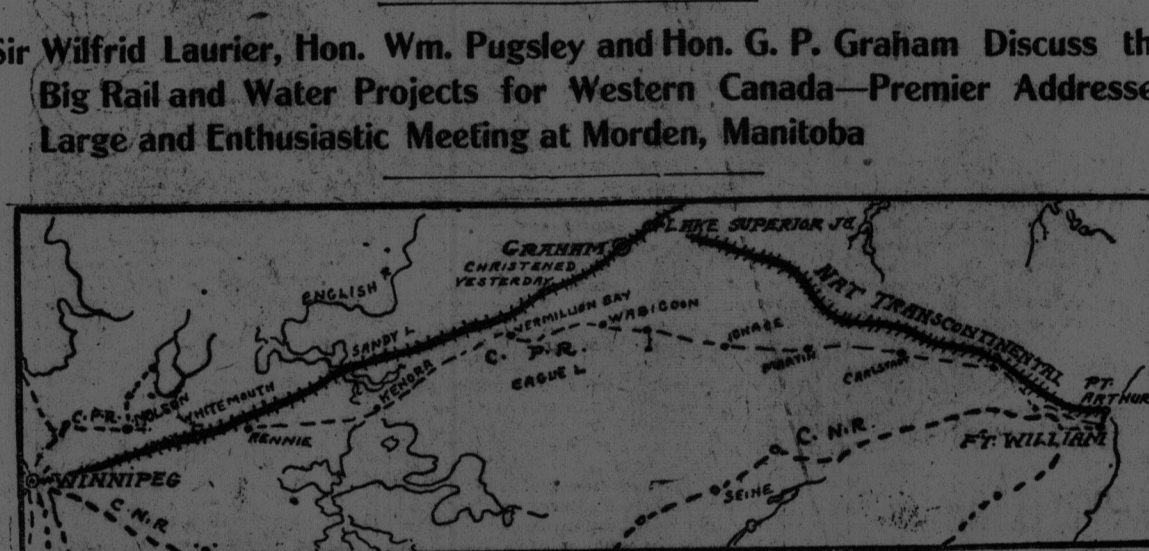

CANADIAN TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS FOR WEST ABLY PRESENTED BY LEADERS

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Wm. Pugsley and Hon. G. P. Graham Discuss the Big Rail and Water Projects for Western Canada—Premier Addresses Large and Enthusiastic Meeting at Morden, Manitoba

Morden, Man., July 15.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's tour of the west is not a political pilgrimage. The prime minister has himself defined its purpose. It is a trip of inspection, national stock taking, seeing the country, meeting the new people, studying new conditions. Back of it all are big constructive projects.

Sir Wilfrid is preaching transportation. He is in conference with two ministers to whom he has committed great undertakings. To Hon. Mr. Graham he has entrusted the evolution of the Transcontinental Railway achievement and to Dr. Pugsley, he has given over the working out of his second mammoth transportation project.

"When the Hudson Bay railway is completed, it will be the most convenient point for manufacture of lumber, pulp, paper and flour for shipment to the markets of the old world. Our department has now in the field five parties surveying the Saskatchewan river, determining the best mode and the cost of the necessary improvements. We completed a preliminary survey last year and the valuable information was derived."

"The minister expressed the conviction that the commencement of actual work would not be long delayed. "I have set myself to the task of reducing freight rates and increasing transportation facilities," said Hon. Mr. Graham, addressing a big meeting in the sitting room here this afternoon, "and there is nothing to equal the water route as the controller of railway rates."

HALF HEARTED EFFORTS FOR REFORM IN LAND OF CHINA

Reforms Do Not Work Out Satisfactorily—Government Seems Too Weak to Carry Out its Policies

(Toronto News.) According to a correspondent of The London Morning Post, the half-hearted efforts at reform in China have been disconnected and largely ineffective. Some years ago it was resolved to establish a parliamentary system. As a first step provincial assemblies were "elected" with the idea that they should later on send representatives to an imperial assembly.

Then the military system has been halfheartedly reformed, more or less on European lines. It has been announced that China would build her own railways, and education has been established on a modern basis. Edicts prohibiting opium, liquor, footbinding and the debasing of coinage have gone forth, and the world has been asked to admire the earnestness with which China attacked the problem of regeneration.

