Our Marksmen in England.—The shooting at Biele, which is the some of the annual matches heretofore shot at Wimbledon, was completed on Saturday last, and the presentation of prizes took place on Saturday afternoon. The Canadian team came in for a share of what was going, and they received many congratulations on their fine shooting. The team, although beaten for the Kobbepoer cup, secured the second prize of \$400 given by the Maharajah for the highest colonial team.

In the corporation of London match for colonial teams the Canadians swept every thing before them, winning 15 of the 15 prizes. The silver cup, valued at \$100, was won by private J. E. Hutcheon, of the 42nd Batt., Ottawa. The other winners were: Lieut. Smith, St. John rifle company, \$100; staff sergeant O'Connell and capt. Bishop of Halifax, \$75 each; major Garrison of Halifax, private Hors of the 14th Kingdon, capt. Fitz-Hay of the 79th Batt., Waterloo, Quebec, \$70 each; sergeant Henderson, 62nd, St. John, \$50; capt. Basted, 3rd Victoria, private Wyndatt of the 45th Bowmanville, private Davies of the Royal Grenadiers, and corp. Morris of the 15th Hamilton, \$25 each.

In the Martin association match, major Garrison, Halifax, won \$100, and in the Goggin match capt. Basted, sergeant O'Connell and Lieut. Smith secured \$100 each.

League All Corners Aggregate, corp. Morris and capt. Gray won \$10 each.

In the Grand Aggregate, Smith, Hutcheon and O'Connell won \$25 each; in the association prizes, Basted won \$15, and Hutcheon, Lieut. Manning, Bishop, Garrison and Henderson, \$10 each; in the pavilion match, Henderson \$50, O'Connell \$10; in the Parbury match, Garrison \$10; in the Robin Hood match, Hutcheon \$15; in the Ladies' match, O'Connell \$25; in the Cannington match, capt. Longworth, P. E. L. artillery, \$20. The total winnings of the Canadian team for the two days aggregated nearly \$1,300.
