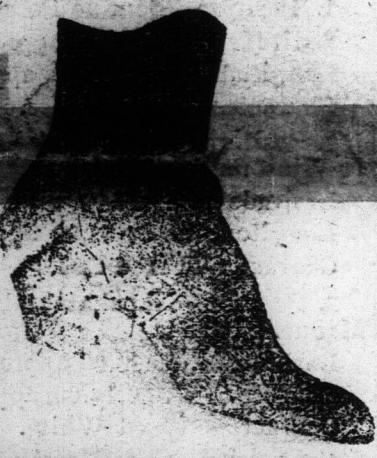

## SCHEDULE O. DIRECTIONS for the Guidance of Electors in Voting

Each Elector, on entering the room where the Poll is to be held, shall declare his name, surnames and addition.

After so doing he shall receive a Ballot Paper in the above form. Each Elector, if required by the Deputy Returning Officer, the Poll Clerk, one of the Candidates, or one of their agents, shall, before receiving his Ballot Paper, take an oath of qualification.

The voter is to vote only for Three Candidates.

After receiving his Ballot Paper the voter shall go into one of the compartments, and, with a pencil, there provided, place a cross in the division containing the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom he intends to vote, thus X.

The voter will then fold the Ballot Paper, so as to show a portion of the back only, with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand it so folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the Deputy Returning Officer shall, without unfolding it, ascertain that it is the Ballot Paper which he furnished to the elector, and then immediately place it in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forthwith leave the Polling Station.

If a voter inadvertently spoils a Ballot Paper he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will give him another.

If a voter votes for more candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the Ballot Paper by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.

If a voter takes a Ballot or Ballot Paper out of the Polling Station, or fraudulently puts any other paper into the Ballot Box than the Paper given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to be punished by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for a time not exceeding Six Months with or without hard labor.

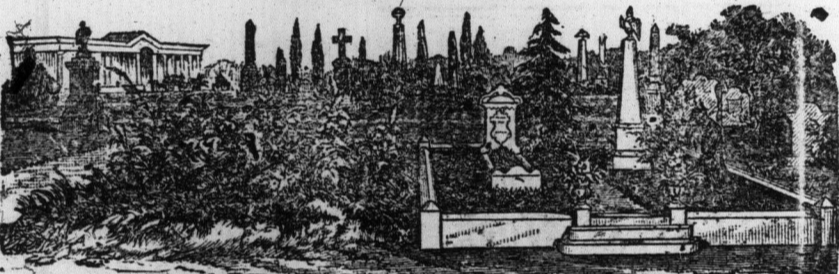

## Railway Extension

In pursuance of the mandate from the people as voiced at the polls in May, 1909, the contract made with the Reid Newfoundland Company in the Fall of that year provided for the construction of the following branch lines.

From Shoal Harbor to Bonavista, 84 miles, which road has been completed and was formally opened by His Excellency the Governor in November, 1911.

From St. John's to Trepassey, 102 miles, now under construction and almost completed.

From Broad Cove to Heart's Content, 35 miles, also under construction—a almost completed.

From St. John's to Grate's Cove, 50 miles, construction on which is going on now.

From Come-by-Chance through the country to the head of Fortune Bay, 50 miles, the construction of which will also be started this year.

From Deer Lake to Bonne Bay, 35 miles, construction on which is likewise to be started this year.

This will make a total of about 330 miles. The financing of this railway enterprise has been carried on without hampering the Colony in any manner. The natural increase in the revenue due to the starting of these and other large public works, as well as the diversifying of trade has not alone made it possible for this railway enterprise to be financed successfully, but also for other important undertakings to be set on foot as will be seen later on. The whole of the branch railways included in this program will be completed by the end of 1914 and should add very greatly to the advantages so far as the Colony is concerned in the way of promoting trade and industry and general development.

## Bonavista Bay

Southern Bay, Oct. 25.—Hon. S. D. Blandford held a public meeting here last night. A large gathering of enthusiastic supporters was present. He spoke for over an hour, scoring point after point for his party, being greeted at intervals with clapping and cheers for himself and colleagues, the People's Party and Sir E. P. Morris. It is conceded by all that the People's Party will capture over half of the votes in this stronghold of Coaker and Liberalism. Sweet Bay is sold to a man for Blandford, Morison and Winsor.

## NEWS IN A LINE

Coaker declared in the Advocate last winter that Piccott and his colleagues would not be allowed to hold a public political meeting this fall.

We confidently believe that Harbor Grace District will return the three People's Party candidates—Piccott, Parsons and Young—with a larger majority than in 1909.

During the past four years the District and the people of the District have been looked after as never before, and therefore the electorate are going to appreciate the work accomplished by giving the People's Party a renewal of power.

Look around you and notice the men who are, to-day, doing the hand that fed them, and then make up your mind that GRATITUDE and APPRECIATION will be the dominant characteristics of your nature.

What Coaker said in the Advocate Sept. 7th, 1912: "Too long have some petty local matter which doesn't amount to a row of beans, been looked upon as of the greatest importance, and elections have been lost and won on this issue alone."