The difficulty is that the reforms do not work out satisfactorily. There are serious hitch in the machinery. In the first place, the Central Government at Peking seems far too weak to carry out any reform policy. The edicts it has issued are regarded as a sop to weary foreigners and an attempt to conciliate the forward portion of native public opinion. The Provincial Assemblies have assumed an independent attitude. They control the revenue, and are able to create awkward situations for the central authorities at Peking. The lack of military cohesion and discipline is another obstacle in the way of progress. The officers have not sufficient control over their men, and the troops of each province form an independent army, which may take the field against the troops of a neighboring province.

A new system of schools has been erected, but they are manned by inefficient teachers, who have just enough western knowledge to make them dangerous instruments to the rising generation. The country seriously requires railways, and foreign capital is available, but the natives are averse to its introduction. Moreover, the imperial and provincial governments quarrel over the control of these projects, and to overcome the decentralization of government, and render conditions more tolerable for missionaries and other foreigners resident in the interior.

"Altogether," says the Post's correspondent, "with so many turbulent elements to contend with the Peking government is having a far from easy time. Mutinous troops, anti-foreign feeling on the increase, railways and education hanging fire, students returning from Japan to spread revolutionary ideas—it only needs

ASK LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR TO PROHIBIT FIGHT FILMS

Baptist Association at Sussex Pass Resolution Asking Governor Tweedie to Act

Sussex, N. B., July 15.—(Special)—At this morning's session of the U. B. Association the resolution introduced by J. R. Colpitts stating the advisability of asking the Hon. Mr. Tweedie to prohibit the exhibition of moving pictures of the recent prize fight, also that of the Home Missions boards evoked much discussion. The association finally laid it on the table indefinitely. The ordination of W. C. Machum took place this afternoon. Rev. P. C. Francis, of Salisbury, delivered the ordination sermon from 2nd Cor. 2:16, and 2nd Cor. 3:5. His practical discourse was listened to with great interest.

The committee chosen to confer with a committee of the Reformed Baptist Alliance regarding closer union, consists of Rev. Dr. Joseph McLeod, Rev. Dr. McIntyre, Rev. Dr. Phillips, Rev. J. H. MacDonald and Rev. H. G. Kennedy. A report on resolutions was presented by Rev. L. A. Fenwick. Among them were the following: "Resolved, that the lieutenant governor be requested to prohibit the use, in New Brunswick, of moving pictures of the recent prize fight; also that letters of recommendation be requested not to permit, in their columns, either pictures or literature on prize fighting."

The report was adopted with the exception of one clause which is to be referred to the maritime conference to meet next month in Woodstock. 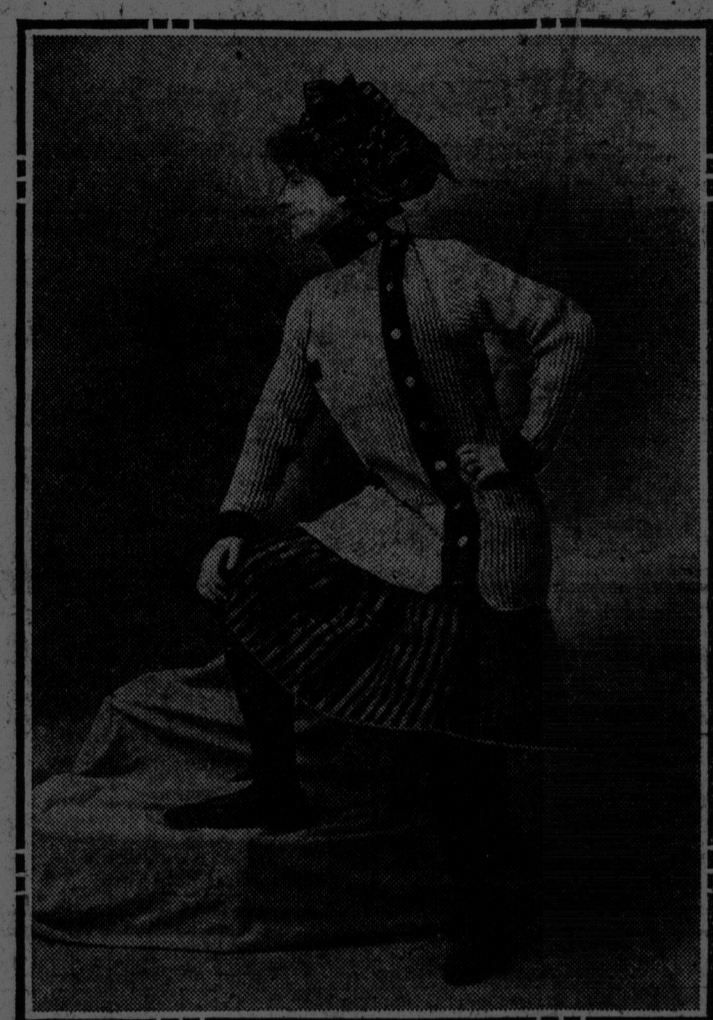

