

Colonel Regan said the convention would bring between 150 and 200 outstanding men to Saint John. His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor W. F. Todd, has consented to act as chairman at the opening session on the morning of Oct. 1. The Prime Minis. man at the opening session on the morning of Oct. 1. The Prime Minister of Canada and the leader of the Opposition, or their representatives, will be in attendance to represent their respective political parties, Colonel Regan said.

Matrimony is a long and a hard road for a woman to travel. It involves suffering and sacrifice, the putting of another before herself, the adjusting of her own point of view to another's, the patient endurance of personal peculiarities that get upon her nerves. Often putting up with injustice. Forgiving slights, neglects. Forgetting impatient and cruel words, whipped out in anger or under the stress of nerves.

Historical Ceremony Held at Cairn in Sheffield, Sunbury Co.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 17—In the presence of a gathering of people from all parts of New Brunswick His Honor the Lieut.-Governor of New Brunswick, Hon. W. F. Todd, this afternoon used at the memoral calm executed at W. F. I odd, this atternoon invelled the memorial cairn erected at Sheffield to mark the erection of the first Protestant church edifice in New Brunswick, Sheffield Congregational church, originally Maugerville Congregational church, and now part of the United Church of Canada.

THE MONUMENT.

The cairn, a pyramidal structure of grey Spoon Island granite, stands on what has been glebe land from the original grant and is within easy view from the highway a few yards away. The bronze plate is inscribed as follows.

Puritan settlers who came here from New England in 1762 and 1768, and founded Sheffield Congregational Church, New Brunswick's first Protestant Church, which has continued until this day. First church built, 1765, re-built 1840. Entered the United Church of Canada in 1925. Erected in 1926."

VALUABLE RUBY CONTAINS IMAGE

Amazing Discovery Made in India; Figure is Clearly Defined

Bombay, Sept. 18-A most amazing

Bombay, Sept. 18—A most amazing discovery of possibly the world's rarest jewels has been made in that mysterious land of Pagodas, Burma.

Noted for the wonderful lustre and the beautiful color of the rubies that are taken out of her famous mines, even Burma has never yet produced any stone which can equal the one described by H. W. B. Moreno, member of the Bengal Legislative Council, in the newspapers of Calcutta.

A real ruby sparkling, as the Indian jewelers would say, like a drop of nigron's blood, is a very rare jewel for any Hindu to possess. But, when it discloses a portrait varought in the water of the gem, made not by human hand but by nature the jewel becomes an absolutely unique specimen surpassing in value even the fa mous diamonds from the mines of Gollbonda.

Considered as a gift of God, the Considered as a gift of God, the jewel assumes an importance to the faithful Hindu which cannot be esti-

mated in terms of coin.

The stone is not very large, but inside the outer surface, deep down behind a scarlet cloud, appears the tiny image of a man, dressed in white and with a fairly darkish brown face and

with a fairly darkish brown face and deep brown eyes.

The man is seen wearing a white puggree the headdress of the Hindus) and the rest of his body is covered by deep folds of a garment of silken white.

The more closely you look at the gem the more the image in the stone comes out in detail.



Maritime Provinces.

Lord Clarendon, when interviewed last night, said that they proposed to motor to the homes of those British settlers who came to New Brunswick and settled near Saint John, this morning. They will leave afterwards for Sussex, Hampton and Moncton and will proceed to Truro and Halifax tomorrow. After a short stay there the party will return to Quebec, whence Lord Clarendon will take passage for

MAJORITY DOING WELL

Lord Clarendon said that the entire number of 460 settlers who came to Canada in 1925 from parts of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, had taken to farming and from what he had seen on his western and central Canada tour the majority were doing well. He said it was hoped to send a large number to Canada next year. Under the 3,000 family settlement scheme, so far only 1,500 families have been sent.

Lord Clarendon said he had traveled 5,000 miles by motor since his arrival in Canada, two months ago yesterday, beside the thousands of miles he had put behind him by rail and boat. with the farming possibilities of the Dominion. A few years ago this distinguished visitor was himself engaged in agricultural work in Ontario. This is agricultural work in Ontario. This is Lord Clarendon's third visit to Canada. W. A. McDougall, district superintendent here of the Soldiers' Settlement Board, a member of Lord Clarendon's party, also arrived in the city last night. 

He's called the turn on practically every fight in America for the last ten years and on two occasions called the ROUND. Both of these fights by the way were heavyweight battles in which Dempsey defended his title. One was against Carpentier when he won in the fourth round and the other was against Firpo when he won in the second round. Each result tallied with Britton's forecast. "I think the fight will go the limit and it wouldn't surprise me if Tunney wins," is Britton's sizeup of the coming heavyweight bout. There's one, mates, right from the griddle by as shrewd a little dude as ever pulled on the leathers and, what is more important in this instance, a dopester who HAS YET TO BE WRONG. Britton isn't shooting at the moon, either. He was in Florida all last winter and he saw Tunney in training at Miami Beach. He also saw Dempsey when the champion was in the south barnstorming. So at least he has a fair sort of line on them. Britton is figuring on superior condition and strength winning from Dempsey. 