Don't split your votes and don't give plumpers. If you want to see the present government returned to power, and Mr. Piccott remain in charge of the Marine and Fisheries Department, vote the straight Ticket.

What Coaker said in the Advocate Sept. 7th, 1912: "Union men must go in for Union politics. . . . We are in politics either as Liberals, Tories or Unionists. If it is not Union politics we stand for, it must be non-Union, which makes of us traitors to our Union and leader. . . . Let us get together, vote together and send Coaker to the House of Assembly, THERE TO HOLD THE BALANCE OF POWER."

Another thing that ought to commend itself to our people, and that is, the attention the present government has paid to the sick. Hundreds of our people have been carried to the General Hospital and the hospital at St. Anthony to receive treatment they could never expect to receive at home. Hundreds of people may be found to-day who bless the present Government for the attention paid to them when sick.

If Coaker really had the fishermen's real interests in mind instead of Coaker's interests at heart, how could he oppose, as he has done the present Government, a Government that has accomplished more for this country and the fishermen than any previous administration. What object did he have in view in supporting Bond who was turned out of office by the fishermen for his failure to help them.

The Morris Government finds revenue enough to pay the annual interest on the public debt of the Colony, gives \$60,000 to old fishermen, increase the education grant by over \$100,000, build lighthouses and fog alarms, reduce taxation by taking the duty off sugar, tea, pork and beef, amounting to nearly \$400,000 yearly, and this fiscal year expects a big surplus. And yet the hungry office-seekers try and gull the electorate by saying we are going into bankruptcy.

U. and was selected as a Union candidate for Twillingate District, and now to be turned from it so soon. But I say, No. He is a man of wide common sense. He got his eyes open, and he do not intend falling into a pit because someone told him.

If the F. P. U. has lost Capt. Yates from its ranks, it has lost one of the blades off of its propeller in Notre Dame Bay, and that it will find out the coming election. Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from all Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

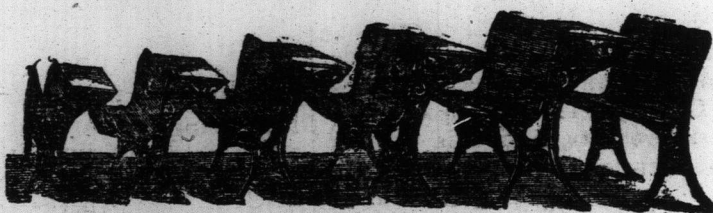

Morris did not leave the Widows of the Tollers to starve in their declining years, but increased their grant by 25 per cent.

Who is taking advantage of your lack of information and using all kinds of statements and specious arguments in a mad effort to get you by your vote to place them in power? The Advocate, Telegram and Opposition candidates.

The Liberal-Union candidates are getting cold feet, and not even the strenuous efforts of some of their prominent companions can help them.

THE COUNTRY HAS BEEN DISGUSTED WITH THE INACTIVITY OF THE LIBERAL PARTY DURING THE LAST FOUR YEARS, and the patience of the supporters of that Party are now well nigh exhausted.

If as Coaker stated, the F. P. U. controlled 17 seats and could secure 6 more, and as half of his followers at least understood and believed Coaker would have nothing to do with Bond or Morris, but would go to the country with a Fishermen's Party in order to secure a Balance of Power, what happened which made him change his mind and join hands with a man and a Party that half his followers have no use for. A few are following on in the hope that Coaker will be able to control and run Bond, and Bond's followers are hoping that in the event (remote though it is) of Coaker and Bond winning that Bond will be able to control Coaker. They are not going to get the chance to experiment at the country's expense, but if they did get the chance, what a spectacle we would witness.

## Another Improvement

The United Towns Electric Co. will extend their electric lighting and electric power system to Bay Roberts immediately. Such was the information we received from the Company on Saturday last.

On Monday Mr. J. J. Murphy, President of the Company, and Mr. L. Williams, Manager, came to town to make all necessary arrangements. What the introduction of Electric lights and power will mean to Bay Roberts time only will tell. We know what it has meant to other places, and we feel confident similar results will occur here.

One thing after another is coming our way, thanks to the optimism, faith and energy of a few men who see in their country and in the towns of their country possibilities of development. The Guardian has been an ardent advocate of electric lights and other improvements, some of which have

been realized, and we hope the day is not far distant when our people, catching a vision of the things that tend toward developing a town, will realize all their best hopes fulfilled.

Keep the present progressive government in power, and take our word for it, you will see greater things still happen in Bay Roberts.

## Fishermen will Support Policy of Progress

The fishermen not only want to catch fish, but they want to see prosperity abroad. They want to see their country developed. There is not the slightest doubt about that, and they are going to support candidates who in turn will support a government which has as its very keynote and foundation stone industrial development and general progress.

The fishery business must naturally continue to be the great mainstay of our country, but hand in hand with the fisheries there should be industrial development. Look at Canada and the United States. Consider the vast amount of farming that is being carried on in these countries and then consider the immense business of manufacturing.