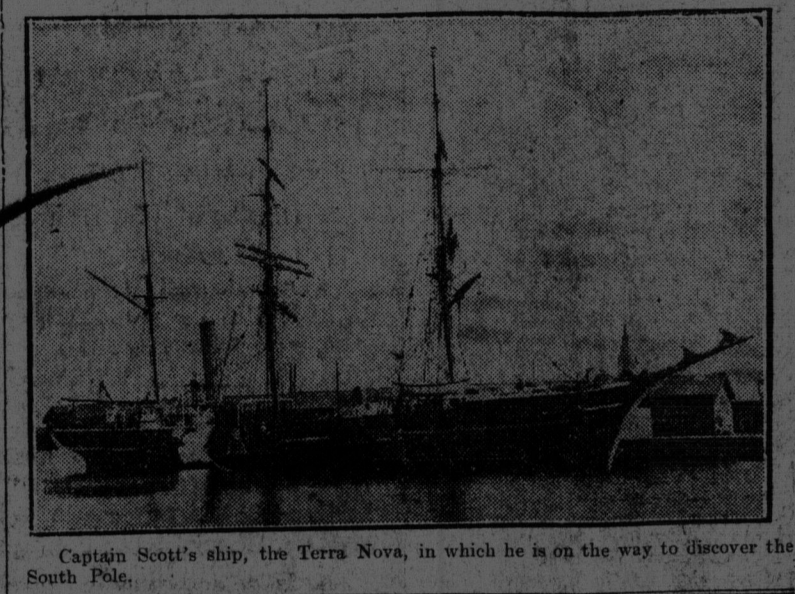

New York, July 15—One might imagine that a handsome young woman of culture, having a million or more to her credit would have no difficulty in securing for herself an enviable position in society. Not so with Miss Julia Morrisini, the attractive daughter of the late multi-millionaire banker—Giovanni Morrisini. For many years prior to the death of her father, Miss Morrisini who speaks French and Italian as fluently as she does English, spent \$200,000 a year on her wardrobe and was accredited the best dressed woman in New York. No figure at the annual flower show for years attracted more admiring attention. Her hats, her gowns and her jewels served to complete a picture of feminine opulence that rarely has been surpassed.

When a poor woman, harassed by poverty and pressed by the necessity of providing nourishment for a sick child is accused of stealing a loaf of bread, it is petty larceny and she is sent to jail. 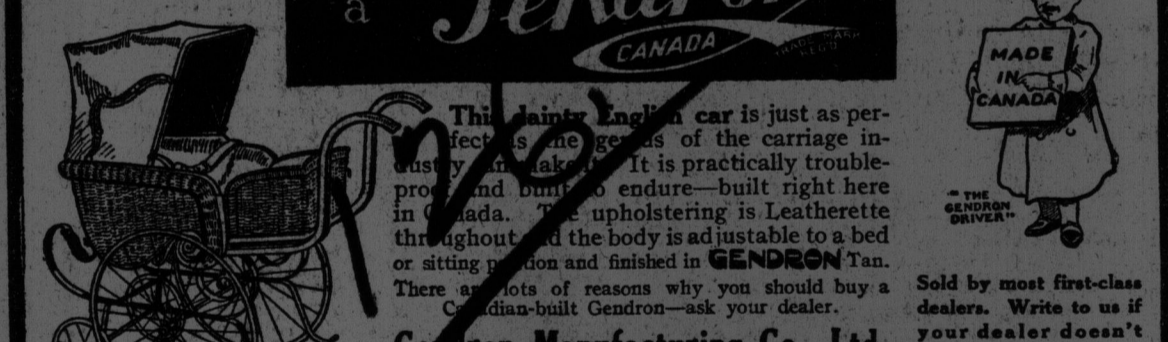

STRUCK BY WHALES

Collisions between ships and whales are not uncommon, says the London Shipping Gazette, but they seldom result in the loss of the ships concerned, although a recent cable from San Francisco is to the effect that an American schooner struck a whale and foundered on May 21 on the Pacific Coast.

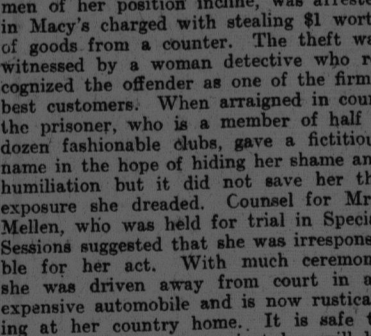
In 1820 the whaler Essex was lost in this way, and as recently as 1902 another whaler, the Kathleen, shared a similar fate. During the following year a whale came head-on to the steamer Fingal, and struck her heavily, but merely alarmed the passengers and crew, while she was making a passage between two Scotch ports and in 1904 the whaler George F. Hay was so seriously damaged by collision with a whale which was apparently almost in the sea surface, that she was compelled to call in at Bahia for repairs. In September, 1894, the crew of the schooner Quermore, the schooner being in a sinking condition, consequent on collision with a whale.

Not long since the German liner Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, while steaming 20 miles in mid-Atlantic, collided with a whale about seventy feet long. It galloped the steamer's prow for some time, and she was forced to alter her course to avoid it. The vessel was forced ultimately to go astern in order to rid herself of this embarrassment. In 1904, while going full speed between Tahiti and San Francisco, the steamer first it almost struck a whale if she had followed an uncharted rock, but the propeller struck a different tale. On the Equator, not far from the West Coast of Africa, the Armadale Castle struck a 50 feet long whale and carried the creature for some distance across her stern.

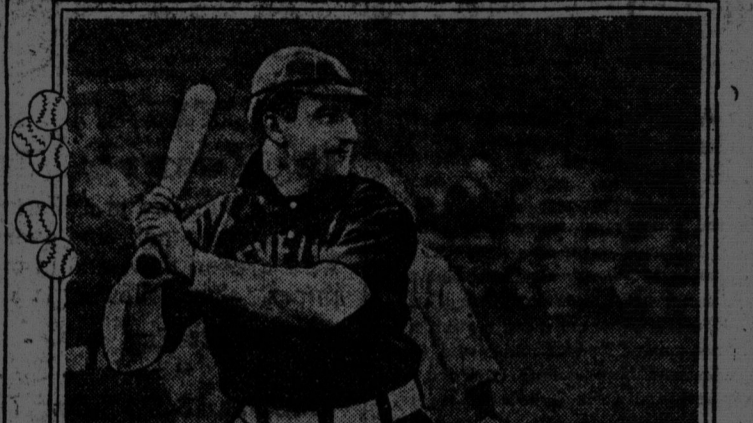

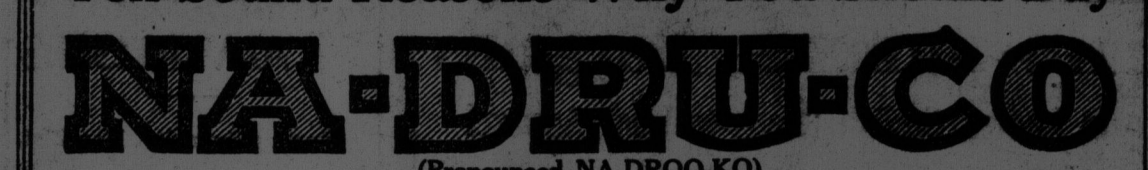

POLICE COURT

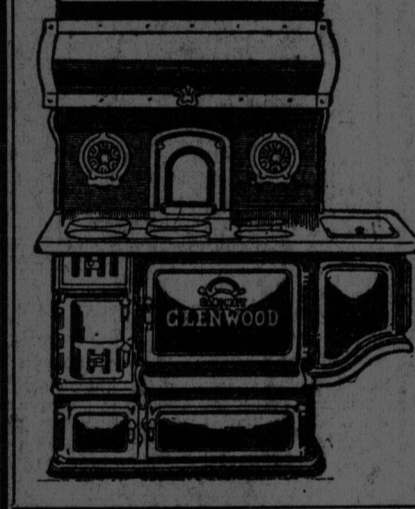