Our people are in favor of labor-giving enterprises no matter what party they belong. Nine out of every ten men we have spoken to about the policy of the People's Party during the past six months had practically nothing to say against it. They rather approved of it. 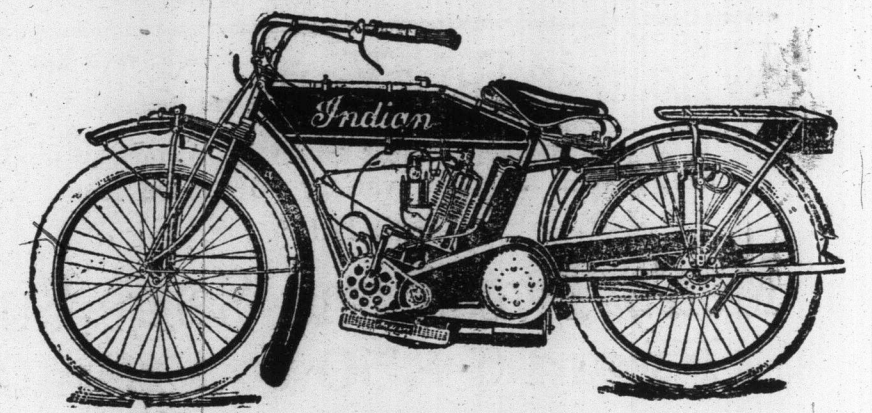

The President of the Society is Edwin F. Howell, Esq., a native of Carbonara, and Mr. Ernest W. Manning, formerly of St. John's, is Secretary. It is unnecessary to comment further on the resolution; it speaks for itself, and speaks eloquently:

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS we, the members of the Newfoundland-American Society of New York, banded together with the object of advancing, in the United States, the interests of our native country, review with pride the splendid record of achievements of the present Government of Newfoundland, and

WHEREAS that Government has faithfully and honestly fulfilled, so far as time would allow, the policy outlined in the Manifesto presented by

them to the people of Newfoundland at the general election of 1909, just four and one-half years ago, viz:

- To build Branch Railways.
- To Develop the Fisheries.
- To Enlarge Educational Grants.
- To Extend Telegraph Service.
- To Encourage Agricultural Progress.
- To Grant Old Age Pensions.
- To Improve Steam Service.
- To Encourage Mining.
- To Care for the Public Health.
- To Erect Lighthouses.
- To Deepen Harbors, where necessary and
- To Create a New Forest Fire Patrol, and

WHEREAS in view of the fact that these vast undertakings have been, so far, perfected without any increase in the burden of taxation, but, on the contrary, a substantial reduction of tariff on such commodities as may be classified as the necessities of life—saying more than mere words are adequate to express for the executive ability and judicious administration of Prime Minister Morris and his able assistants,

BE IT RESOLVED that this Society, in meeting assembled, without prejudice to any Party and wholly unbiased, extend to our fellow countrymen in Newfoundland our unanimous congratulations on the unprecedented prosperity with which the country is blessed and hope for a continuance of same. ## Coaker's Insult to Bay Roberts Men

Men of Bay Roberts, irrespective of party politics, read what Coaker said about you and your worthy representative, Mr. Piccott, in May, 1911: "Last summer Green Bay, was insulted by having men sent from Bay Roberts to erect beacon lights in Exploits Bay . . . and Green Bay will never forget the grab-all Mulley and the \$1,800 Pension Vulture, for the insult which they permitted Piccott, the Picnic Minister, to hurl

at the District of Twillingate in sending a dozen men from Harbor Grace District to Green Bay to draw \$1.00 a day for about . . . and grab for loading upon the people's taxes." This is a sample of what the men of Harbor Grace District might expect if Coaker and Bond were elected. The northern men might be looked after all right, but what would come in?

## Old Age Pensions

No feature of the Government's policy was more vehemently denounced than that which promised an Old Age Pension to our toil-worn workers, and this by men who themselves spent eight years toying with the project and accomplished nothing. To-day there are twelve hundred aged people receiving a pension of fifty dollars a year, and it is our intention, if elected, to add four hundred annually henceforth, reducing, at the same time, the age limit to seventy years, as I foreshadowed when introducing the measure four years ago. At the same time I intimated that it might be possible to extend its operations to cases of deserving women also, and I confidently expect that we can make provision for them as well.

Sir Robert Bond, in his manifesto issued on Saturday last, advocated Old Age Pensions for everybody, but took care not to include it in the 27 promises which comprehend his policy for the future. This procedure, of course, is a deliberate and discreditable attempt to deceive the country. Sir Robert Bond has no intention whatever of any such Old Age Pension scheme.

## Coakers Fort Stormed and Carried

Bonavista, Oct. 21.—The People's Party candidates, according to announcement, held a meeting last night in the S.U.F. Hall, which was packed. The Bond candidates had been invited by public notice, posted on Walkham's Hill, but for the second time showed the white feather. The meeting was orderly and attentive, and the candidates received a splendid hearing. Despite the fact that Bonavista is supposed to be the centre of Unionism, and that two or three hobblerboys, selected for the occasion, injected now and then with some silly remark, the sentiment of the meeting was strongly in favor of the People's Party, and Bonavista will not change.
